

Second Festival Concert To Feature Songs, Dances

Ashland—Informality will be the order of the evening at the Oregon Shakespearean festival's second concert of Elizabethan music on Sunday evening at 8:30 p.m. in the Shakespeare theater in Ashland, according to the music director, Bernard Windt.

Program emphasis will be on folk songs of the Elizabethan period, arranged for the madrigal singers, instrumental groups, and soloists, and the entire production is being staged as an after-dinner entertainment in the manor house of an Elizabethan lord.

Among the numbers which the madrigalists will sing are "April is in my Mistress' face," "The Silver Swan," and "Shoot, False Love, I Care Not." Brad Curtis will sing two additional folk songs, "Wally, Wally," and "The Willow Song," with lute accompaniment.

Among the numbers played by the string ensemble will be Gabrieli's "Three Ricercari," Dowland's "Suite," and Gibbons' "Ayre."

Helen Davies will sing "Under the Greenwood Tree" and a duet with Elizabeth Walker, "While You Here do Snoring Lie."

The finale, by the entire company, will be the familiar "Greensleeves," using the tune which Shakespeare knew.

In addition to these and other musical numbers, the concert will include a number of Elizabethan dances and a monologue from Beaumont and Fletcher's "Knight of the Burning Pestle." Richard Graham will play the manor lord and Clara Margaret Daniels his lady. The dialogue which ties the musical program together was taken from over 20 Elizabethan plays by Philip Henson. The overall production is directed by Hanson and Angus Bowmer, with Bernard Windt directing the musicians and William Ball the Elizabethan dancers.

In addition to members of the acting company, many well-known valley musicians will appear in the concert.

Tickets are \$7.50 for members of the association and \$1.00 for others, with children's price set at \$7.50. Tickets may be purchased at the box office in Ashland or at Swam's book and gift shop, Medford.

Los Angeles Tax Evasion Check Due

Hollywood — (UPI) — A door-to-door check for federal income tax evaders will start in the Los Angeles area in about 15 days, according to M. A. Fremming, regional commissioner of the Bureau of Internal Revenue.

Fremming, in San Francisco, made the disclosure last night in a telephone interview with CBS newsmen Grant Holcomb here. He said the check would be similar to those conducted in Boston and Omaha.

Fremming said revenue bureau workers will ask local residents if they filed a return and request to see duplicate forms if the answer is "yes."

"No" answers will result in further questions to determine what taxes, if any, are due, Fremming said.

Names of persons who cannot produce tax form duplicates will be checked at local collections offices.
