At 42, the music maker had learned to fly and took off in a high wind wearing a colonel's eagles and dubbed a "flight engineer." Actually he was shepherding a group of Civil Air Patrol cadets from 13 nations.

Barnee and Aunt Filomena had never met, but Dolores cabled

her aunt that Barnee was en route.

So when the plane arrived in Naples, it was met by a big car, populated in the back seat by Aunt Filomena and an interpreter.

Out stepped Col. Breeskin in all of his splendor. He was pointed out Aunt Filomena, who rushed him and planted a wet, auntly smacker on his mouth. She inspected him, and said, through her interpreter, "My, I didn't expect to meet the assistant President of the United States."

It was that way all through the trip—the red carpet treatment for Barnee and his boys.

The versatile Barnee reciprocated. Every time he came upon a piano, he sat down and honored his hosts with some Italian folk songs he had practiced before he left.

Kids Get Along

Of the international group of cadets, Barnee said:

"It was wonderful to see these kids gather from all those lands in harmony in a single dormitory. They couldn't understand each other. But they got along. We had several youngsters who could play the piano. That ought to prove that music is the international language."

All of those young men from all over were "hep" on aeronautics. The get together in Italy was for the purpose of pointing up the importance of the flying machine in the allied scheme of things.

Grocery President Publishes Article

School Crossing Guard Survey Told

Chicago—(U.P.)—A recent survey by the Civil Service Assembly shows that at least 122 cities with more than 50,000 population have school crossing guard programs.

The study shows that as a result of this system, larger cities are able to get children across streets safely to school crossings four times a day without using police.

Eighty-eight departments have had no traffic injuries or deaths among school children since the program was adopted. Other departments report minor injuries.

A few serious injuries to guards only were due to circumstances which could not be prevented, such as a runaway truck.

Guards are carefully selected on the basis of physical and mental character, and in some cities are fingerprinted.

The postwar trend has favored the employment of women guards, particularly young mothers of school children. Older men from the ranks of retired policemen, firemen, school janitors and handicapped veterans also serve to good advantage.

All Walks of Life Interviewed for Kinsey's Report

Bloomington, Ind. — (U.P.) — Data used in compiling Dr. Alfred C. Kinsey's book on "Sexual Behavior in the Human Female" came from women in every walk of life, according to information supplied by the University of Indiana.

Reply to Critics

In reply to critics who have charged that his interviews could only be obtained from exhibitionists, it was pointed out that Kinsey deliberately spread his investigation through as broad a social field as possible. His subjects ranged from the illiterate to the holder of many college degrees, from the scrub woman to the society dowager, from the circus acrobat to the international banker.

Kinsey and his staff leaned heavily on group interviews for the bulk of their data because, it was explained, valid information concerning the sex habits of a specific class of persons cannot be drawn from a single individual in that class.

'Nice People' Interviewed

When asked if "nice people" submit to his interviews, Kinsey smiles and replies:

"If I were at liberty to show you the names of some of the nice people I have interviewed—leading ministers, government officials and university presidents—you wouldn't even ask that question."
