Logging Accident Takes Life of Man Near Glade Creek

Emil Van Winkle, 56, Winter, Wis., died in a logging accident yesterday morning in the rugged Glade creek headwaters area some 25 miles south of Talent.

Deputy Coroner Harold Snodgrass said that Winkle was crushed against the tree he was felling by a tree he previously had felled. A stump against which the tree was leaning gave way and the log rolled on the steep hillside.

Was Alone
The deputy said that he was told that Van Winkle, employed by McDonough Brothers Logging company, Ashland, had been working with a brother-in-law, Dan Kadin, 112 Geenesees st., Medford. Van Winkle reportedly was alone at the time of the mishap. Kadin had gone for a part for a saw about 8 a.m. and found Van Winkle dead when he returned about 8:30 a.m., Snodgrass said he was informed.

The coroner's office was notified of the death about 10:30 a.m. by telephone from Talent. Deputy Coroner Snodgrass and Deputy Sheriff Guy Hughes reached Talent at 11 a.m. in separate vehicles. They were met by L. A. Macklin and C. V. Lybrand, Ashland, who led the way to the Glade creek area in a truck. They reached the accident scene about 1:30 p.m.

Sawed Log
Snodgrass said it was necessary to saw the log to free the body.

Winkle is survived by his wife, Lilly, a son, Rodger, and a daughter, Marlene, all of Winter, Wis. He had been residing in Medford with another brother-in-law, Roy Kadin, 928 East Jackson st. The body is at Chapel mortuary.
