New York — (U.P.) — Preacher Roe, who hasn't lost to the Pirates since they traded him to the Dodgers in 1948, kept that slate clean Saturday with a 5-3 victory over his floundering ex-teammates.

Although the veteran 34-year-old Roe beat Pittsburgh for the third time this season, he needed the help of Clem Labine with one out in the ninth. Labine gave up two hits and one run before he induced Gene Hermanski to fly out for the final out with the bases loaded.

Jackie Robinson had a perfect day at bat with three hits in as many times up while Duke Snider rapped losing pitcher Bob Hall for his 21st homer of the year with the bases empty in the seventh. As it turned out, Snider's homer proved to be the deciding run.

The league-leading Yankees dropped a 10-4 decision to the Athletics but lost no ground in the American League race to the runnerup White Sox, who lost an 11-inning, 2-1 game to the Tigers.

Eddie Robinson blasted his 18th and 19th homers of the year, one off loser Eddie Ford and the other off Tom Gorman, and teammate Gus Zernial collected three of the Athletics' 13 hits. Slender Marion Fricano, aided by ninth-inning help from Morris Martin, evened his season record at 7-7 as the A's snapped a seven-game losing streak. Fricano had a two-hit shutout over the first seven innings but tied in the ninth as Martin struck out pinch hitter Gus Triandos for the final out.

Third place went to George Litter of Chillicothe, O., with a 93 at 20 yards.

Joan Pflueger of North Miami, Fla., topped the women's doubles with 88. Second place went to Iva Pembroke of Phillipsburg, Kans., with 83.

The Junior doubles crown went to Robert Autrey of Atlanta, Ga., with an 88.
