New York — (UPI) — Brooklyn was ready for the "big kill" today and Charley Dressen, the chipper skipper, ordered a smorgasbord of Florida crab fingers for the celebration.

It may not come off, because the Giants could upset the plans even though Dressen still insists—dramatically but ungrammatically—that "the giants is dead."

"If we beat the Giants that makes it 11 in a row for us and a new high for the year," Dressen said after last night's 5-2 triumph in 11 innings over the Pirates.

Happy Boss
Dressen was elated because the Pirates, who had come to life briefly on the fine knuckleball pitching of Johnny Lindell, blew a 2-0 lead when Duke Snider homered in the ninth to tie the score, then lost in the 11th when Gil Hodges smacked a three-run homer.

The victory, which equaled a previous Dodger winning string of 10 games in a row, put them 8 1/2 games ahead of idle Milwaukee and gave them a chance to pull away if they can keep up their pace of last week when they swept a three-game series with the Giants. The Giants have just come out of three straight double-headers and are expected to be a little weary.

Yanks on Top
The Yankees also were riding high and stretched their lead over the idle White Sox to nine games with 10-3 and 9-0 triumphs at Philadelphia. In the opener, Whitey Ford pitched his 15th victory with relief help from Tom Gorman as the Yankees made 11 hits including a two-run homer by Yogi Berra.

In the second game, lefty Bob Kuzava, making his first start since his one-hitter against the White Sox on August 8, scattered 11 hits to win his fourth game.

The Phils topped the Giants 5-2 on a four-run rally in the eighth plus nine-hit route-job pitching by Bob Miller, but New York took the second game 6-0 as Al Corwin turned in an eight-hitter for his sixth victory.

There were no other games scheduled.

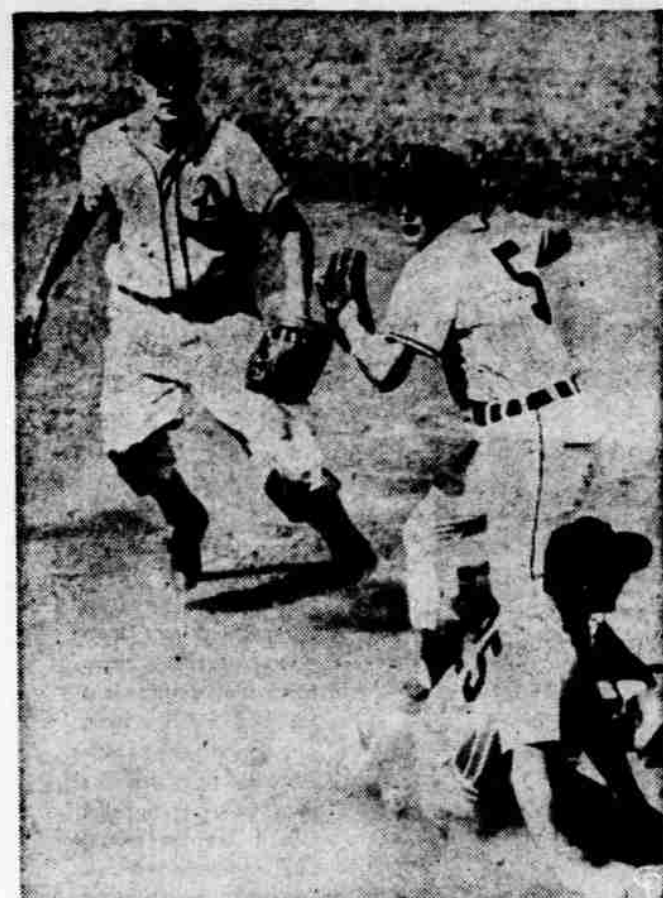

Shrine All-Star Gridiron Squads Both Boast Speed

Portland — (UPI) — Sideline "experts" today rated the Shrine football game here Saturday night a "tossup."

The city team held only a single drill yesterday while the state squad took two workouts. Both teams scrimmaged in the afternoon with the state squad concentrating on its ground attack and the city team on its passing game.

Don Bick of Marshfield and Allie Clark of Oakridge, worked out for the first time yesterday for the state's and both appeared in good condition. They replaced players sidelined by injuries.

Portland — With both squads boasting speed and passing, the sixth annual Shrine All-Star football game — "football's finest hour" — here Saturday night in Multnomah stadium is expected to be one of the most thrilling contests in the young but action-packed history of the grid classic.

The game pits outstanding 1953 prep stars of Portland high schools against the top high performers from all other schools in Oregon. Pete Susick of Marshfield high is head coach of the State squad and Harry

Scarff of Portland's Central Catholic directs the Portland eleven.

The kick-off will be preceded by the largest pageant ever staged in Multnomah stadium, starting at 7:40 p.m. Chet Duncan, pageant director, reports that approximately 50 units, including bands and marching teams, will take part in the spectacle, to be climaxed by the massed bands playing the national anthem.

The State All-Stars will enter the contest with a 3 to 2 edge in the series, having won the opener in 1948, 53-13, and the last two by scores of 20-13 and 12-6. The Portland aggregation captured the games in 1949 and 1950 and will be out to even the series this year.

The two teams have been in Portland since August 9, drilling twice daily for the contest, and because both coaches have placed so much emphasis on passing in the workouts, it's a foregone conclusion that the air will be filled with pigskins when the teams square off.

Quarterback Quincy Powers of Marshfield high and Milt Michau of The Dalles are the Staters ace throwers, while the Portland team will depend on two of the finest passers to come out of the city league in many years — Bob Clark of Benson Polytechnic and Ron Stempel of Cleveland.

Proceeds from the game will go to the Shriners' hospital for crippled children in Portland, and will be used to assist in financing the expansion program now on the drawing boards.

Cards, Rams Prepare for Oregon Mix

Portland — Northwest football fans, who got their first glimpse of professional football last year and liked what they saw, will watch the gridiron greats in action again September 7 when the Los Angeles Rams clash with the Chicago Cardinals here at Multnomah Stadium.

This is a rematch of the spectacular game played last year by the same teams, when the Rams wound up with a 24 to 14 victory.

Both teams are ready to embark on their pre-season schedules, and by the time they reach Portland they will have had several games in which to reach peak form.

The Cardinal roster was bolstered this week with the addition of three standouts who joined the squad following the College All-Star game in Chicago. They are Johnny Olszewski of California, Jim Psaltis of USC and Dale Samuels of Purdue, the top three draft choices.

Oregonians Shine
Word from the Cardinal training camp at Lake Forest, Ill., indicates that two former Oregonians have been the standout rookies in practice. Coach Joe Stydahar recently singled out End Jim Cordial of Oregon State and Guard Emmett Williams of Oregon for their work in an intra-squad game and said they will both see action against the Rams.

The Rams, working at Redlands, Cal., have defeated two service teams so far this year. With Quarterback Norm Van Brocklin, ex-University of Oregon All-American, ready for his greatest year the Ram passing attack will be stronger than ever.

In addition to the veteran standout pass receivers, Tom Fears and Elroy "Crazy-Legs" Hirsch, Van has a new throwing target in Ed Barker of Washington State.

Many Coast League Stars Never Get Shot At Major Leagues, Too Old For Try Now

San Francisco — (UPI) — The aim of all baseball players is to become a star in the Major Leagues.

But many of the stars shining in the Pacific Coast League today never have had a chance at the big time, and they are too old to ever get one.

The best example is the case of Joe Brovia, always one of the top hitters in the PCL in the past war years. Currently Joe, playing for the Sacramento Solons, is third in the batting race with a .328 mark. He has batted at better than a .400 clip for the past two months and always has been considered by pitchers one of the most feared batsmen in the loop.

Brovia Disappointed
"But I've never had a chance to swing a bat in the Major Leagues," says the disappointed Brovia. "I know I could hit that pitching if I just got a chance. It is one of the great heartbreaks of my career."

Now 31 years old, it is doubtful that Joe ever will get a shot.

Brovia, of course, is only one of many. Take the case of Ray Orteig, catcher for the Seattle Rainiers. "Orteig should get a crack at the majors," says Manager Bobby Bragan of the Hollywood Stars, a backstop himself. "He probably is the most valuable member of the Seattle club, and possibly the most valuable player in the league."

All Star Nine
But Ray's chances are slim, too, because he already is 32 years old. Neither of these men has had any chance to play in the majors.

Along with catcher Orteig and outfielder Brovia, here are seven others over 30 years of age who never had a fair trial in the majors who would complete a team:

Al Lien, 37, San Francisco, pitcher; Chuck Stevens, 35, Hollywood, first base; Piper Davis, 37, Oakland, second base; Gene Handley, 37, Hollywood, third base; Artie Wilson, 33, Seattle, shortstop; Frank Kelleher, 37, Hollywood, and Frank Kalin, 32, San Francisco, outfielders.
