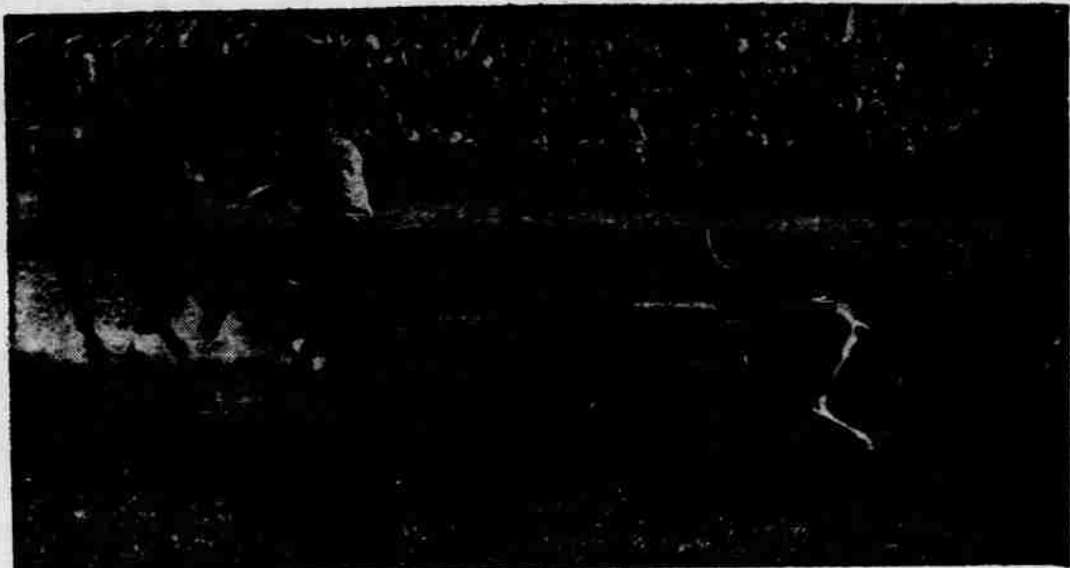

Olson, Turpin Slate Championship Bout For Oct. 21 at Madison Square Garden

San Francisco — (U.P.) — Bobo Olson's manager said today he was "very well pleased" with the terms of a world middleweight title fight between Olson and Randy Turpin.

Manager Sid Flaherty said the inclusion of a "no return bout" clause meant a "major victory for us."

Pleased With Deal

"I'm very pleased with the deal," Flaherty said. "I didn't think English promoter Jack Solomons would give in, but we finally won out."

It was announced in New York yesterday that Turpin, European middleweight champ, had agreed to a 15-round title fight against Olson Oct. 21. The bout will be held in Madison Square Garden.

The agreement climaxed two months of wrangling over where the bout should be held and whether there would be a return match. Flaherty wanted the fight in San Francisco and insisted on only one bout.

Fighter First Consideration

"I'm very disappointed that we couldn't stage the fight in San Francisco," he said. "But my first consideration is to my fighter and now if Bobo wins he's got the title, period."

"If we went to England with the championship we wouldn't come back with it."

Flaherty said it was the no return bout clause that decided in favor of the New York

New York — (U.P.) — All God's chillun got trouble, but you can't blame Monte Irvin if he feels that he has more than his share.

Monte is the powerful, soft spoken fellow who led the miracle Giants of 1951 to the National baseball league pennant. He didn't get the credit then that he should have, and hasn't since.

It seems that it always has been that way with Monte. Back in the days of his youth, his dreams always were of being a big star in the major leagues. Then, when he had become one of the top players in the Negro leagues, he was passed over, year after year, for less talent than he was called up under the big top.

After three years of waiting he finally earned a long awaited chance with the Giants.

A year later he was a regular and in 1951 he was the winning sparkplug.

He led the National league in runs batted in, hitting .312, and in the series batted a resounding .458. Against Allie Reynolds in the classic, he smashed four hits and daringly stole home.

But Monte wasn't recognized as the most valuable player. The vote had been taken before the season's end and the honor went to Roy Campanella.

The next spring, in an April exhibition game, Monte slid into third base and shattered his right ankle. Manager Leo Durocher standing in his room beside the other befogged Monte, worriedly asked the doctors what were Monte's chances.

"He won't play this year," one said.

"Don't worry skipper," Irvin said through his private haze. "I'll be back this year. I've got good bones and I heal quick."

He was back in late July, and still hobbling, played 46 games before season's end, and hit an amazing .310 in the bargain.

That ankle still bothers him, physically and in action, but as of Sunday the leader in the National league batting race with a .339 average was Irvin. Then misfortune struck again.

Monte crashed into Cardinal catcher Del Rife at the plate and suffered a sprain of that still tender ankle.

A player needs 400 times at bat to win the hitting title.

Rogue Best In Evening
Portland — (U.P.) — The weekly report on fishing conditions prepared by the State Game Commission includes:

Winchester bay salmon fishing only fair; weather conditions bad; Tenmile lake catfishing is improving. Perch fishing good. Sea-run cutthroat fishing is slow in Umpqua, Smith, and Siuslaw rivers. Trout fishing generally slow. Lower Rogue salmon angling is improving. A few summer steelhead being caught. Some sea-run cutthroats are being taken in tidewater. Trout fishing is slow in upper and middle Rogue with best catches in the evening. Trout fishing is fair in upper Umpqua area. Few sea-run cutthroat are being caught in the lower north Umpqua and upper main Umpqua but success is usually poor; summer steelhead angling is slow.

Orderly Downtown Areas Seen in Future

Chicago — (U.P.) — An expert on city development says the future of central business districts in many cities may depend largely on the orderly rearrangement of the downtown area.

J. D. Carroll Jr., discussed the problem in Public Management, monthly journal of the International City Managers' association.

Carroll, director of the Detroit Metropolitan Area study, said city officials must encourage the intensive use of existing commercial sites, and must make it easier for traffic and people to move within the downtown business districts.

Two major trends, increased automobile registrations and the postwar boom in suburban development, have magnified the problems of the central business district, Carroll said.

He said a study at Flint, Mich. showed that travel by automobile diminishes as cities increase in size, due to traffic congestion and travel distances.

But he said despite these factors, "the larger the city the greater the parking problem."

The study of Flint showed a "steady, relative decline in real property values in the central business district, especially in land values," Carroll said.

CAB Hearing Fails To Find Disaster Clue

Alameda, Calif. — (U.P.) — A two-day hearing called by the Civil Aeronautics Board to investigate the crash of a Transocean Air Lines DC-6 July 12 was recessed yesterday without turning up a clue to the disaster.

The plane crashed about 340 miles from Wake Island, killing 58 persons. It was en route from Guam to Oakland.

Writer Seeks Injunction Against Carmichael

Hollywood — (U.P.) — Writer Phil Rapp today demanded \$1,250,000 damages and a Superior court injunction restraining Hoagy Carmichael's "Saturday Night Review" television show. In a suit filed yesterday, Rapp charged that material from his old radio program was stolen by Carmichael's show.
