\$71,470 To Be Spent At Savage Rapids

Washington (U.P.)—More than \$400,000 will be spent this fiscal year on two Bureau of Reclamation projects in Oregon, a program outlined by Secretary of Interior Douglas McKay revealed today.

A summary of the 1954 construction program showed that \$335,000 will be spent on the bureau's Klamath project in Oregon and California. Money spent on the project will raise the level of Clear lake dam to complete flood protection work on the Tule lake division.

Another \$71,470 will complete rehabilitation work on the Savage Rapids dam.

Pendleton (U.P.)—A four-state alert was sounded today for a 15-year-old Echo girl who failed to arrive at Great Falls, Mont., on a bus trip from here.

Salem To Ask Stop By West Coast Planes

Salem (U.P.)—Salem's city council will ask the Civil Aeronautics Board to authorize a regular stop at the capital city by West Coast Airlines.

Officials said that such services would give faster transportation between Oregon's capital and many other Oregon cities, including Astoria, Coos Bay and Roseburg.

Councilmen said the West Coast service might give Salem enough air traffic to warrant reinstatement of the civil aeronautics control tower here. West Coast airlines now flies over Salem in its Corvallis to Portland route. The company has indicated willingness to stop here.

Soldiers Flee as Gas Storage Tank Explodes

Inchon, Korea (U.P.)—An overflowing U. S. Army storage tank containing 400,000 gallons of gasoline exploded today and hundreds of South Korean civilians and American soldiers fled in terror across the rice paddies.

At least one person, a South Korean worker, was killed when, crazed by fear, he dashed directly toward the flames.

"His clothing just popped right off him," an American soldier said. "And an explosion threw him down the hill. He is still up there by the tank and couldn't be alive."

Members of an American anti-aircraft battery stationed only a few yards from the tank barely escaped with their lives.

Washington (U.P.)—New draft deferments based on fatherhood were banned under a presidential order that went into effect today.

From now on, draft eligible youths who become parents may claim an exemption only if they can prove their induction would cause "extreme hardship and privation."

However, fatherhood deferments already granted or pending before local selective service boards as of midnight last night are not affected.
