Gay Festival Revels Given During Shower

Even though showers fell during the afternoon and for about half of the performance, some 400 people were in the audience last night for "An Evening's Revels," program of dancing and Elizabethan music presented by players of the Oregon Shakespearean festival.

The optimism of those who turned out in spite of summer rain was justified, too. The players and dancers were light-hearted and gay, the music was excellent and due to the manner in which the final number was presented, those in the audience felt they had been a part of the revels, and had had a good time. Colorful scene.

When the curtains parted the audience saw a long table with an Elizabethan lord (Richard Graham) and his lady (Clara Margaret Daniels) and their guests seated at dinner. Servants passed food and drink, and musicians were on hand to provide entertainment and to accompany the singing and dancing of the guests. It was a gay, colorful scene.

The guests around the table, of course, were members of the Madrigal singers, or of the dance group which presented numbers earlier this season for The Bard's Heyday. The Madrigal group performed informally, without rising from the table, and were expertly but unobtrusively accompanied by the string quartet.

Wall Street

New York (U.P.) — Prices on the Stock Exchange suffered their widest decline in more than two months today on increased volume.

Railroads, oils and steel shares led the sell off. They had losses ranging from more than a point with some issues showing much wider declines. As measured by the averages, the break in the industrials and rails at one time was the sharpest since June 9.

Dow-Jones final stock averages: 30 industrials 268.70, off 3.23; 20 railroads 100.07, off 2.71; 15 utilities 50.61, off 0.18, and 65 stocks 104.65, off 1.55.

Sales today amounted to 1,320,000 shares compared with 850,000 on Friday.

Air Force Group Pays Tribute To Unreturned Fliers

Washington (U.P.) — The Air Force association ended its seventh annual convention yesterday with a dramatic tribute to the fliers who never returned from combat missions.

At the service, retiring AFA President Arthur F. Kelley placed wreaths on the tombs of the unknown soldier and the late Gen. H. H. (Hap) Arnold, wartime chief of the Army Air forces.

The association, composed of 35,000 Air Force veterans including many retired generals, was told by President Eisenhower at its meeting Saturday night that the United States must build the best Air Force in the world.

The President's message was read by Air Force Secretary Harold E. Talbott. Talbott himself told the delegates that Mr. Eisenhower's cutback in Air Force plans is subject to reconsideration. He also said the United States is "vulnerable" to attack by Soviet atomic bombers.

Squadron Cited
The "squadron of the year" citation was presented to the San Francisco reserve squadron which after losing 80 per cent of its membership through the recall of reservists for Korean duty recruited members and became the largest in the nation.

Portlander Hunted South of Mt. Hood

Oregon City (U.P.) — Search was underway today for a Portland man who disappeared south of Mt. Hood yesterday while picking huckleberries.

The missing man was identified as Ralph Day, 60.

District Forest Ranger John Reis told sheriff's officers other members of a berry-picking party missed Reis about 11 a.m. yesterday. After a fruitless search, they called on forest rangers for help.

Day was reported lost in the area around Wolf Creek lookout, which is about eight miles southeast of Government Camp.

McCarthy Planning Stockpiling Probe

La Jolla, Calif. (U.P.) — Sen. Joseph McCarthy (R-Wis.), vacationing on the shores of the Pacific, indicated today his committee may soon investigate the stockpiling of strategic materials in the Midwest.

McCarthy did not say when he would leave La Jolla or where he would hold his next hearings. Staying at the same hotel was J. Edgar Hoover, head of the FBI, who is undergoing his annual physical checkup at the Scripps Metabolic Clinic.

Butte Falls Schools To Open September 3

Butte Falls — Opening date for Butte Falls schools is set for September 3, according to Ward Sybouts, superintendent. Classes will be held on September 4 and Monday September 7 no classes will be held, with regular school work resuming again on September 8, he said.

Rainstorm Floods Parts of Portland

Portland (U.P.) — A sudden deluge of rain flooded several streets in parts of Portland yesterday evening while only a few sprinkles fell at the same time in other parts of the city.

The downtown area and east side got the brunt of the rainstorm. Several power outages were reported and intersections were flooded. Several inches of water were reported in the Roosevelt high school basement.

The weather bureau said the rainstorm spread to Medford in southern Oregon and to Redmond in central Oregon.

Clergyman's Son Confesses Slaying

South Bend, Ind. (U.P.) — A clergyman's son confessed slaying a Roman Catholic priest near Kansas City, and stealing his rosary, authorities said today.

"I'm sorry I killed a priest," police quoted the suspect, William J. Townsend, 22.

Townsend last night signed a statement admitting that he shot Rev. Robert Hodges, Blue River, Mo., last month near a river bank after the priest gave him a ride near Kansas City.

Townsend is the son of a Logansport, Ind., minister. The youth said in his statement that Rev. Hodges made indecent advances toward him.
