

Red Penetration In Government Said Not Fully Exposed

Washington—(U.P.)—Senate investigators said yesterday that Soviet agents penetrated the government during the Roosevelt and Truman administrations and charged that "powerful groups and individuals within the executive branch" hindered efforts to eliminate them.

A report by the Senate Internal Security subcommittee said the successful and important penetration of the United States government by alleged Reds in past years "has not been fully exposed."

It said "there is ample evidence that the FBI and other agencies learned the underlying facts of the Communist conspiracy and time and time again performed their duty and notified the proper administrative agencies of this information."

But, the committee said, the loyalty program broke down chiefly because executive agencies failed to act on the information and fire the alleged Reds.

The subcommittee said it never will be known "how many priceless American secrets have been conveyed to Moscow through the tunnels of the American Communist underground."

Finding of Mastodon Brings Problem

Mogadore, O.—(U.P.)—For 10,000 years bones of a mastodon lay preserved in a layer of peat near here before they were discovered and removed for modern man's instruction.

Then William Scheele, director of the Cleveland Museum of Natural History, had a problem. When the near-perfect, prehistoric, elephant-like animal was found everyone was very happy. However, it's necessary to preserve the bones somehow; else they disintegrate.

Scheele wasn't certain where to locate the compound used to encase the bones. It's called "alovar." Scheele said, "and we've had an awful time trying to get the stuff."

Developments Seen To Ease School Burden

Chicago — (U.P.) — Suburban residential areas have found that commercial and industrial developments can ease the tax burden of public schools, according to the Municipal Finance Officers Association.

The association cited a recent study of Anne Arundel County, Md., a community that is primarily residential.

An analysis of one large housing development showed that each school child required \$107 of county taxes per year. The development was supplying about 50 per cent of that required amount.

The study also showed that county services required by industrial or commercial developments were low in cost compared to those required by residential areas.

As a result, the association said, taxes on such property could be used to offset the cost of services for residential areas.

In a similar study, it was found that the average home in a new subdivision in San Mateo County, Calif., yielded less than \$50 a year in taxes for school purposes. It cost the county \$204 to maintain a child in school one year, not counting capital expenditures of bond costs.

Many of the homes in the area sent more than one child to school.

Ex-WAC Turns Mechanic To Repair Own Automobile

Dallas, Tex. — (U.P.) — What may be a thing of the future was recently demonstrated by a young woman in Dallas.

It's women fixing their own cars.

Husky, six-foot Tiny Drews wheeled her car into a "fix-it-yourself" garage recently. The advising mechanic told her the 1941 model auto needed a new front end.

Undaunted after six hours of work, Miss Drews emerged from under the renovated car with a few words of advice about women mechanics.

The ex-WAC said "anyone with the slightest idea of mechanics should be able to fix her own car, particularly if there's someone around to give advice when you run into trouble."

The 190-pound girl was deter-

mined that she'd fix her own car, which she had bought for \$35 dollars. She felt that when a person gets "something for practically nothing," she "ought to try and get something out of it." That's exactly what Miss Drews did.

Enlisting the aid of a friend, petite Mary Taylor, blonde Miss Drews went to work on her vehicle. The garage furnished the necessary items such as hand tools, hydraulic jack, creepers (to swing under the car with ease), and spring pullers. Miss Drews had already purchased the parts to replace those which were worn out.

A regular garage had informed Miss Drews that the work on her auto would probably cost more than \$50. However, by

buying her own parts, renting a stall and equipment at the garage, and furnishing her own labor, the thrifty ex-WAC did the job for \$20.

The job consisted in part of pulling the front wheels off and putting new spindle pins and bushings.

After six hours beneath the auto, Miss Drews was still smiling, although she admitted she was glad the job was done. She told the garageman that she had better hurry home to change her grease-smeared clothes, as her boy friend was coming over.

Male Unchallenged

When asked if she thought she'd started a trend in women mechanics, Miss Drews laughingly said, "Women will never leave the lipstick and powder off." She said she believed the

ratio of "one thousand male mechanics to one female will remain unchanged."

Miss Drew's partner, Miss Taylor, wasn't quite as enthused over the mechanical work. In fact, she said she was "sort of duped" into the job. Miss Taylor said "Tiny" had asked her if she'd like to do something exciting to which she naturally answered "yes," after which she was taken to the garage.

Miss Drews is employed as an electrical draftsman for the Texas Power and Light company. She served overseas with the WACs during World War II.

After the two girls had finished the six-hour job, the advising mechanic remarked that they had sought less advice from him than many male customers.
