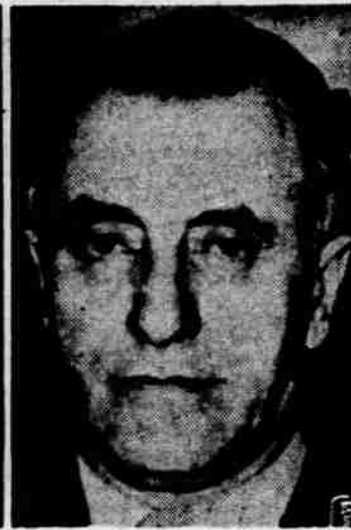


Blazing Washington Penitentiary Riot Ends

Streets of Tehran Decorated for Return Of Shah From Exile

Tehran, Iran.—(U.P.)—Ousted Premier Mohammed Mossadegh may be exiled instead of tried for treason, well informed sources reported tonight as jubilant Royalists prepared to welcome Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi back to his capital tomorrow.

Tehran, Iran.—(U.P.)—Jubilant Royalists festooned Tehran with flags and flowers today in preparation for the triumphant return of their shah in streets stained by bloody rioting only two days ago.

Tanks and troops of new Premier Gen. Fazlollah Zahedi stood guard at street corners of the capital and across the nation. But Zahedi's authority was virtually unchallenged following the arrest last yesterday of

deposed Premier Mohammed Mossadegh, who was held and guarded from mobs for trial as a traitor.

Mossadegh Protected

Cheering crowds erected triumphal arches across the city's wide streets where Nationalist mobs angrily smashed statues of Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi and demolished picture of him less than a week ago.

Mossadegh, arrested late yesterday through a trick telephone call, languished in a room at the plush Tehran Officers Club where Zahedi was living. Zahedi told the 78-year-old former premier he would be protected until he is brought to trial for plotting against the legal government.

Hearings Claimed Same McCarthyism

Los Angeles.—(U.P.)—Four witnesses appeared to testify at Sen. Joseph McCarthy's investigation of alleged Communist infiltration of the Government Printing Office today, including William C. Taylor, 43, Negro.

Taylor emerged from the secret hearings after 30 minutes of testimony and blasted the hearings as the "same old McCarthyism."

"They are trying to frighten people with star chamber sessions of the alleged misdeeds of government employees and by spy stories," Taylor said. "Perhaps they are preparing to railroad a few more innocent people to their deaths in order to intimidate people from protesting against war, the high cost of living and Jim Crow."

Taylor said he still is a member of the Communist party, and had been ordered to reappear tomorrow morning at 10:30 for an open hearing.

Medford Man Killed In Wyoming Accident

Roy L. Petre, 108 Florence st., Medford, an x-ray technician for Sacred Heart hospital, was killed in an automobile accident about 15 miles east of Lovell, Wyo., early today, according to a telegram received here from his wife.

The telegram stated that Petre was driving a sports roadster which overturned while rounding a sharp mountain curve. It was not known if Mrs. Petre, credit manager for the Medford hospital, was injured.

The couple have no children.

French Strikers Returning To Jobs

Paris.—(U.P.)—The united front of French labor, which for 17 days had defied the economic reforms program of Premier Joseph Laniel with a crippling series of nationwide strikes, cracked wide open today.

Laborers, by the tens of thousands, began streaming back to work in nationalized industries and civil services in defiance of Communist pleas for a continuation of the work stoppages enforced by 2,000,000 workers. At their peak, last week, the strikes affected 4,000,000 men.

The collapse of the strike followed an agreement, reached at dawn today, between non-Communist union leaders and representatives of Premier Laniel's cabinet.

Suspect in Murder Confesses; Other Man Is Implicated

Duane Albert Hall, 40, has confessed to taking part in the murder of a man on Mt. Tamalpais, near San Francisco, last June, and has implicated Raymond C. Hodge, 37, District Attorney Walter Nunley was told this morning.

Hodge and Hall were arrested by Oregon state police June 19 near Phoenix, and were held in the Jackson county jail until a few days ago.

According to the United Press, Hodge has been arraigned on a charge of first degree murder at San Rafael, Calif., and was to be brought there today from San Quentin prison, where he has been held, to enter a plea.

Judge Dismisses Bad Check Charge

A charge of drawing a check with insufficient funds, made against Jack Swayze, ideal court, was dismissed in district court yesterday by Judge Rawles Moore, he said this morning.

In a written opinion, Judge Moore said "It has been universally accepted by the bar for many years that a check given in payment of goods already purchased is not a check given 'with intent to defraud' because the drawer of the check can only inconvenience the payee, not defraud him, where he has already got possession of the property. The drawer owed the debt before he wrote the check, and he still owed the debt after he drew the check."

Veteran Grants Pass Businessman Expires

Grants Pass.—Frank Mashburn, 65, veteran Grants Pass businessman, died at his home here yesterday. He had been in ill health for a number of years.

Mashburn had been affiliated with Golden Rule stores in the western states for a number of years and was founder co-owner of the company's store here for 48 years. He actively managed the local store from 1905 until 1916 and since that time has maintained his interest in the store but has been in semi-retirement. He was one of the original stockholders and a past president of the Oregon Caves Resort company.

Survivors include his wife, Dora, Grants Pass, and two brothers, Charlie and Marvin, both of Boise, Ida.

Government Quits Power Rate Dictating

San Francisco.—(U.P.)—The federal government has given up its right to dictate retail rates for federal power sold to public agencies, Interior Secretary Douglas McKay said today.

McKay made his announcement of the major switch in Interior Department policy in a speech before the San Francisco Commonwealth club.

"It is desirable that federal energy should be resold at rates which are reasonable and non-discriminatory, but we see little reason to presume that the Department of the Interior is better equipped to maintain this standard than are . . . other public agencies," McKay said.

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Festive Morocco Grooms Appearance Of New Sovereign

Rabat, French Morocco.—(U.P.)—Morocco's new sultan received homage amid dazzling Moslem splendor today while France made a show of strength to keep down threatened riots by Nationalist supporters of the deposed ruler.

New Sultan Sidi Mohammed Moulay Ben Arafat, 64, made his first public appearance leading prayers of the faithful in the French protectorate's biggest religious festival, Aid-El-Kebir.

Thousands of loyal Berber tribesmen in age old costumes gathered at the dazzling palace and the mosque of Marrakech to fete the new sovereign, and slit the throats of new born lambs to give thanks to Allah.

City Water Usage About Like 1952's All-Time Record

The use of water in Medford this summer is running at about the same level as during the summer of 1952, when water use set an all-time record for the city, according to water department officials.

Monday, July 6, has been the biggest day of the year in Medford for water use, they stated. The hottest day of the year so far, August 11, when the temperature reached 102 degrees, was second high.

Beating Charged To Spreckles Heir

Newport Beach, Calif.—(U.P.)—Sugar fortune heir Adolph B. Spreckles II was arraigned today on charges he beat his beautiful ex-wife, Kay Williams.

Preliminary hearing for Spreckles, 41, was set for Aug. 26 on a felony charge of assault with intent to commit great bodily harm.

People Must Decide on Constitutional Meeting

Salem.—(U.P.)—Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton said today that the people themselves must decide whether or not they want a constitutional convention called to bring Oregon's constitution up to date.

Thornton wrote his opinion in reply to Rep. Mark O. Hatfield of Salem, secretary of the governor's and legislative constitutional committee.

Registered Hereford Bull Brings Price of \$1200

Corvallis.—(U.P.)—A registered hereford bull brought a top price of \$1200 yesterday in the first annual Oregon State college livestock dispersal sale which netted a total of \$10,411.

The prize bull, OSC Lionheart No. B-28, was purchased by the Buck & Doe Ranch, Deer Lodge, Mont.

Former Congressman Harold Knutson Dies

Wadena, Minn.—(U.P.)—Former Congressman Harold Knutson, one of the most controversial figures in the Republican 80th Congress, died today at Wesley Memorial hospital. He was 72.

Bombs in Hands of Russia Turn Eyes To US Defenses

Washington.—(U.P.)—The Soviet H-bomb and A-bomb have destroyed much of the U.S. atomic stockpile's war-prevention power, informed officials believed today.

From now on, these officials say, the United States will have to bank less on its power to deliver a crushing atomic counterblitz and put more dollars and effort into military and civil defense.

At the same time, many believe, the world's leaders will have to try harder than ever to secure peace and bring atomic weapons under effective international control.

Recently Captured Prisoners Slated For Early Release

Panmunjom, Korea.—(U.P.)—The Communists released 150 Americans today, the most in one day since "Operation Big Switch" started 17 days ago, amid reports that men captured in the last days of the Korean war may be freed tomorrow.

Some of the returning prisoners said the Saturday delivery of 94 Americans will include men from camp No. 9, a compound the United Nations did not know existed.

City Checking Men For Police Probe

Contacts have been made through the League of Oregon Cities leading to the choice of a police department investigator, Robert A. Duff, city superintendent, said today.

Duff said that two possibilities are now being checked and he expects to have more definite results sometime today. The final choice, he pointed out, rests with the council, and should the leads now being checked on turn out to be good, a special meeting of the council will probably be called. A special meeting requires 24 hour notice to the councilmen.

Near-Genius Convict Controlled State Prison, Warden Declares

Salem.—(U.P.)—A prisoner with a near-genius intelligence quotient of 129 ruled Oregon state penitentiary with an iron hand, selling liquor and narcotics and giving jobs to convicts and even assigning lieutenants to key jobs in the prison, Warden Clarence T. Gladden told the State Emergency Board today.

Gladden made his statement in support of his request for 25 additional guards. He said details now are not properly supervised because of lack of personnel. He told the board:

Doubters Asked To Check Milk Sources With State

Salem.—(U.P.)—A report from the field that one Oregon doctor has attributed probably one-third of childhood sickness to milk from questionable sources today prompted the State Department of Agriculture to issue some warnings about milk sources.

Check Suggested

Approved sources of milk are available throughout Oregon, the department said, and if anyone has any doubt about the wholesomeness of the milk and cream he is using, all he needs to do is to check with the department at Salem.

Or, officials said, put it this way:

If you want to know the approved sources of milk in your area, ask the department for a list of the inspected and licensed dairies in the specific area.

Holdout Convicts Herded in Cells; Buildings Burned

Inmate Killed, Three Hurt in Disturbance

Monroe, Wash.—(U.P.)—Grim guards and state police herded 160 sulking state reformatory convicts back to their cells today, ending a bloody, blazing riot in which one inmate was killed and three were wounded.

The holdout band of prisoners, which huddled throughout the cold night on the reformatory's baseball diamond, was divided into small groups and marched to their cells after being fed.

Before the men were returned, a cell-by-cell search was made for weapons.

The riot started at 6:45 p. m. yesterday when the inmates refused to return to their cells following an exercise period.

Buildings Burned

They set fire to a machine shop, garage, brickyard, greenhouse, powerhouse and other smaller buildings.

Damage was estimated at about \$1,500,000.

Killed by a bullet through his head was Walter Thomas Lys-hall, 23, Seattle. Glenn M. Anderson, 23, also of Seattle, was shot through the head and his condition was critical.

Convicts Break Ranks

Squires said the riot started at the end of the yard exercise period about 6:45 p. m. He said 349 of the reformatory's 600 inmates were in the yard at the time. About half followed the order to return to their cells, Squires added, but the others broke ranks and began setting fire to the shop buildings.

The guards opened fire when the rioters rushed the main yard gate at about 10 p. m.

An estimated 200 law enforcement officials, including 90 state patrolmen, were called in to restore order during the uprising which Superintendent Paul Squires said apparently was the result of resentment over the treatment of a Negro prisoner.

Brahma Bull Gores Clown at Rodeo

Sidney, Ia.—(U.P.)—A rodeo clown was in critical condition today after being gored by a brahma bull yesterday at a performance of the annual Sidney rodeo.

Bobby Clark, Bakersfield, Calif., suffered a severe concussion and internal injuries when one of the bulls charged him, pinned him against a gate and gored him before rodeo workers could free him.

He said:

"And that was the reason we had so much trouble in the prison. Turnover of prison personnel has been heavy." But he said he hoped that once things are straightened out in the prison, guards will be more satisfied with their jobs and stay there. He said:
