

Irish, Spartans Draw Penalties From NCAA; Temple State Hit Hard

Chicago — (U.P.) — Three new schools were subjected to NCAA punishment today with two of them, Notre Dame and Michigan State, suffering penalty chiefly through publicity.

Height of Dam Raised by People of Hines, Burns

Portland — Delinquent lake at the southern end of the Ochoco National forest in northern Harney county has been given a new lease on life as a result of a cooperative project recently completed.

The townspeople of Hines and Burns, the Hines Lumber company, the Isaacs Walton league chapter at Burns, and the local Girl Scout organization, with the assistance of the United States Forest Service, combined their efforts to successfully complete one of the most outstanding cooperative projects of its kind ever undertaken in this state.

The project, involving raising the height of the dam at Delinquent lake, was commenced on July 3 and completed on July 12. Some 6,000 yards of dirt were added to the old dam to raise the height approximately eight feet.

Purpose of the operation was to create a greater water area and depth in Delinquent lake in an attempt to overcome the serious winter-kill problem at the lake. In prolonged, severe winters, the fish suffocate under the ice and snow cover through lack of oxygen. It is hoped that the greater volume of water will provide sufficient oxygen to enable the fish to survive the winters.

The total cost of the project was slightly over \$547.00, most of which was fuel and food. All money was obtained by public subscription and donation.

Delinquent lake is a phenomenally productive body of water, although relatively small in size. If the project is successful in eliminating winter kill, the lake will prove to be an even more popular fishing spot than it is at the present, Game Commission officials said.

gether with Arizona State of Tempe, were revealed yesterday as the culprits in the 1953 action of the policy making council to enforce the NCAA athletic code.

Arizona State, least prominent of the trio, was handed the stiffest penalty, two years probation and banishment of athletes and teams in all sports from national tournament for the next school year.

Notre Dame and Michigan State were subjected only to written rebuke, but NCAA officials believed that the publicity of their cases would cause them the greatest anguish.

Objections were forthcoming almost immediately from Notre Dame, where vice-president Rev. Edmund P. Joyce said the NCAA could have "more profitably" dealt with "many areas of really serious abuses" at other schools.

The penalty was levied against Arizona State for payment to athletes for participation in sports, for tryouts of athletes, and for actions of the Sun Angel Foundation, an alumni group in the Phoenix area which from 1949 through 1952 contributed approximately \$79,600 to the college.

Arizona State agreed to abide by the NCAA ruling. But the school's president, Grady Gammage, said the college feels the matter on which the association based its decision was submitted by "prejudiced sources."

Gammage complained of not having an opportunity to confront witnesses. He admitted infractions of regulations and said the college has put its house in order and will see that it stays that way.

Notre Dame was reprimanded for trying out athletes and Michigan State for tryouts and receiving funds from an outside source.

Sage Grouse Hunt Opens August 22

Portland — Oregon's first general hunting season of 1953 is due to get under way August 22. Running concurrently with the limited antelope hunt, the sage grouse season will extend from August 22 to 27.

Though the bag limit has been lowered from last year and the length of the season decreased, hunters will be able to pursue the large-sized grouse over a larger area than in 1952.

The bag limit for this year is two birds per day and not over four during the entire season or in possession.

Open areas include all of Harney county and that portion of Malheur county south of U. S. Highway 20. Portions of Lake, Crook, and Deschutes counties are also opened.

Hunters should consult the hunting synopsis for descriptions of the open areas of these three counties.

Population of Waterfowl High In West Canada

Winnipeg, Man. — Waterfowl population of western Canada's prairie region probably is slightly less than that of August, 1952, but overall population remains at a high level. Chief losers apparently have been mallard and pintail species, the latter in particular suffering nesting losses through adverse breeding weather in May and June.

These salient facts headline the current issue of the Ducks Unlimited "Duckological," prepared by Chief Naturalist Bert W. Cartwright. Up-to-the-minute material for the report was garnered in a 2,000 mile observation of prairie waterfowl conditions.

Well Distributed First-hand observations revealed "a healthy, well distributed population through Saskatchewan and southern Alberta." It showed numerous late broods of all species except Mallard and Pintail. These early nesting

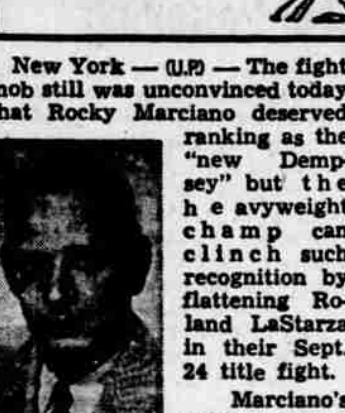

less payday for the old gent stepping down.

TAGS MAILED Portland — Antelope tags are being mailed to four hundred lucky people in Oregon following the drawing held last week by the Game Commission.

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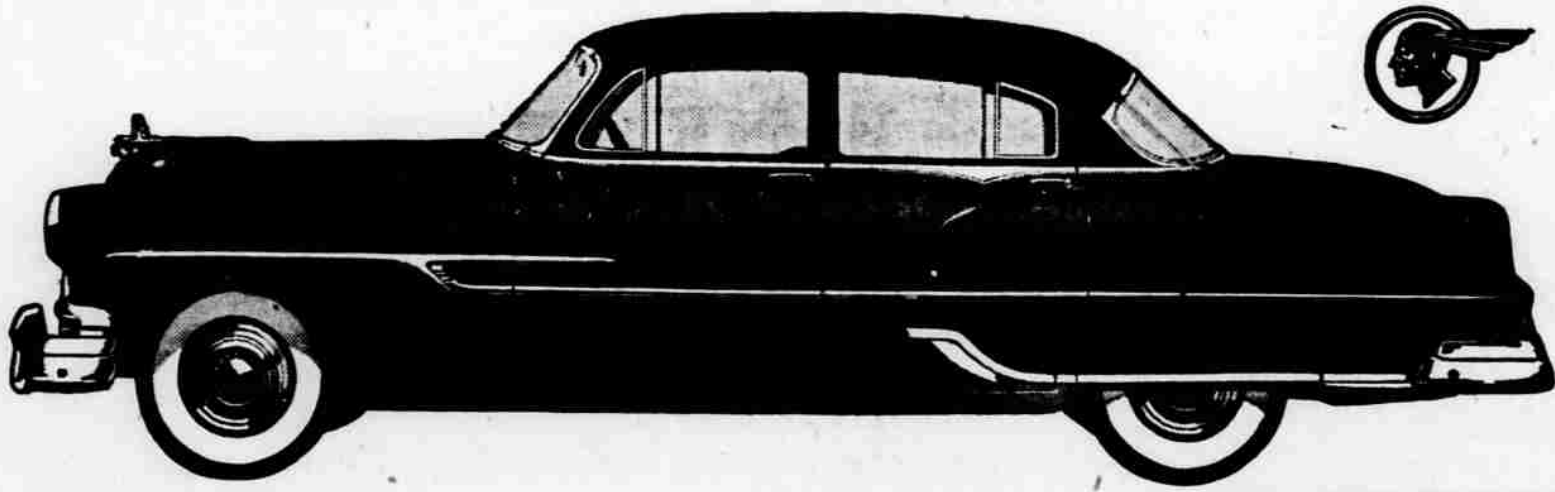


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
