Van Brocklin Spearhead Of Ram Club

Portland—Most quarterbacks who throw two touchdown passes in a single game and lead their teams to victories would be satisfied with the performance. But not so with Norm Van Brocklin, the former Oregon All-American, who promises to make his forthcoming appearance here at Multnomah stadium one of the most memorable of his brilliant career.

Van Brocklin will spearhead the Los Angeles Rams against the Chicago Cardinals Labor day night in a rematch of the spectacular game played by the same teams last year which the Rams won, 24 to 14.

In that game Van Brocklin was so eager to look impressive before the "home folks" that he was pressing and missed many of his passes.

Depends on Van Brocklin. However, he did pitch for two touchdowns and was instrumental in his team's victory. His pass to Bob Carey for the final Ram six-pointer was one of the most sensational scoring plays ever seen at Multnomah Stadium.

Van Brocklin owns the quarterback job all by himself now that Bob Waterfield has retired, and on his trusty right arm will depend the fortunes of the Rams in this year's National Football league race.

Those fortunes rest in capable hands, however, for Van has led the league in passing two out of the last three years, finishing second the other time.

Tickets for the premiere gridiron battle go on sale here at J. K. Gill's Monday morning. Out-of-town fans may still order by mail through Oregon Sports attractions in the Dekum building.

New York — (U.P.) — The manner in which the New York Yankees are waiting to their fifth straight American League pennant today points up the fact that Manager Casey Stengel is not only the manager of any year and a completely amazing man as well.

Ask any manager in baseball how Old Case has or does do it and they'll tell you grimly: "I don't know, but I wish I did."

Then, on reflection, they'll give you a number of vague guesses. They range anywhere from the bitter statement that the rest of the league is downright lousy, the benefits of necro-

mancy and the old saw that Yankee flannels make superstars out of bush leaguers.

There was a time, back a few years when the Yanks were loaded with guys named Ruth, Gehrig, Combs et al. that slaving rivals derided Yankee Manager Joe McCarthy as a "push button pilot." There was a basis in fact because all Marce Joe had to do was write out the lineup, fold his arms and complacently count the runs.

But let's face it, the Yanks today don't have any Ruths, Gehrigs or Combs. They don't even have a reasonable facsimile thereof and the big man of the team is a five-foot, six-inch shortstop named Phil Rizzuto who once would have been—and actually was—told to go home and grow up. Maybe he didn't, but the Yanks are happy he came back, anyhow.

Stengel could have been stopped when he lost such stars as Joe DiMaggio, Tommy Henrich, Gerry Coleman, Charley Keller, Bobby Brown, Joe Page, Tom Morgan and Johnny Lindell, who went away to come back in a different capacity. But he wasn't.

He might have made mistakes when he peddled off such as Jackie Jensen, George Stinewiss, Tommy Byrne, Bob Porterfield and others. Yet always he came up with someone to take their places.

Some of his own players have been known to criticize his methods from time to time and take a depreciative view of his managerial abilities. This may be due to the fact that none of them, or very few, anyhow, ever know from day to day whether they are playing.

Old Case, whether he uses astrology, blackmagic or the hat pin, has a different lineup just about every day. And the proof is there in the standings over a five year period that whatever his system, it can't be beaten. It hasn't been, anyhow.
