

Moscow Expected To Howl of Dirty Work In Mossadegh's Fall

That man Malenkov took a beating second only to the one given Iran's weeping, would-be dictator when the Iranian Army gave Premier Mohammed Mossadegh the bum's rush in Tehran.

You can count on Radio Moscow, Pravda, Izvestia and other organs of the Soviet propaganda machine to set up an immediate howl of dirty work at the crossroads with Uncle Sam, as usual, the villain of the piece.

Soviet anguish is the greater because Iran, until the uprising, appeared to be theirs for the taking. The Kremlin gave every appearance of confidently awaiting an appropriate time to cash in, with the conviction that that time was not far off.

Premier Georgi Malenkov, in his famous "We too have the H-bomb" speech of Aug. 8, patted Iran on the head like an obedient child. He stressed Russia's friendship for its little neighbor and announced the opening of talks looking to the settlement of "frontier and financial problems."

Britain and the United States had failed to find a solution to the Anglo-Iranian oil dispute in two and one-half years.

President Eisenhower, in disgust had told Mossadegh to settle his quarrel with Britain or get along without U.S. aid.

The frustrated week end Coup D'Etat which appeared to have

ended the Shah's hold on the country left Mossadegh in the seeming position to deal with Russia as he liked—including arrangements giving Russia access to Iran's rich oil fields.

The outlawed Tudeh (Communist) party swung into the streets to claim its share of credit for Mossadegh's victory. Things couldn't have looked rosier for the Kremlin.

Historical Lesson

But Russia forgot the lesson of Britain's one-time Foreign Minister Lord Curzon who, when the Czar fell in 1917, thought he had Persia (now Iran) in the palm of his hand.

Lord Curzon overlooked a 43-year-old officer of the Persian Cossacks and the fiercely independent nature of the Persian people.

In 1921 Reza Pahlavi, discredited by the British as a virtually unknown trooper with a scant 3,000 men at his command, rode boldly into Tehran. He arrested virtually all the nation's officials and forced the trembling Shah to name him commander-in-chief of the Army and Minister of War. He made himself military ruler of Persia, encouraged the aging Shah Ahmed Ali Cacher to dawdle in the fleshpots of Europe and induced the Majlis (Parliament) to name him in his place.

That man was the father of the present Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi.

Babson and Life Insurance

Gloucester, Mass. — I believe in life insurance at all times, the same as I believe in fire insurance at all times. As, however, the amount of fire insurance taken out should depend partly on the cost of replacement, so the amount of life insurance which you take out should depend partly upon the trend in the value of the dollar.

Ordinarily, when experts agree that the dollar will decline in value for the next 20 years, you would not buy so much 20 Payment Life Insurance as if they agreed it would increase in value during the next 20 years. In the first case, you are paying out good dollars as premiums, while your wife may get poor dollars when you die—although she then would be much better off than if she got no dollars.

In the second case, you are paying out poor dollars as premiums with the hope your wife will get good dollars when you die. To illustrate how much of a factor this change is, the value of our dollar was 100 cents in 1939; it declined to 52 cents in 1952 and then started climbing back again. Considering that the people of the United States hold life insurance policies totaling over \$275 billions, this decline in the value of our dollar has cost Americans many billions of dollars.

Reasons for Declining Dollar Blamed on Unbalanced Budget

There are various reasons why the dollar declined in value during the past 20 years. The primary one was that owing to war and preparation for war we did not balance our national budget but issued billions of paper money to make up the deficit.

Jet Pilot Killed As Trainers Collide

Las Vegas—(U.P.)—One pilot died and another parachuted to safety when their F-80 jet trainers collided during a landing maneuver, Nellis Air Force Base authorities reported.

The dead pilot was identified as 2nd Lt. Charles F. Haynes, 23, Coalinga, Calif.

Nellis officials said 1st Lt. Robert H. Hartzog Jr., 24, Beaufort, S. C., parachuted to the ground uninjured.

Time to Buy Life Insurance When Dollar Value Is Down

This is the time to insure the present high wages which your husband is now bringing home. With sufficient life insurance bought now, the increased buying power of this insurance when paid will partly offset the loss in the family income in case of his death.

Hence, this is the time to buy life insurance. In addition to getting full insurance the day you pay your first premium, you are paying your premium with 52-cent dollars while your wife and family may be paid in 100-cent dollars when you die. For parents this means that now also is the time for spending money on an education for your children. For businessmen it means now is the time to spend money on institutional advertising and on other "long-term" investments.

Another reason for a declining dollar is when anyone accepts wages, interest, or profits for more than he deserves. Wage-workers are entitled to wage increases in proportion to their increased production, less fair rental for the new machinery. When, however, labor unions force employers to give them more wages without giving more production in return, this results in an unbalanced national budget. In the long run, none of us can get "something for nothing."

What labor gets in unproductive wages, it loses through higher prices, higher rents, and a declining dollar value.

Value of Dollar Should Go Up Again

In view of the fairer attitude which the Eisenhower Administration is taking to balance the spending, borrowing and production budgets, the value of the dollar should now go up again. This means many things: (1) The money which you now have in life insurance, bank deposits, and elsewhere will be growing in value. (2) Your real wages will be increasing every month even though you get the same number of dollars in your pay envelope. This means that unless labor gets in unproductive wages, we can produce more goods or rendering better service, we should not now ask for higher wages.

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
