Gratuity Payments On GI Loans End On August 31st

The Veterans Administration announced today that under the new law, gratuity payments will not be made to veterans who obtain GI loans after August 31.

Previously, veterans who obtained GI loans were given a gratuity payment equal to 4 per cent of the guaranteed portion of the loan up to a maximum of \$160. These payments were credited to the veterans' loan accounts by the lenders.

S. T. Brannock, contact representative of the Medford VA office, said that Public Law 149, 83rd congress, which was approved by the President on July 27, provides for the suspension of GI loan gratuity payments during the 10-month period starting September 1.

In Some Cases

According to Brannock, where loans have been initiated prior to the cut-off date, gratuity payments may be made after August 31 only if the loans fall within the following categories:

1. A loan on which the VA has issued an evidence of guaranty or insurance or has issued a certificate of commitment dated prior to September 1.
2. A loan which has been closed and actually paid out in full prior to September 1 by a supervised lender.
3. A VA direct loan which has been closed or the VA has issued a notice of approval or a commitment prior to the cut-off date.

Brannock said the VA is urging all lenders to avoid any delays in processing loan papers which might deprive a veteran of his loan gratuity.

37 Cases of Disease Reported Last Week

Thirty-seven cases of communicable diseases were reported to the county health office last week. The most prevalent disease was mumps with 12 cases. Other illnesses listed included measles, four cases; German measles, one; trench mouth, four; whooping cough, three; pneumonia, five; chicken pox, five, and strep throat, three.

Britain's Favored Yank Again Hero

Hunstanton, England — (U.P.) — Cpl. Reis Leming, American airman who rescued 27 Britons in last winter's floods, won more gratitude today for saving a man from drowning.

Britain's favorite Yank plunged into a heavy surf last night and returned to shore with a man who had been clinging to an overturned dinghy.

The small craft had capsized about 100 yards off shore.

"There wasn't much to it," the Toppenish, Wash., airman said. "I'm pretty tall, six foot three, and I waded most of the way."

"Heck, no," Leming said. "I just happened to be around."

Queen Elizabeth II awarded Leming the George Medal for his heroism in saving 27 persons from drowning during the floods.

Death Toll in Chile Storm Mounts to 45

Santiago, Chile — (U.P.) — The known death toll in the worst storm to plague central Chile and western Argentina in half a century mounted to 45 today.

At least five persons, including an entire family of four, died yesterday when an avalanche buried Las Lenas, a way station on the Transandean railway.

Newspapers Found Best Advertising Medium, IGA Says

Chicago — (U.P.) — The Independent Grocers' Alliance "has found newspaper advertising to be its most effective medium" and will spend more than \$2,000,000 for space in U.S. and Canadian newspapers in 1954, it was announced today.

Found Profitable
The IGA national advertising manager, Orville Johler, told 1,500 wholesalers and retailers attending the alliance's 27th international convention that IGA has found it profitable to increase its newspaper advertising budget each year.

He also said that the group plans a "new look" in advertising "which we consider to be one of the most progressive steps ever taken in the food field."

"Full page ads will no longer show many items as was the general practice in the past," he said.

Ad To Have Focal Point
"Each IGA ad will, instead, feature a currently popular fashion that will be fully illustrated on the page and serve as the focal point of the ad. Food items to be advertised will be held to a maximum of 15 items."

"In this way, the housewife will be able to 'keep in style,' in dress and in her food purchases."

Coronado May Have Gone Into Nebraska

Marysville, Kan. — (U.P.) — Coronado, Spanish explorer, may have gone as far north as Nebraska.

Homer Reynolds, farmer living near the Kansas-Nebraska border, has unearthed a halberd, a spear-like weapon which might be a Coronado relic.

The University of Kansas museum, where the weapon was sent for identification, reported it evidently was a Spanish weapon. Found five feet beneath the surface, the halberd's long point had rusted away and a portion of a hooked point also was gone.

Otto Wullschlaeger, historian and farmer, believes the recent find, coupled with the old Spanish sword discovered in Marysville city limits in 1908, proves Coronado's wanderings in 1540 and 1541 carried him this far north in his search for the Seven Cities of Cibola.

Union Election Ordered At Cottage Grove Mill

Washington — (U.P.) — The National Labor Relations Board has ordered another election among employees of Madonna & Arnold Lumber company of Cottage Grove to determine whether they desire collective bargaining representation, it was reported today.
