Jack Burk Takes Lead In Tourney

Fort Wayne, Ind. — (U.P.) — Jack Burk Jr., a transplanted Texan playing out of Kiamasha Lake, N. Y., fired a blistering eight-under-par 64 Saturday for a one-stroke lead after three rounds of the \$15,000 Fort Wayne Open Golf championship.

Tied for fourth place at the halfway mark, Burk knocked in putts from all corners to turn in identical nine-hole scores of 32 for a 54-hole total of 198—18 under par.

Burk collected seven birdies, an eagle and one bogey, and parred the other nine holes. He eagled the par five 479-yard ninth, en route to the best round of the entire day.

G. Jantzer Set For Shootoff in Grand American

Vandalia, O. — (U.P.) — Jack S. King, a plastering contractor from Greensboro, N. C., broke 98 out of 100 clay targets Saturday to win the grand American preliminary handicap trapshoot.

This was one of two events for the day in the 54th annual grand American handicap tournament which is bringing shotguns here from all sections of North America for nine days.

King fired from the 21-yard marker. He missed his fourth and fifth birds, and then shattered the next 95 straight to take the match.

Four scattergunners tied for runnerup honors by blasting 97 pigeons.

Charles Altendorf of Columbus, O., shooting from the 19-yardline, won the shootoff by breaking all 25 extra targets. Also competing were George A. Graham of Winona, Minn., J. B. Nicodemus of Pataaska, O., and Robert J. Lambert of Chicago, who finished in that order in the extra round.

Eight men broke 100 birds in the 16-yard event, and the shootoff will be held this morning.

Those getting perfect scores from the closest point to the traphouse were Harvey L. Rozman of Upper Sandusky, O.; George L. Jantzer of Medford, Ore.; O. B. Milligan of Coos Bay, Ore.; Ernest Jelley of Kansas City, Mo.; H. M. McNeil of Pro-

pect, O.; Everett T. Reed Sr., of Lewes, Del.; T. O. Bancroft of Munroe, La.; D. A. Flawelling of Harvey, Ill., and Homer Clark of Alton, Ill. Flawelling's shooting will not count in the extra firing because he is a professional, while the shoot is for amateurs.

Vancouver Nine Wins Little Loop Championships

Santa Monica, Calif. — (U.P.) — Vancouver, B. C., won the region 8 Little League baseball championship Saturday with a 1 to 0 victory over Santa Maria, Calif., as George Munro and Brain McAloney combined to pitch a no hit, no run game.

The Canadian club, the second from that country to win a Little League regional crown, goes to Williamsport, Pa., for the national championships Aug. 26. Montreal entered the national playoffs last year.

Munro hurled a perfect game for five and two-thirds innings before he lost control, walking two batters and flinging a wild pitch that allowed base runners to advance to second and third.

McAloney, however, went in to retire the side and save the game for Munro.

Vancouver scored its winning tally in the second. Jim Olafson singled to left, and continued on to second when left fielder Bert Douglas grounded out and scored on Keith Watson's single.

Santa Maria finished in second place in the regional playoffs.

In a double playoff for third place, Seattle defeated Oroville, Calif., 4 to 0 and downed Pomona, Calif., 23 to 3 after the Pomona nine tripped Imperial Valley, Calif., 3 to 2 in an extra inning game.
