Mrs. James Douglas, who moved from Medford to Klamath Falls last week, attended the luncheon and meeting as a new member of the Klamath Falls club.

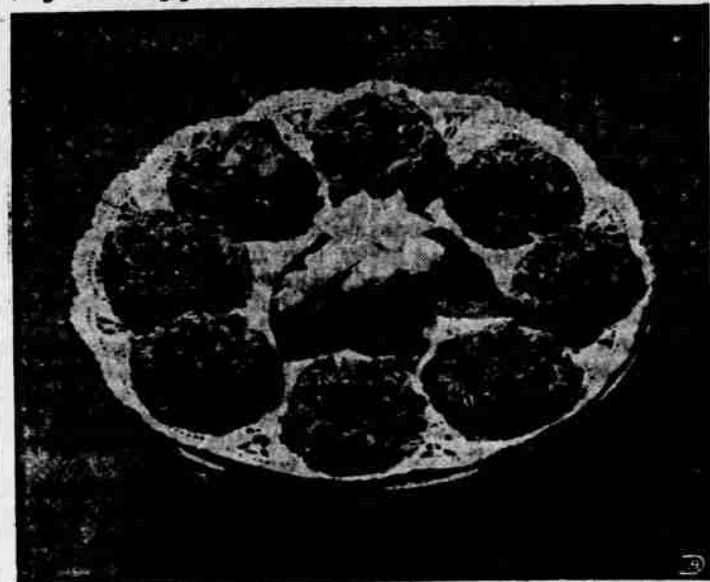

PINEAPPLE CRUNCHIES

1 (No. 2) can of crushed pineapple
1 1/2 cups sifted flour
1 teaspoon soda
1/4 cup butter or margarine
1/2 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup granulated sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 1/2 cups corn flakes

Drain pineapple; reserve syrup. Sift flour and soda together. Cream butter and sugar, add flour mixture, vanilla and 1 tablespoon of pineapple syrup. Press into balls, 1 1/4 inches in diameter. Place on cookie sheet and make an indentation in each with thumb or thimble. Fill with crushed pineapple and sprinkle with walnuts. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) about 20 minutes. Yield: 2 1/2 dozen.

NOTE: Store uncovered.

Oak Grove School Opens September 1

Oak Grove school will open Tuesday, Sept. 1, it was announced Saturday.

An expected increase in enrollment will necessitate shifting of classroom assignments and teaching loads. Grades one through four will register in the newer class wing, grades six through eight will register in the main class structure, with grade five students registering in the library.

Classes will run until 2:15 p.m. the first day. The cafeteria will be open with student meal prices set at 20 cents.

Children entering the first grade must present birth certificates or proof of birth at the time of registration. First graders who have not yet had a physical examination should do so before registering.

The school district does not maintain transportation facilities for students.

Rudnick Named in \$1,300,000 Suit

Bakersfield — A hearing was held last week in California's Kern county on a \$1,300,000 suit against Oscar Rudnick, multi-millionaire cattleman, with holdings near Grants Pass, Ore.

The suit was brought by Albert and Marvin Hayutin, members of the Ecclesiastical Society of Christ's Church of the Golden Rule, who charge that Rudnick failed to comply with an oral agreement to pay them \$300,000 for aid in purchasing a piece of property from the church.

The suit alleged that with the aid of the brothers, Rudnick was able to buy a 4,000-acre ranch in southern Oregon, which is valued at \$700,000.

Chapter 10

Mr. Thornton who published a diary of his trip through the Applegate cut-off describes Tlamath Lake as an immense meadow surrounded by mountains. He said that it was mostly grass except where Tlamath River spread out in a marsh. There were many weeds poking out of the dull water and the trail led straight up and over Siskia mountain, which was on the South side of the lake. All one day was spent in making this ascent, for it was necessary to use eighteen yoke of oxen to pull each wagon to the top. He mentions crossing lava beds and after days of travel finally reaching pine trees and streams. They camped at Lewis Springs. As they pulled their way to the summit they found it was necessary to discard a great many of their family treasures for the oxen seemed too feeble to continue with such heavy loads. At last they turned and looked their last at Tlamath Lake, glad to be finished with that dreary part of the trail. That night as they camped in a valley filled with good pasture and a sweet stream, they were surrounded by Indian signal fires. Afraid to stay for a much needed rest they pushed on into a deep forest. During this part of the journey, Mr. Thornton becomes almost incoherent for he felt responsible for his party, he was terrified of the Indians and the fear of starvation; and he was obsessed by his "betrayal" by Jesse Applegate. Day after day their misfortunes multiplied. Oxen died, the children became sick, water was scarce, and food almost non-existent. Also it was October and the nights were freezing. Almost overcome by despair they suddenly noticed the ground was dropping, the trees were thinning, and they came down into the valley of the Rogue. Following a creek across the lush valley they pushed on toward the Table Rock. Instead of waiting for the oxen and people to gain new strength and courage, Mr. Thornton became almost frenzied in his demands to keep the wagon train moving. They crossed the Rogue, just below the Table Rock where the water was three feet deep and about five hundred feet wide and flowing rapidly. As far as we can judge they crossed just below Gold Ray dam where Table Rock Estates are now being settled, almost a hundred years later.
