### Rotary Club To Cooperate With Foreign Policy Group

Medford Rotary club, through its interservice committee, will in the future act as a clearing house in this area for the Foreign policy association, a nationwide organization.

This step was agreed upon at a meeting of citizens Friday noon at the Jackson hotel, after the group had heard a talk by Roger Mastrude, San Francisco, regional director of FPA. After Mr. Mastrude had outlined the purpose and functions of FPA, discussions indicated that formation of another organization here was opposed by those present, but there was felt to be a need for the information and material available through FPA.

Following a suggestion by Mrs. Justin Smith that a clearing house for FPA's material would serve the purpose, at least for the present, President Frank Van Dyke of Rotary club offered the aid of that civic group. Rotary's interservice committee is headed by Jack Creager.

Outlining the purpose of FPA, Mr. Mastrude said, "Each citizen must do his own thinking on governmental problems. He must be informed and be in a position to make his thinking known to his government and to the state department."

Mr. Mastrude spoke of the formation of the Foreign Policy association of New York 15 years ago to provide facts on foreign policy to citizens, and of its spread throughout the country. The association is now in the process of reorganizing on a national basis, he said, since its activities are no longer confined to New York.

Councils have been formed in many areas, the speaker said. He stressed that these are non-partisan, are always a representative group of citizens, and that their main purpose is "to educate the citizen." Speaking of adult education, Mr. Mastrude said "you cannot pour information into a brain like water through a funnel. We learn more by participation in a project."

Mr. Mastrude said councils throughout the country used round-tables, forums, radio forums, study groups, speakers and other means to disseminate facts to the citizenry. He described FPA as a "loose federation of councils throughout the nation."

Jennings Pierce, president of Jackson County Chamber of Commerce, presided and introduced the FPA director. Attending were Miss Mabel Nye, Frank Van Dyke, the Rev. Shelly Anglemeyer, Elliott Becken, Don McNeil, Elmo Stevenson, Mrs. Justin Smith, Leonard Carpenter and Mrs. Bren H. Starcher.

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## Officials Count Dead In Morocco Rioting

Rabat, Morocco — (U.P.) — Officials feared today the death toll in the riots that followed the sultan's refusal to abdicate would rise above the 38 mark. They said that at Oudja where 18 persons died in street clashes, Arabs were seen carting away their dead.

Latest toll for the two days of street fighting showed that 12 persons also had been killed in Casablanca, seven in the oasis town of Marrakech and one in Rabat.

Many of the dead were European police who attempted to quell the Nationalist supporters of Sultan Mohammed Ben Youssef, who defied the attempts of the Pasha of Marrakech to de-throne him.

## Three Repatriated War Prisoners Return

Travis AFB, Calif. — (U.P.) — Three more repatriated American war prisoners returned to the United States today aboard a Military Air Transport service DC-6 hospital plane.

The plane, also carrying 30 routine air evacuees, landed at Travis, near San Francisco, at 8:15 a.m. (PST) following a nine-hour flight from Hickam field, Hawaii.

The ex-prisoners aboard the plane were Sgt. Julio Torre, Key West, Fla.; Pfc. Samuel Banuelos, Fresno, Calif., and Cpl. Clyde Hill, Joplin, Mo.

Hill is on emergency leave to go to the bedside of his seriously ill father, Roy Hill of Joplin.

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
