

State Dental School Independent Of University, Judge Declares

Salem—(U.P.)—Marion county Circuit Judge Rex Kimmell ruled today that the University of Oregon dental school in Portland is autonomous—independent of its parent school, the University of Oregon.

The test action was brought by the Oregon State Dental Society against Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton and Marion county District Attorney Kenneth E. Brown, as representing the state.

To Consult With Board

Thornton said he would consult with the State Board of Higher Education before reaching any decision on an appeal to the Oregon Supreme Court. He stressed that the only matter of concern to his office was that of questions concerning constitutional points, and if an appeal should be filed it would be for the purpose of clarifying the questions in Oregon's highest court.

Judge Kimmell noted that the 1945 Oregon law involved provides for creation, operation and maintenance of "a department of the higher educational system of the state, therein named

dental school of the University of Oregon, and the acquisition of property for that purpose."

Is School Unit of System
Judge Kimmell wrote: "The pleadings in this case and the evidence, in the final analysis, present for determination and declaration the following issue: Is the dental school, by virtue of the statute, a unit of the higher educational system unto itself under the direct supervision

and management of the administrative office of the university acting as an intermediary of the defendant board?"

"It may be said that the law is the legislative intent on a particular subject expressed in the language of a statute. The court is bound to apply the law as so expressed. If the language be ambiguous, thus making the meaning uncertain, the court must resort to rules of construction to ascertain the law, otherwise the law is exposed by the ordinary meaning of the language of the statute."

"Clearly and concisely the subject statute imposed the duty and burden of operation and management of the dental school of the University of Oregon upon the Board of Higher Education."

"Such board is granted the same general powers in the operation and management of the dental school as are otherwise granted to it in the management of the University of Oregon."

"It is the opinion and declaration of this court that the dental school of the University of Oregon each is a separate and distinct department of the higher educational system of the state. The dental school is subordinate to no department of the higher educational system. The duty of operation and management is imposed by the statute upon the defendant board and such duty cannot be lawfully delegated to others."

Weather Hampers Hunt for Family Missing in Plane

Vancouver, B. C. — (U.P.) — Poor weather hampered an all out search today for a New Mexico oilman's plane missing for three days in the mountain wilds of British Columbia.

At least four persons were aboard it and the oilman's company offered a \$25,000 reward to anyone who could locate the craft within the next 10 days. **Planes Forced to Quit**
Clouds and rain closed in on the northern part of British Columbia reducing visibility and forcing many of the 28 planes which took part in the hunt yesterday to temporarily abandon search operations.

Oil company president Ellis Hall and his wife and two daughters vanished Monday on a flight from Alaska to Bell-ingham, Wash.

Patrick Hibben, 15, also of New Mexico, was travelling with the family, but search officials said it had not been determined if the boy was on the missing plane.

Marilyn Monroe Injures Famed Leg

Banff, Alta. — (U.P.) — Marilyn Monroe injured one of the world's most famous legs yesterday for the second time in a week.

She tumbled during the filming of a movie near here and "seriously" injured "several ligaments and tendons" in her left leg, the studio announced. A spokesman said it was feared she might be incapacitated a long time.

Last week the shapely actress sprained her left ankle when she lost her footing in the swift Maline river in Jasper National Park. Co-star Robert Mitchum plunged into the water and pulled her to safety.

The two accidents interrupted filming of "River of No Return," whose realistic scenes of danger in the Canadian Rockies were becoming too realistic for Miss Monroe.

Sen. Morse Lashes At Opponents of Hells Canyon Dam

Kalispell, Mont. — (U.P.) — Sen. Wayne Morse charged here last night that interests which oppose a federal multi-purpose Hells Canyon dam want to make people "pay tribute for water which belongs to them."

Speaking at the Montana Federation of Labor convention, the Independent senator said the public has a fight on its hands to protect conservation programs from "powerful economic groups."

Building of the Oxbow dam by private interests "will destroy the possibilities for the development of the Columbia river," he said.

Administration Criticized
Criticizing the Eisenhower administration, Morse said its only conservation program has been a "proposal for the conservation of more and more sagebrush."

He said the American people have a "right to look to their government for great multi-purpose dams which will provide electric energy, flood control and conservation."

However, Morse added, "where the facilities of a stream are such that public interests would best be served by a low head dam built by private interests" he would not oppose it.

1st Armored Division To Be Full Strength

Washington — (U.P.) — The Army, in a move to increase its combat reserve in this country in case of war, has decided to build up the First Armored Division to full strength, it was learned today.

The move will give the Army two divisions in this country which are at full strength and ready for immediate action in event of war.

Of the seven tactical divisions in the U. S., only the 82nd Airborne Division at Fort Bragg, N. C., is presently fully equipped. The other six divisions are anywhere from 40 to 60 per cent of authorized strength and Army officials estimate it could take as long as nine months to ready them for combat.

Prison Population Highest Since 1940

Washington — (U.P.) — U. S. prison population was higher at the beginning of this year than any year since 1940, the Bureau of Prisons reported today.

There were 167,374 prisoners in state and federal prisons at the end of 1952, an increase of 1.5 per cent from the previous year.

Of the total, 6,239 or 3.7 per cent were women.

Bond Sales Total High During July

Purchases of series E and H savings bonds by Oregon residents during July amounted to \$2,393,383, according to Morris B. Leonard Sr., Jackson county bond sales chairman.

Sales throughout this county totaled \$95,703, he said.

Leonard pointed out that at the recent governors' conference in Seattle, the 48 chief executives unanimously passed a strong resolution urging an increase in the purchase of savings bonds as a means of strengthening the financial economy of each community, as well as the country, itself. The resolution called upon all citizens to examine their personal and family finances with the idea of buying savings bonds regularly.

Schools Planning Group Will Meet

Superintendent of County Schools Alf B. Mekvold has called a meeting of the Regional Conference Planning committee for Tuesday, Aug. 25, at 8 p.m. in his office.

The presidents of all teacher organizations of both Josephine and Jackson counties are members of the planning committee. Plans for the annual regional conference of teachers of Jackson and Josephine counties will be made, he said.
