The exhibit boards were made of plywood and were donated to us by Timber Products company.

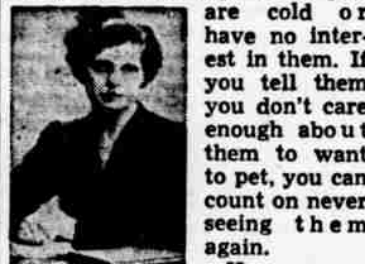

Lumber Yard Suffers

\$150,000 Fire Damage

The Dalles — (U.P.) — Loss in a week end fire which destroyed the Linn Lumber company mill near Pine Grove was estimated today at \$150,000.

Flames broke out Saturday morning and gutted the mill and shops in about one hour. Some 60 men kept the blaze from spreading to nearby homes.

Loss of the mill was estimated at \$100,000 and the lumber at \$50,000.

Apostolic Faith Sets Brownsboro Services

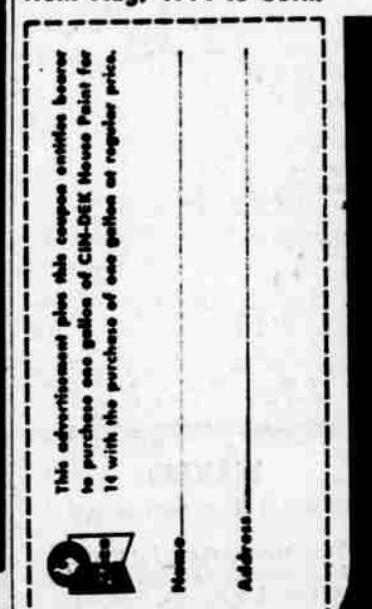
