

State Division Lists Events for September

Salem—Oregon's State fair, Pendleton Round-Up, county fairs and salmon derbies high light the September schedule of events published by the Travel Information division, Oregon state highway department.

Oregon's State fair, Salem, running eight days from September 5 through 12 will have a Hawaiian theme this year—the night show under direction of Helene Hughes is called "Welcome Hawaii," and starts each evening at 8 o'clock sharp on the grandstand stage. Simultaneously at 8 o'clock each night a rodeo and special acts will be presented in the horse show pavilion. Parimutuel racing each afternoon, (except Sunday), a large outdoor flower show, mammoth farm machinery display, dancing each evening and many other special displays will bring expected record crowds to the state fair grounds this year.

Salmon Derby Stated
The Labor day week end will bring Oregonians many other things to do, too. The Astoria Salmon derby, running from August 30 will end on Labor day with the grand prize of \$1,000 awarded for the largest Chinook caught by closing time, 7 p.m. on the final day.

The Salmon derby at Winchester Bay, Redford, will also close on Labor day after over a two-month run since July 1. For the largest fish caught during the entire derby there is a grand prize of \$1,100 and for the second largest fish a prize of \$700. Daily prize for the largest fish is \$50.

Other salmon derbies getting their start in September are the Warrenton derby, September 3-7; the Siuslaw Silverside derby, Florence, September 5 through November 1, with 100 grand prizes for both the man and woman catching the largest silverside; the Siletz Salmon derby, Taft, September 12 through October 25, with \$2,000 in prizes and the Bandon Salmon derby, September 13 through October 4 with \$600 in merchandise prizes plus 22 daily prizes and special prizes for juniors.

Other special Labor day week end events listed are the Oregon Gem and Mineral show, Portland Civic auditorium, September 5-7; Masonic gathering, Malheur Cave, Harney county, from Burns, September 5-6 and Labor Day parade, Tillamook, September 7.

Several Sporting Events

Several first class sporting events are on the Labor day schedule. The 1953 National Softball Congress world championships have a schedule at Normandale Park, Portland, September 4-13. At Pendleton, September 4-7, is the Northwest regional softball tournament. At Medford, September 3-7, southern Oregonians will vie in their golf championship tournament at Rogue Valley Country Club; Mid-Columbia Golf championships will be held at The Dalles, September 6-7 and the Los Angeles Rams, spearheaded by Norman Van Brocklin, will meet the Chicago Cardinals in pro-football at Multnomah stadium, Portland, 8 p.m. Labor day.

Other sporting events during the month include the Oregon's Women's Golf association championships, Eugene, September 14-18; Oregon Senior Golf championships, Riverside, Portland, September 14-19; the opening high school football jamboree, Multnomah stadium, Portland, September 18, and opening Pacific Coast conference football game at Portland, O.S.C. vs. University of California, September 26.

The granddaddy of all Oregon rodeos, the Pendleton Round-Up, swings into action for three days, September 10-12. There will be four arena performances, start-

ing at 1:15 p.m. Thursday, Friday and Saturday with finals scheduled at 7:30 Saturday night. Happy Canyon (the historical pageant) will start at 8:15 p.m. Wednesday through Saturday. The Westward Ho parade will start at 10 a.m., Friday, September 11. Events this year will be world's championship bareback and saddle bronc riding, bulldogging, calf roping, steer roping, Northwest saddle bronc riding, stage coach races and horse races. The Montie Montana family will perform and Sherman Crane is the rodeo clown.

County fairs during September are Linn, Albany, Aug. 31-Sept. 1; Malheur, Ontario, Sept. 2-5; Morrow, Heppner, Sept. 3-5; Lake County Fair and Round-Up, Lakeview, Sept. 5-7; Baker, Halfway, Sept. 6-7; Sherman, Moro, Sept. 11-13; Harney, Burns, Sept. 11-13; Lane, Eugene, Sept. 14-20; Grant, John Day, Sept. 16-19; Union, La Grande, Sept. 17-19; Gilliam, Condon, Sept. 18-20 and North Marion, Woodburn, Sept. 24-28.

Around Hollywood

Hollywood — (UPI) — Many a movie director rants about the problems of dealing with stars and combating "temperament," but not Curtis Bernhardt who is happiest when he's surrounded by a bevy of beautiful actresses. Since coming to Hollywood, Bernhardt has guided the film work of some of the world's top actresses, and he loudly derides the old saw about beauty being only skin deep.

"That's just glib nonsense," snaps Bernhardt. "Beauty is the result of inner talent and radiance. That 'skin deep' baloney is just propaganda put out by the gals who just don't have it."

Beauties Work Hard
The director contends he's rarely known a beautiful actress who isn't a hard worker.

"A beautiful woman usually scorns getting by on her physical charms," he said. "Take Rita Hayworth, for example."

"We just finished making 'Miss Sadie Thompson' at Columbia, and I've never known a glamor girl who worked harder to get a scene or a dance just right."

"You hear people say, 'She's beautiful all right, but she always plays herself.'"
"Uh, uh," Bernhardt said, shaking his head. "These girls

know they'd wind up without jobs if they kept playing the same type in every film, so they work hard to be different."

He said La Hayworth's Sadie Thompson is vastly different from her performance as Salome. "What's more, I honestly believe that Rita has given an Academy Award performance. I may be prejudiced," he said, "but she has turned in a truly great, believable role."

Others Work, Too
Bernhardt said Rita isn't the only glamor gal who works overtime at doing a good job. He rattled off the names of Lana Turner, Bette Davis, Barbara Stanwyck, Joan Crawford and Jane Wyman—all of whom he has directed in pictures.

"There isn't a girl in that lineup who doesn't give the best there is in her when she's in front of the cameras. They couldn't have reached the top by taking the line of least resistance and depending on the faces and figures alone."
