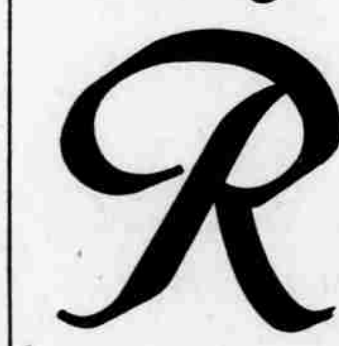

Bob Hope's Sunday Performance Banned

Leicester, England — (U.P.) — Leicester's city fathers have decided to ban a scheduled performance by American comedian Bob Hope Sunday, Sept. 13, rather than lock horns with Britain's powerful Lord's Day Observance Society, it was reported today.

As a result, Hope will open his English tour Sept. 14 at the London Palladium.

The Leicester city corporation said it barred Hope on the advice of counsel that the performance might violate Britain's Sunday entertainment act and irritate the Lord's Day Observance Society.

McNary Dam Power To Flow December 1

Walla Walla — (U.P.) — The first electrical energy from McNary dam will flow over Bonneville Power Administration lines Dec. 1, Col. F. S. Tandy, Walla Walla district Army engineer, said today.

Tandy said navigation locks at the dam would be closed throughout September and October so that gate sills may be changed.

He said the level of the lake behind the dam would be raised to 335 feet above sea level by November. Maximum level is 340 feet.

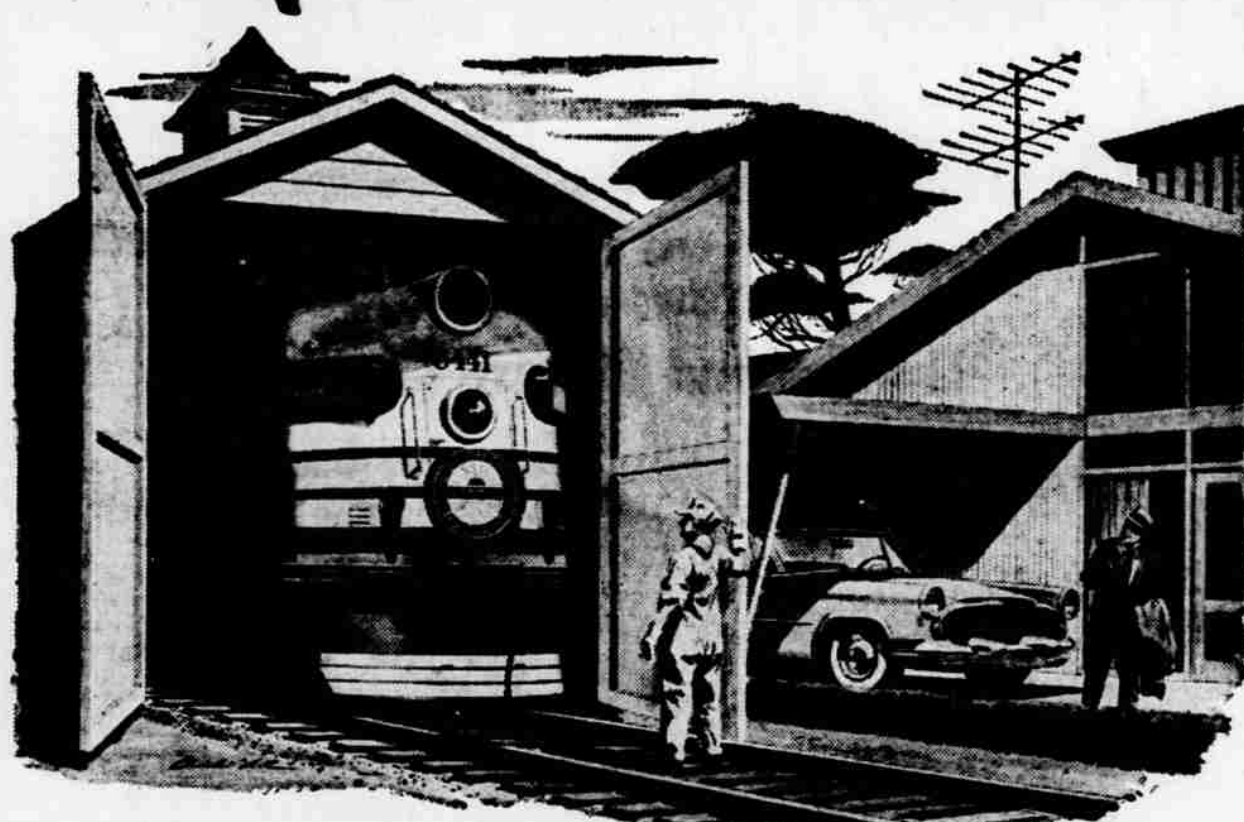
