Padres Nab Doubleheader From Portland; Dillinger Gets 200th Hit for Solons

San Francisco (U.P.)—Heroes came by the bushel and the peck in the Pacific Coast League today and the fans loved them all.

In Sacramento, bespectacled Bob Dillinger became the first player in the league to get 200 hits this season as he sparked his oft-vetered Senators to a 5-4 thriller over Seattle. The Glendale express went three for five against the Suds for a season total of 201 bingles.

Lefty Joe Hatten of Los Angeles thrilled a partisan Wrigley Field crowd of 21,440, largest of the season, by stopping the runaway Hollywood Stars with a six hit, 5-2.

Padres Sweep Clean

Up in Portland, long Tom Alston boomed a home run with a man on base in the 10th inning of the nightcap to assure San Diego of a 7-4 victory and a clean sweep for the night. The sizzling Pads, who now have won 10 of their last 12 games, took the opener, 6-1.

San Francisco beat Oakland 8-6, thanks to ancient Bob Muncie who turned off an Acorn batting assault in the sixth inning and pitched hitless ball for the rest of the game after giving up a single. George Vico banged five hits in five trips as he also made like a hero for the Seals.

As a result of the night's activity, Hollywood retained its 9½ game lead over the Suds. San Francisco, with a mighty assist from the Padres, bounced back into fourth place ahead of the Beavers by a game and a half. And the Sacs left the Oaks behind in the cellar by a full game.

Dillinger was on third base in the ninth inning when Eddie Bockman hoisted a fly to deep right to bring him in with the winning Sacramento run.

Milo Candini—rescued rookie Bud Watkins from a Rainer uprisings in the seventh to record his eighth triumph of the year. Munger Wins 13th.

Hatten recorded his 13th win while Red Munger, who started against him for the Thespians, lost his 10th. A two run double by Les Peden highlighted a Los Angeles explosion in the second that was good for four markers.

Bob Kerrigan rode to his 14th victory on Alston's blast against Portland although the Padres scored one more run just to make the triumph sure. Jehosie Heard took the loss. Bill Thomas cruised to win number nine in the first game as Red Adams was routed in the second inning for his ninth loss.

One of the sloppiest games of the season was perpetrated at Seals stadium. Elmer Singleton started for the home team and failed to finish for the sixth straight time. Each side used three pitchers. Muncie, the last to toil for the Seals, got his ninth victory.

Fires Break Out In Housing Project Which Took Negro

Chicago (U.P.)—A series of fires were set in the neighborhood of a federal housing project which accepted a Negro tenant, and an unruly crowd stoned police who tried to restore order, authorities said today.

Other violence had flared near the Trumbull Park Housing Project earlier this month when the Negro family moved in.

Police said that at least five fires, probably the work of arsonists, were extinguished last night by firemen. One of the blazes caused about \$15,000 damage. One was in a garage near the housing project and three were in stores.

Officers said "two or three" other fires may have been set and put out without assistance from authorities.

The crowd that milled about the neighborhood tossed stones at policemen, but let firemen pass unmolested.

Eight persons were arrested and six persons were taken to South Chicago Hospital for treatment of injuries.

Two policemen were injured slightly, one of them when he was bitten by a demonstrator.

Demonstrations and some violence began after the federal housing authorities accepted Negro postal worker Donald Howard as a tenant.

His life and that of his family is protected by a special squad of detectives.
