

Meyer Wins 14th for Dodgers; Westlake's Homer Tips Yankees

New York—(U.P.)—Russ Meyer may not have to pound that nail into the wall after all—it looks like he'll be using that pitcher's glove next year instead of hanging it up.

On the day that the fiery fire baller learned he had been traded to the Dodgers last spring he was so enthusiastic that he said, "If I can't win 18 ball games with that club I'm going to hang up the old glove and quit."

Still in There

Meyer won his 14th game, 7-5, from the Cubs yesterday, even though he yielded 12 hits and had to have help from Clem Labine, who struck out the last batter in the ninth.

The victory put the Brooks 9½ games ahead of Milwaukee which had an open date. Philadelphia, Cincinnati and Pittsburgh also were idle.

In the American League, the Yankees blew a 4-2 decision to Cleveland in 11 innings when Wally Westlake hit a two run, game breaking homer to give Mike Garcia his 16th victory with a five hitter. The White Sox topped the Red Sox 6-4, as Virgil Trucks won his 18th game to cut the Yankee first place lead to 9½ games.

The Senators piled up 12 runs in the first three innings to top the Tigers, 12-5, and at St. Louis, the Browns topped the Athletics, 5-4 and 3-1. In the only other National League game, the Cardinals came from behind to top the Giants 6-3 with four runs in the seventh.

Rivera Triples

Jim Rivera hit a three run triple in the third inning to put Chicago in front for good as Trucks scattered seven hits including a homer by George Kell.

The Browns put over two runs in the eighth to break a 1-1 tie as a walk with the sacks loaded and a long fly by Jim Dyck provided the winning margin for reliever Marlin Stuart who gained his eighth victory in the second game. In the opener Vic Wertz hit a two run homer in the ninth, his second of the game and his 17th of the year to give St. Louis its triumph.

Rip Repulski sparked the Cardinal winning rally over the Giants with a three run homer to give Ed Erazt the victory in a relief chore.

Rogue River Ramblers are putting up a trophy to the high point man in the day's field meet. There will be various prizes presented to the riders throughout the day. They will go to the AMA member riding the longest distance to the tour, the rider having the motorcycle full-est equipped with accessories, and to the largest uniformed group.

Immediately after the inter-club ball game there will be refreshments, the awarding of the various prizes, and the field meet activity. Rambler members Don Sample, Cliff Ross and Jim Mellor are expected to be in there competing and to uphold their previous records made last Sunday at the hill-climb.

Competition is expected to be very keen this year, with clubs from Eureka, Crescent City, Klamath Falls and as far north as Salem promising to be here. A couple of professional field meet enthusiasts from Bakersfield, Calif., may come.

Trout Angling In Main Rogue Getting Better

Portland—(U.P.)—Prospects for sea-run cutthroat trout and for salmon fishing are good along the coast while conditions vary elsewhere, the State Game Commission said today in its weekly report.

SOUTHWEST: Winchester bay very good for silver salmon. Preferred bait is herring. A few sea-run cutthroat being taken in the Umpqua and Smith rivers. Siltcoos and Tahkenitch lakes catfish and spiny-ray angling good. Tenmile lakes catfish angling good. Perch fishing excellent.

Salmon fishing is picking up at Gold Beach and throughout the lower 12 miles of the river. Some limit catches of steelhead are being made in the Agness area.

Lures Best

Trout angling is fair and improving in main Rogue. Few catches are being made on flies but best catches are with spinners and lures. More steelhead are being reported taken all along the main river from Rogue Elk through to Galice.

General water conditions of the Rogue river and its tributaries are low and clear.
