Bradford Hurls
Seals To 3-0
Win Over Solons

San Francisco — (U.P.) — Bill Bradford hurred the San Francisco Seals to a 3-0 victory over Sacramento Saturday before a Pacific Coast League crowd of 1366.

Bradford and losing pitcher Marino Pieretti both turned in five hitters but the Seals couldn't get any runs for little Chico off the Seal right hander, who cruised to his third straight triumph.

San Francisco grabbed a two-run lead in the second inning. Frank Kalin went to first when he was hit by a pitched ball, then trundled around to third as Reno Cheso singled on the hit and run play. After George Vico popped up, Leo Righetti singled to score Kalin with the first run. Cheso came in when Nini Torrey's bouncer squirted through third baseman Eddie Bockman's legs for an error.

Pieretti then turned in five hitless innings until the eighth. At that point, Righetti singled to left, advanced on Bradford's sacrifice and scored on Jim Morgan's single.

Vico was kicked out of the game in the second by Umpire Ed Runge when the burly Seal first baseman hurled his bat about 40 feet into the air after popping out. The mace bounced off the railing along the first base line but no one was in the way.

Bradford now has a mark of 8-7 while Pieretti's record is 10-12.



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American Net
Aces Defeat
Australians

Newport, R.I. — (U.P.) — Vic Seixas and Tony Trabert swept into the singles final at the Newport invitation tennis championships Saturday with straight set triumphs as United States players cracked Australia's two-year domination of the oldest of American tournaments.

Seixas, the Wimbledon champion from Philadelphia, defeated Ham Richardson, Baton Rouge, La., 6-2, 7-5, 6-4, and Trabert of Cincinnati ousted Australian champion Ken Rosewall, 6-3, 6-3, 8-6, in the semi-finals. Seixas and Trabert meet today for the title.

Richardson, the National Collegiate champion from Tulane university, bowed to Seixas but not before he touched off a victorious day for the Americans. Trailing Lew Hoad, Australia's other 18-year-old star, two sets to one when rain halted their quarter-final contest Friday Richardson played brilliantly to complete a 6-2, 3-6, 4-6, 6-1, 6-3 victory Saturday morning when the match was resumed.

America hasn't had a representative in the singles final of this ancient grass court tournament since Ted Schroeder beat Art Larsen in an all-California title round in 1930. Frank Sedgman beat Aussie team mate Mervyn Rose in the 1951 final and whipped another of his countrymen, Ken McGregor, for the 1952 crown.

Hollywood Tips
Portland, 4-3
In 13 Innings

Hollywood — (U.P.) — Monty Basgall's single scored Bob Bundy from third in the 13th inning Saturday to give the Hollywood Stars a 4 to 3 Pacific Coast League victory over Portland.

The league-leading Stars rallied for two runs in the eighth inning to send the game into extra innings. In the 13th, Bundy singled, moved to third on a sacrifice and an infield out, and scored on Basgall's single.

Red Lynn, fourth Hollywood pitcher, got credit for his ninth win against four losses. Red Adams, who relieved Portland starter Glenn Elliott in the eighth, lost his ninth verdict against eight wins.

Lee Walls opened the scoring for Hollywood with a homer in the first. Herm Reich's single that scored Fletcher Robb, who doubled, tied the game for the Beavers in the fourth. Portland took a two-run lead in the sixth when it loaded the bags on singles by Robb, Bob Marquitz, and Aaron Robinson, and Don Eggert then came through with a two-run single.

Gene Handley homered in the eighth for Hollywood, and the Stars scored the tying run when Bundy was safe on a fielder's choice, moved to third on Jack Phillips' double, and tallied when Eddie Basinski erred on Dale Long's grounder.

East German Union
Asks Sweeping Purge

Berlin — (U.P.) — The East German Communist trade union Saturday demanded a sweeping purge of its leaders designed to crush what it described as "an underground" responsible for widespread strikes in Germany's Soviet occupied zone.

Herbert Warnke, leader of the Free German Trade Union Federation, speaking at a meeting of the union's board of governors in East Berlin, ordered the union to oust those responsible for a strike of more than 300,000 East Germans against the Red regime.

Angels Trounce
Padres, 11-4
With 18 Hits

San Diego, Calif. — (U.P.) — The Los Angeles Angels slammed out 18 hits Saturday to beat San Diego 11 to 4 as they clinched the game early with a six-run rally in the fourth inning.

None of the Angel hits went for extra bases.

Bob Spicer hurled steady ninth hit ball to gain his 10th decision against eight losses. Theophil Smith, who was relieved with one out in the first by Al Benton, was charged with his 16th loss. He has won 11.

The Angels got three runs in the first frame on singles by Bob Talbot, Les Peden and Frankie Di Prima and an error by third baseman Frank Murray, whose two errors in the ninth led to two more Angel runs.

In the second, singles by Fred Richards, Gene Baker and Peden accounted for another Angel run. Benton was knocked out of the box in the fourth when the Angels scored six times.

Spicer led off with a single and he scored on a walk to Richards and Bob Usher's single.

Baker was walked to load the bases and Peden's third straight hit scored two runs. Dick Smith walked and Murray Franklin singled in two runs to continue the hit-and-run barrage. Spicer, coming up for the second time in the inning, singled to score the sixth run.

Earl Rapp clouted a two-run homer for San Diego in the ninth, after he had doubled in one Padre run in the sixth.

LaStarza Down
To 192 Pounds

Greenwood Lake, N.Y. — (U.P.) — Roland LaStarza, who will challenge Champion Rocky Marciano of Brockton, Mass., for the world heavyweight title on Sept. 24, weighed 192 pounds Saturday after sparring four rounds. He expects to weigh between 188 and 190 for the Polo Grounds fight.

LaStarza, who is trying to sharpen his left hook, boxed two rounds apiece with Keene Simmons of Bayonne, N.J., and Tommy Carrion of New York. The challenger has sparred 23 rounds since he began strenuous training six days ago.

Tuzo Portuguese Upsets

Milwaukee — (U.P.) — Tuzo Portuguese of Costa Rica upset Jesse Turner of St. Louis Saturday night when he slammed his way to a unanimous 10-round decision at the Milwaukee auditorium.

Portuguez was penalized in the fifth and ninth rounds for low punching but the Costa Rican middleweight hit harder and more often to overpower Turner.

Portuguez outweighted Turner by six pounds, going into the ring at 159½ to Turner's 153½.
