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At Highest Level In Past Four Years

Salem — (U.P.) — Summer-time unemployment is the highest in four years, the State Unemployment Commission said Saturday. Unemployment continued at well above recent summer periods despite increasing calls from late harvests, food processing plants and other seasonal lines.

Claims reported by local offices for the first week of August totaled 12,311, compared with 8,371 a year ago and 7,125 in 1951. New layoffs in plywood and furniture plants increased initial claims to 2,177, highest at this time for several years.

Third Highest July
Payments to those unable to find jobs last month were \$878,602, third highest July in the 16-year history of the law. Last year's figure was \$469,156 and in 1951 only \$358,130 was distributed among the unemployed.

The number of jobseekers reported from 26 local offices on Aug. 1 was 24,565, about 900 less than a month or two months ago. It was the highest at this period since 1949. Of the total 9,361 were women, an increase of 1,519 from June 1. Unfilled job openings also fell off, from 1,474 in July to 1,290 this month, lowest in four years.

20,000 File Claims
More than 20,000 persons have filed claims since the start of the 1953-54 benefit year July 1. First payments already have been made to more than half the

number. Both figures are about 30 per cent higher than a year ago. Of the 7,345 claimants receiving compensation during the last week of July 1,434 were logging and lumber, 1,339 from food processing and 497 in construction. Nearly half the total were from the four-county area around Portland. Salem and Eugene each had about nine per cent.

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FLUORIDATION OF DRINKING WATER IS INSANITY

DISEASE IN THE NEWS

FLUORIDATION OF DRINKING WATER DEFEATED IN SEATTLE

As we go to press, we are happy to report that the alerted and intelligent citizens of Seattle, warned by the president of the National Nutrition League, Inc., Dr. E. H. Bronner, Dr. E. H. Bronner, a manufacturing chemist of Los Angeles and chief opponent of fluoridation anywhere, Dr. Chas. T. Betts of Toledo, Ohio, Dr. Paul Manning of Springfield, Mass., and others, defeated the proposed fluoridation of drinking water in Seattle by a vote of 2 to 1. The figures showed 57,220 against and 44,814 for fluoridation.

Five mass meetings had been held, and truth and justice triumphed, despite bitter opposition and false propaganda coming from the Seattle Committee for Fluoridation. Pointing out that Seattle has one of the highest dental decay rates in the nation (in a 1950 survey, dentists found that half the teeth of the average high school senior were damaged by decay—15 teeth out of 28), this committee thought that simply by adding a small amount of fluoride to the water supply mechanically, Seattle's children could have attractive, decay-resistant teeth "just as if the fluoride occurred naturally." That committee, depending on the questionable approval of the American Dental Association and American Medical Association, tried to maintain that fluoridation is safe and declared in its unscientific circular that "the small amount of fluoride required to prevent dental decay has no injurious effect on the human body."

Dr. E. H. Bronner, who has been incensed over the people's gullibility in "falling for fluoridation" and worse, the traitorous culprits who urge fluoridation so as to destroy the American nation from within, gave the lie to the above statement when he wrote to the Acting Chief Chemist of the U.S. Pure Food and Drug Administration on February 27, 1952, as follows:

"You know that the natural, organic, calcium-fluoro-phosphate in 'the town without a toothache' (Hereford, Texas) due to its peculiar water and vegetation, is 100 per cent edible and 100 per cent digestible and 100 per cent beneficial to help build, rebuild and harden all of our bones, gums and teeth, in grown-ups and children, all the time, in all proportions and in all people."

"You know that this 100 per cent edible, calcium-fluoro-phosphate is the exact opposite of the 100 per cent inedible, rat poison sodium fluoride and sodium silico fluoride as shipped interstate today and placed in the drinking water of over 140 American cities to allegedly 'fill the pores and harden the enamel of teeth.'"

"Yet you know that the tremendous affinity of unsaturated fluorine for calcium is what kills the rat, by not only filling the pores and hardening of its baby teeth, but by disturbing all calcium metabolism, filling the pores and cumulatively hardening all our organs in that same degree and for that same scientific reason!"

The treasurer, Heber Gwilym, of the NATIONAL NUTRITION LEAGUE, Inc., 903 Third Avenue, Box A-442, Seattle 4, Wash., whose purpose it is to study, practice and teach natural living, agreed with Dr. Bronner. Just before the vote was in, that citizen wrote to Dr. Bronner: "... You are doing a grand work in your fearless expose of everything that is crooked and sinister to soften the brains and bodies of all people! I feel sure the voters will defeat this dastardly plan which any child could see through, that poison in any quantity is poison, and that poison is good only to kill rats and remove other obnoxious conditions amongst us!"

Dr. Roy Lee, D.D.S., Director of the Los Angeles Foundation for Nutritional Research, 2023 W. Wisconsin Ave., Milwaukee 3, Wisconsin, is an authority in bio-chemistry, and also is very emphatic in his condemnation of the fluoridation of a public water supply. He states that fluorine is a cumulative poison, one effect of which is the hardening of the bones, particularly in older people. He reveals: "If older people suffer a twenty per cent increase in hip or leg fractures resulting from the increased intake of fluorine, their agony and loss of time can never be repaired or explained by an evasive dental group, who see only a few holes in teeth and seem not at all concerned as to what happens to the rest of the body."

The small town of Clinton, Iowa, recently grappled with the same problem of fluoridation, but due to a widespread Citizens Group Against Fluoridation, again the efforts of Dr. Bronner who made a hasty trip to Clinton from his California office at 447 So. Hope St., Los Angeles, to give his devastating testimony against fluoridation, and because of the exemplary action in Seattle, it was defeated in that community also. In an excellent, convincing circular published by the Clinton group and headed: FLUORIDATION OF DRINKING WATER IS A CRIMINAL ACT, we read this unanswerable argument:

"They have only one reason which they can tell you for putting fluoride in the community water supply and that is the children's teeth. We have SEVEN REASONS WHY IT SHOULD NOT BE PUT IN, namely:

- (1) It is a deadly poison.
- (2) It is accumulative in the system.
- (3) It will injure other parts of the body.
- (4) It causes fluorosis (mottling of the teeth which never comes off).
- (5) It is against the Constitution of the United States.
- (6) Communism is one of the factors behind it.
- (7) We have enough poisons in our foods now without putting an extra dose in our drinking water."

Dr. T. M. Schippell, editor of the Herald of Health and Naturopath, agrees with that condemnation, and in her editorial titled BEWARE OF THE POISON—FLUORINE, appearing in the October 1951 issue of her publication, she further explains: "... cities and towns everywhere are menaced by moronic scientists who are carrying this new fluoride banner. Many communities have succumbed to their arguments and this poison is being dumped into their reservoirs, and unless strong efforts are made by the suffering laymen everywhere this insane pseudo-scientific poisoning spree will continue indefinitely."

"Remember that Inorganic fluorine is not utilized in the human digestive system—it is a poison and should be so labeled. The fluorine that acts as a catalytic agent in the body and hardens the enamel of the teeth is not an inorganic fluorine... The fluorine that hardens teeth was, at one time, an inorganic fluorine but it has been altered in character by the bacteria in the soil which changed inorganic fluorine into organic fluorine so that it may be utilized by plants as plant food. That organic fluorine which you get in large quantities from many food sources—particularly from pistachio nuts—is the only kind of fluorine that can have a beneficial effect upon tooth enamel. The inorganic fluorine—coming in contact with the teeth—makes brown spots upon them and actually destroys the enamel. And all scientists know that fact..."

You folks took that proposition lying down and it is now so deeply bedded that it will take a veritable earthquake of public wrath before it is uprooted.
