Veeck Says No Coast Park Ready for Big League Ball

San Francisco—(U.P.)—The talk about bringing major league baseball to the West Coast is a "tempest in a teapot," Bill Veeck, owner of the St. Louis Browns said today after completing a two city survey of Pacific Coast possibilities.

"There isn't a ball park ready for major league baseball on the West Coast," Veeck said, "and until there is, I can't see how there can be much talk of moving an American league franchise here."

To Report to League  
"However," he said, "you must remember that I am visiting many cities and no conclusion has been reached yet. I must report to an American league committee my findings. Until that time, there can be no possible decision made."

In Chicago Vice-President Charles Comiskey of the Chicago White Sox announced that Veeck had been authorized by a committee composed of himself, Tom Yawkey of the Boston Red Sox and Walter Briggs of the Detroit Tigers, to hunt for a new location for the Browns.

Seals Stadium Deal  
Baltimore, now in the International league, apparently has first call on the proposed move. However, Veeck admitted that he was not overlooking any possibilities.

Veeck headed today for Los Angeles and further talks with officials there.

Both Veeck and Paul Fagan, owner of the San Francisco Seals stadium, denied having reached any agreement on sale of the ball park, or even to having conferred with each other. However, from city hall spokesmen it was learned that a "tentative agreement" had been reached upon the sale price of the concrete arena which seats 22,500 and could easily be enlarged to handle crowds of about 30,000.
