RVCC Preps For Annual Golf Tourney

Preparations are in full swing for the annual Southern Oregon Golf Championship tournament which will be held, as usual over the Labor day holiday at Rogue Valley Country Club.

It opens Thursday, September 3 and concludes on Monday, September 7.

General course improvements are being made such as top dressing and aerifying of greens. Traps are being cut out deeper and better grass tees are being allowed to get in top shape.

There's an all-out effort to make the traditional tournament—it started in 1929—the biggest and best ever. Entries will have to be many to top the total of 217, all time high, who qualified last year. But, participants from throughout western Oregon and from a number of communities in Washington and California are again anticipated.

40 Entries Club Pro Al Williams has reported 40 entries received so far this year, almost all of them Oregonians and only a couple of them local golfers.

Bob Atkinson won his second straight southern Oregon crown last year, defeating Eddie Simmons for the second time in the finals and Mrs. W. W. (Helen) Davies won the women's championship for the sixth time. Five of her victories were in medal play. She will be on hand to defend her mantle but Atkinson's entry is, as yet, indefinite.

Rogue Valley hopes of keeping the trophy on its own shelf rest in such golfers as Simmons, Dom Provost Jr., and young Phil Getchell. Simmons has won the championship six times.

While the tournament officially opens on Thursday, September 3, there will be qualifying for a number of the local linksmen and linkswomen ahead of that time.

Qualifying play for Rogue Valley high handicappers starts on Wednesday, August 26. Men after berths in lower flights will make their trial rounds from then until September 2. Women here with handicaps of 13 or more will qualify through September 1.

Ladies of Rogue Valley with handicaps of 12 or under make their 18-hole prelim jaunt on Wednesday, September 2. Rogue Valley men aiming for the championship bracket and all out-of-town men and women participants qualifying on Thursday, September 3.

Skeet Shooting Set August 30

Activity will resume Sunday, August 30, at Medford Gun club with the skeet field to be open.

The shooting will be in the form of a warm-up for the bird hunting season. Dove, pigeon and blue and ruffed grouse seasons commence on Tuesday, September 1.

Arcaro Rides Native Dancer To Easy First in \$112,600 American Derby in Chicago

Chicago — (U.P.) — Native Dancer made a firm believer of Eddie Arcaro, king of the nation's jockeys, as he romped to an easy two and one-half length victory Saturday in the \$112,600 American Derby at Washington park.

Running with Arcaro in his saddle for the first time, Native Dancer trailed most of the way, then turned on a burst of speed around the stretch turn and passed Sir Mango to record his 18th victory of his 19-race career.

One of Best

"He's one helluva horse," said Arcaro, who before the race said Native Dancer would have to "prove to me" he's the greatest. "He's one of the best in turf history and handled himself perfectly. He's just about everything they said he was."

The Dancer, given an excellent ride by Arcaro, broke sixth in a field of eight horses from the barrier and trailed until he made his move at the home turn.

Sir Mango, ridden by Dave Erb, led almost the entire distance but was tired as Native Dancer was given free rein by Arcaro.

With the largest crowd of the year at Washington park roaring in his ears, the Alfred Gynn Vanderbilt colt stormed through on the outside to pass Landlocked and Precious Stone, then came on to win going away by two and one-half lengths.

DePrima Paces Los Angeles Win

Los Angeles — (U.P.) — Frankie Di Prima's homer and double Saturday paced a 10-hit angel attack as Los Angeles whipped San Francisco 6 to 3 to take a three to two game edge in their Pacific Coast league series.

Lefty Joe Hatten, who needed relief from Alan Ihde in the sixth, got credit for his 12th victory against 10 losses. Southpaw Al Lien, the first of three seal hurlers, lost his seventh verdict against 10 wins.

Di Prima slammed his bases empty homer in the fourth and doubled in Al Evans with a run in the second. He also had a single and walk in his other appearances at the plate.

A crowd of 5,058 fans watched the seals take an early lead in the second with a run on Murray Franklin's two-base error of Frank Kalin's fly ball and Reno Cheso's single.

REMINDER ISSUED

Portland — Anglers fishing for sea-run cutthroat trout or "harvest trout" in the coastal streams are reminded by the State Game Commission of the basic bag limit for trout.

The regulation states that the bag limit is "10 fish per day, not more than 5 of which may be 12 inches or over. . . ." Since most of the sea-run cutthroat exceed 12 inches in length, the second clause of the regulation should be noticed especially. Fishermen are liable for arrest if they keep more than 5 trout per day over 12 inches long. For all practical purposes, the daily bag limit on "bluebacks" is 5.

Jim Tabor Dies

Sacramento — (U.P.) — Jim Tabor, former major league and Pacific Coast League baseball star, died yesterday in the Sacramento county hospital. He was 37.

Tabor, known as "Old Rawhide" while in the coast loop, was admitted to the hospital last Monday following a congestive heart attack.

He played with the Boston Red Sox and the Philadelphia Phillies in the major leagues and with Sacramento, Portland and San Diego in the Pacific Coast League.

Jim Third at Halfway

Montreal — (U.P.) — Al Zimmerman of Portland, Ore., was tied for third place Saturday as the \$25,000 LaBatt open tournament moved into its second half.

Zimmerman, veteran Portland golfer who hit the tournament trail this spring after 20 years as a club pro, stroked a two-under-par second round 68 yesterday for a total of 134. He was tied with N. U. Hout, grey-haired veteran of Canadian golf and a consistent money winner, who shot 65.

Leading the field was Jerry Barber, La Canada, Calif., who fired a 68 yesterday for 132. Jack Burke, Jr., Kiamesha Lake, N.Y., shot a 66 for 133 and second place.

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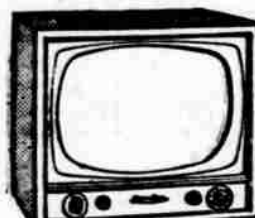
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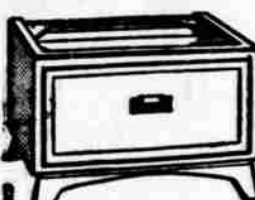
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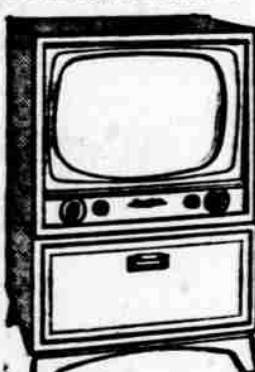
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
