National Forest Timber For Sale

Oral auction bids will be received by the regional forester or his authorized representative at Room 214, Post Office Building, Medford, Oregon, beginning at 2:00 p.m., Pacific Standard Time, September 21, 1953, for all live timber marked or designated for cutting, and all merchantable dead timber located on an area embracing about 750 acres within Section 34, T. 30 S., R. 2 E., and Sections 2, 3, 4, 9, 10, 11, 12, 14 and 16 T. 31 S., R. 2 E., W.M., in the Rogue River National Forest, Oregon, estimated to be 15,900,000 board feet more or less of Douglas-fir, 600,000 board feet more or less of incense cedar, 3,900,000 board feet more or less of sugar pine, white pine, and ponderosa pine, and 11,200,000 board feet more or less of white fir and other species. The appraised value of the timber according to long term, normal market and operating conditions is \$7.50 per M board feet for Douglas-fir, \$3.00 per M board feet for incense cedar, \$17.40 per M board feet for sugar pine, white pine, and ponderosa pine, and \$2.05 per M board feet for white fir and other species. No bid will be considered which is less than these rates as a base rate applicable through the entire period of the sale agreement, plus at least \$2.35 per M board feet for Douglas-fir, \$2.40 per M board feet for incense cedar, \$11.20 per M board feet for sugar pine, white pine, and ponderosa pine, and \$1.65 per M board feet for white fir and other species, the total to apply for all timber cut prior to April 1, 1955. High bid will be determined by multiplying the total amount bid for each species that is to apply to all timber cut prior to April 1, 1955, by the volume of that species, as stated below, which must be cut before redetermined rates below those bid can become effective. On that date, as stated in the contract, total rates will be redetermined but stumpage rates be less than the basic appraised value as first above stated, and in no event will redetermined rates which are below those bid become effective for a particular species until the quantity of that species scaled and paid for equals or exceeds the following amounts: Douglas-fir 8,000,000 board feet; incense cedar 200,000 board feet; sugar pine, white pine, and ponderosa pine 1,300,000 board feet; white fir and other species 3,800,000 board feet. In addition to the prices bid for stumpage a co-operative deposit of \$1.50 per M board feet to cover the cost of tree planting, seed sowing, and timber stand improvement work on the area cut over, and a deposit of \$0.25 per M board feet, to be used by the Forest Service for paying a portion of the cost of slash disposal, for the total cut of timber under the terms of the agreement, will be required. As a qualification for bidding, all bidders must submit a sealed bid accompanied by the required payment to the forest supervisor prior to 2:00 p.m. Standard Time, September 21, 1953. Sealed bids will be posted at the beginning of the auction for the information of all bidders. \$20,000.00 must accompany each bid, to be applied on the purchase price, refunded, or retained in part as liquidated damages, according to the conditions of sale. If an oral bid is declared to be high at the closing of the auction, the bidder must immediately confirm the oral bid by submitting it in writing on a Forest Service bid form. The right to reject any and all bids is reserved. Forest Service bid forms for use in submitting sealed bids and full information concerning the timber, the conditions of sale, and the submission of bids may be obtained from the Regional Forester, Portland, Oregon, the Forest Supervisor, Post Office Building, Medford, Oregon, the District Ranger, Union Creek Ranger Station, Prospect, Oregon, before bids are submitted.

Oregon State Bar Receives Highest Award

Boston — (U.P.) — The American Bar Association yesterday presented to the Oregon State Bar its highest award for public service performed in the last 12 months.

Competition was among 22 states in Oregon's population class. The bar's legislative aid program at the 1953 session was basis for the award along with its initiation and developing revision of Oregon statutes, its program for elimination of judicial delay and its continuing legal education program.

Siletz Man Becomes Portland's 35th Death

Portland — (U.P.) — Funeral services were being arranged today for Gilbert Owen Washington, 24, of Siletz, who died yesterday in a Portland hospital minutes after he was hit by a truck.

It was the 35th traffic fatality of the year in Portland, compared with 29 for the same period last year.

Kelly Resigns Demo Chairmanship After Row With Mitchell

Chicago — (U.P.) — John J. Kelly, Sr., general chairman of the Democratic party's \$100-a-plate dinner scheduled for next month, resigned today in a dispute with Democratic National Chairman Stephen A. Mitchell.

Kelly, a Chicago lawyer who is master in chancery of the Superior Court here, refused to elaborate on the statement.

"Any comment on our differences must come from Mr. Mitchell," he said.

Mitchell declined comment, "Struggle for Power"

However, one political observer expressed belief the dispute might have involved selection of a toastmaster for the dinner. The source said Mitchell held out for a figure of national importance. It was announced yesterday that Sen. Guy M. Gillette (D-Ia.) would be the toastmaster.

There was some talk among political observers that Kelly's resignation actually might have resulted from growing struggle between old line Democrats, including the powerful Chicago organization, and newcomers exemplified by last year's defeated presidential nominee, Adlai E. Stevenson.

Mitchell was appointed national chairman last year at Stevenson's behest although he had had practically no political experience and admitted he had to learn his job from the ground up.

The \$100-a-plate dinner is scheduled for Sept. 14 as the climax of a two-day meeting by party leaders to plan for the 1954 congressional campaign.

Stevenson is scheduled to appear at the dinner, along with

former President Truman, and probably will make a short address. He will make a major speech, reporting on his recent five-month tour of the world, on Sept. 15. The speech will be televised.

GOP Counteroffensive
The Republican party has a two-day midwest conference of GOP women scheduled here for Sept. 18-19, also to be held at the Hilton Hotel.

The GOP conclave had started out to be a comparatively simple program but the party has beefed up the agenda recently with additional and more important speakers in an apparent attempt to offset the Democrats' meeting.

Portland — (U.P.) — An independent oil operator from Texas who has some 1,000,000 acres of eastern Oregon and eastern Washington land under oil lease said today he planned to start work this fall on a well in Oregon.

J. D. Bodkins said he was en route to California to look over equipment and to consider contractors. He did not say where the first well would be located. He has leases in Wheeler, Crook, Deschutes, Harney, Malheur, Baker, Gilliam and Lake counties.

Bodkins said he expected that within five years the Pacific Northwest will be a "great oil and gas producing area."
