Later the group will visit Cairo, the pyramids and the Sphinx in Egypt. Miss Webster plans to leave the tour at that point and will visit Athens, Rome, several cities in France, Belgium, England and Scotland.

Miss Webster came to Medford in 1948 to set up the library at Camp White, and has worked for the Veterans' Administration as a librarian in Montana, South Dakota and Arkansas.
