

Oregon University To Review Bids For Presidency

Eugene — (U.P.) — Chancellor Charles D. Byrne said today the board of deans and faculty advisory council of the University of Oregon were prepared to review credentials of some 20 candidates for the institution's presidency.

The State Board of Higher Education was expected to arrange early in September interview for candidates rated highest in evaluations by the two faculty groups.

Under Consideration

The Oregonian in Portland reported that Dean Victor P. Morris of the UO school of business administration and Dean Orlando J. Hollis of the law school were among those under consideration.

Dr. R. E. Kleinsorge, Silverton, Board president, said earlier this week the Board will probably name an acting president to administer the institution until a successor to Dr. H. K. Newburn can be appointed.

Newburn resigned the presidency this summer to enter educational television and radio work in Ann Arbor, Mich. His resignation is effective October 1.

Hour Watering Limits Lifted at Phoenix

Phoenix — Mayor Kathryn Stancliffe said today that hour restrictions on lawn and garden irrigation in Phoenix have been lifted but that residents are to continue watering on the every-other-day basis.

Residents on the west side of Pine st. are to irrigate on the odd days of the month and those on the east side or Pine on the even days.

Mrs. Stancliffe stated that the city has installed a new Jacuzzi deep well turbine pump. Reason for the removal of hour restrictions is to test the pump and the water supply it is able to provide. If insufficient water is produced from the well, it may be necessary to reimpose the hour limits, the mayor said.

courts yesterday to make Haymes show cause why he should not be jailed for failure to support their three children. She charges Haymes was \$2,438 in arrears in payments he was ordered to make by the court here April 24 for support of their children, Richard, 11, Helen, 9, and Barbara, 6.

The pretty film player accused Haymes of being "callously indifferent" to the welfare of their children ever since their divorce, Nov. 5, 1952.

She pointed out that Haymes reportedly had offered to pay \$10,000 cash to his present wife, Nora Eddington Flynn Haymes, and that he was supposed to be earning \$10,000 a week at present during his appearance at a Las Vegas night club.

Haymes and his present wife only yesterday signed a financial settlement under which she was to receive \$8,000 as a lump sum payment and \$100 a week support.

Haymes still is facing possible deportation to his native Argentina. Immigration officials accused him of illegally re-entering this country after visiting actress Rita Hayworth in Hawaii.

Difficult Period Of Transition Said Faced by Farmers

Corvallis — (U.P.) — American farmers face a difficult "transition period" from unprecedented wartime demands for farm products to an economy of surpluses, C. P. Heisig of the federal Bureau of Agricultural Economics said here yesterday.

Next 5-10 Years Cited

Heisig, speaking before the American Farm Economic Association, said the next five to 10 years may present more problems to farmers than any of the decades after that. The first major challenge that must be faced, he said, is development of effective markets as war torn countries restore their own farm production.

Heisig suggested diversion of crop lands to meeting higher present demands for livestock. He said increased efficiency in production must be explored to lower costs.

Slow Economic Growth

T. W. Schultz, economist for the University of Chicago, told the association that the vast western interior of the United States "appears to fall into the category of slow economic growth."

The region must have new production, including the supporting investments, directed to other activities besides agriculture and mining if it is to increase its share of the national product, he said.

Farm Woodland Owners Realize Over \$20 an Acre

Salem — (U.P.) — Owners of farm woodlands in Oregon realized a cash income of more than \$20 an acre from tracts harvested under the woodland assistance program in the 1953 fiscal year ended June 30, Charles H. Ladd, senior service forester for the State Forestry Department, said today.

Ladd said in his annual report that 988 operators on farm woodlands had received instructions on proper cutting practices in harvesting 35,110,000 board feet of timber on 40,384 acres. Cash value of the forest product to the owners was estimated at \$818,087. Ladd said 290 farms, mostly located in the Willamette valley, were involved.

The department recently established a part-time forest service in the Coos Bay-Bandon-Coquille area, with offices in the court house at Coquille.

The report said farm foresters had referred woodland owners to 53 private forest consultants for consulting, management plans and other technical forestry phases not undertaken in the state farm woodland management program.

Printer Delegates Vote To Continue Fund for Defense

Detroit — (U.P.) — Delegates to the AFL International Typographical Union convention voted overwhelmingly last night to continue the ITU's strategic defense fund.

The fund, used to publish competing newspapers in areas where ITU printers are on strike, was a topic of heated debate among the 400 delegates attending the union's 98th annual convention.

The union's Independent party, headed by John J. Conley of Dallas, contended the \$13,000, 000 fund should be discontinued because the union should not be in the publishing business.

Victory for Randolph

The vote was a victory for ITU President Woodruff Randolph, who also heads the union's ruling Progressive party which supported the future use of the fund in dealing with strike-bound publishers.

Conley attacked the fund on grounds it created "hate and bitterness" between publishers and the union.

"Our philosophy is not based on love," Randolph replied. "Love does not get contracts."

13 Papers Published

Randolph also assailed an Independent party report which charged that the fund which now publishes 13 Untypog, Inc., newspapers was "detrimental" to the union. He said another minority charge that the fund was being carried on without consent of the membership was an "outright lie."

Grants Pass — (U.P.) — A 22-year-old Grants Pass man was among American prisoners of war returned in the Korean prisoner exchange last night.

He is Pfc. Charles E. Cargile. His mother, Ethel F. Cargile, lives at 522 Southeast st., here. Cargile enlisted in the Army in 1947 and was with the 7th division when he was captured on Dec. 10, 1950 near the Yalu river.

His family last heard from him when they received a letter July 5. It was dated May 11.

Romulo, soldier, statesman and editor, had entered the three man presidential campaign, along with Magsaysay, against President Elpidio Quirino.

He announced that he was withdrawing and that his Democratic party is forming a coalition with the Nationalist party of Magsaysay.
