ADA Attacks Power Policy; Labor Joins In Voicing Objection

Washington—(U.P.)—Americans for Democratic Action today called the Eisenhower administration's new power policy "a shocking example of this administration's subordination of the public to private interests."

At the same time, the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association said the new policy is "an abdication in effect of most of the government's long established power policy of assuming primary responsibility" for the rural electrification program.

To Curtail Participation

Undersecretary of Interior Ralph A. Tudor announced Tuesday that the government had decided to curtail federal participation in power development.

Valley Man Named Appaloosa Group National Director

Phoenix—Calvin W. Briley, local owner and breeder of Appaloosa horses last week was elected as a two-year director for the National Appaloosa Horse Club. A national Appaloosa horse show was held in connection with the meeting, held at Quincy, Calif. R. L. Peckinpaugh, Yuba City, Calif., was elected president.

Briley's three-year-old stallion, "Bub" placed first in his class in breeding class competition at the show. Entries in breeding classes totalled 96 and included horses from seven western states.

This was the sixth annual national Appaloosa Horse show, the club being comparatively new. The club was formed through interest of a few persons in preserving the Appaloosa horse.

Shady Cove Schools Will Open Sept. 3

Shady Cove—Classes at Shady Cove school district 89 will begin Sept. 3, and the first day of school will be a half day, according to R. A. Mullen, principal.

First grade children must have birth certificates with them when they register, and must have had their physical examinations, Mullen said.

Part time instrumental instruction will be offered this year. Teachers this year will be, first grade, Grace Bigham; second grade, Doretha Crowley; third grade, Frances Henry; fourth and fifth grades, Noreen Conway; sixth grade, Anne Briggs; seventh grade, R. A. Mullen, and eighth grade, Agnes Brown. Mullen has been elected the new principal.

ADA, an independent "liberal" political organization, said this will permit private interests to "get a strangle-hold on power development and distribution."

Open Desertion
ADA said the policy represents an "open desertion of the principle of development of the nation's resources for the nation's people."

It said it also will result in less power, higher costs to consumers, and the curtailment of production of aluminum and other essential materials which depend on abundant low cost power.

Portland—(U.P.)—The Eisenhower administration's new power policy today was attacked here by labor leaders and praised by public utility spokesmen.

Labor leaders James T. Marr of the AFL and Jess A. Bell of the CIO saw the new program more of the "giveaway program" of the administration. They predicted the Pacific Northwest would fight any attempt at abandonment by the federal government of the development of the power resources of the area.

Favored by Utilities
But two utility spokesmen, Paul B. McKee, president of Pacific Power & Light company, and Thomas W. Delzell, chairman of the board of Portland General Electric company, said they saw the new policy as a challenge that would result in faster development of the area.

Delzell said he assumed the government will continue to concern itself with the flood control and irrigation features of multi-purpose projects, while under the new policy, local agencies should finance much of the costs of electrical facilities.

More Gamma Globulin For Use in Polio War

New York—(U.P.)—The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis is turning over to the government enough gamma globulin to inoculate 320,000 more children against polio's crippling effects.

Basil O'Connor, foundation president, said 2,250,000 cubic centimeters of the serum is being given to the Office of Defense Mobilization for distribution to state health officers.
