

Release of Gen. Dean Still Big Question At Freedom Village

Panmunjom, Korea — (U.P.) — The biggest mystery in Korea to-day centers around Maj. Gen. William F. Dean.

When will Dean, highest ranking prisoner held by the Communists, come home to freedom? In the United States that would be called the \$84 question.

No Fanfare Due
The Communists claim that Dean is well and will be released when his turn comes. They say he will be repatriated without fanfare and be treated as an ordinary prisoner.

The Reds have hinted they will hold him until the end of "Operation Big Switch," when the last of 3,313 Americans to be repatriated walk through "Freedom Gate."

Only one of the 2,128 Americans released thus far had news of Dean while held by the Communists.

Sgt. Edward Williams, 23, Vicksburg, Miss., said last Saturday that other prisoners told him they once saw Dean in notorious Communist Camp No. 5.

Another freed prisoner, Marine Pfc. Leonard Steege, 20,

Medford, Ore., said he had heard rumors in Kaesong that Dean would be the last man set free.

Brigadier R. M. Jerram, head of the U.N. Red Cross team, disclosed yesterday that his unit, while inspecting Communist prison camps, discreetly had made inquiries about Dean. But the British brigadier said the Communists ignored the questions.

Oregon Inmate Denies Being Boss Of Prison Rackets

Portland — (U.P.) — Donald Everett Bailey, Oregon state prison inmate who was identified last week as "probably" the "convict boss" of the penitentiary, denied today having anything to do with prison rackets.

The 39-year-old convict issued a denial through his attorney, John Patrick Hannon.

Hannon said Bailey admitted he did assign convicts to duties, but that it was always subject to approval of prison officers.

"He also said he wanted to get off his job, but was told by officers that he was doing well, and his request were refused," Hannon said.

Bailey especially denied having anything to do with the sale of narcotics. Hannon said Bailey neither sold the drugs nor used them himself.

Doesn't Smoke
"As a matter of fact, he doesn't even smoke," Hannon said.

Warden Clarence T. Gladden related the case of a "convict boss" before the State Emergency Board last week to support his request for 25 additional guards. Deputy Warden L. R. Barnes told the Oregon Journal that he believed Bailey was the man Gladden had referred to.

Bailey was moved to Multnomah county's Rocky Butte jail following the July riots at the penitentiary and still is there.

Jacksonville Schools Opening September 14

No Wage Increases For Lumber Workers

Klamath Falls — (U.P.) — No wage increase settlements between three lumber firms in the "Midland Empire" of Southern Oregon and Northern California were reported today.

A month-long strike ended at the Ralph L. Smith Lumber company, Anderson, Calif., with agreement to extend the present contract until April 1, 1956.

Carter, Webster and Johnson Lumber co., Delaker, Calif., which has been struck about three weeks, signed with the union to extend the old contract until April 1, 1954.

Sierra Pine had not been struck. The High Sierra Pine Mill company, Oroville, Calif., also agreed to extend the old contract until April 1, 1954.

Air Defense Review Said Needed Because Russia Has H-Bomb

Washington — (U.P.) — Adm. Arthur W. Radford, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, said today that the fact Russia has the H-bomb will force this country to review and strengthen its air defenses.

In his first news conference since becoming chairman, Radford said Soviet development of a hydrogen bomb is not surprising and will not change this country's overall strategic planning. But he said it emphasizes the need of a stronger defense of the United States.

Can Split Up Targets
Radford said he sees no need to revise the so-called Key West inter-service agreement on the roles of the Navy and Air Force on strategic bombing.

He said it is flexible enough to allow the Navy and Air Force to split up atomic bombing targets in case of war.

The agreement originally gave the Air Force the mission of strategic bombing and made the Navy's air arm responsible for the aerial conduct of sea warfare.

Must Get More for Dollars
Radford was asked his views about the administration's econ-

omy drive which resulted in cuts in defense appropriations. He said that the United States must try to get more for its defense dollars. He said this was not a criticism of the military, but explained that in the heavy buildup at the outbreak of the Korean war there was bound to be some waste and duplication.
