SKILLET COCOA FUDGE

4 tablespoons butter or margarine 1/2 cup cocoa
1 1/2 cups milk 1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar
3 cups beet or cane sugar 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Melt butter or margarine in large skillet; tip skillet to grease sides well. Add milk and heat to boiling. Add sugar, cocoa and cream of tartar, stirring well with a wooden spoon to make sure all sugar is dissolved. Cook gently without stirring to soft-ball stage (see note) (236°F.); remove from heat and let stand, without moving or stirring, until candy is barely lukewarm (this is important for velvet smooth candy).

Add vanilla and beat until candy becomes creamy, and loses its gloss, about 8 minutes. Pour into a lightly greased 8-inch square pan. Cut into pieces while still warm.

Makes about 1 1/2 lbs. fudge. Note: When 1/2 teaspoon boiling syrup dropped into a cup of cold water forms a soft ball which can be picked up but flattens.

Steel Spring Used In Farmer's Corn Crib

Cleveland, O.—(U.P.)—The steel spring, used normally to suspend or cushion, has found its way into the farmer's corn crib.

The American Steel and Wire Division of U. S. Steel reports that a spring, three inches in diameter and 3 1/4 feet long, just tossed into a corner provides additional air spaces and natural ventilation to reduce moisture and prevent deterioration of the grain.

The spring, known as "Flexi-Vent," may be used in single units or several may be joined for longer sections.

Atomic Powered Cars Described as Nonsense

Rochester, N. Y.—(U.P.)—The possibility of development of an atomic-powered automobile was described as "nonsense" by Dr. William K. Ergen of the Oak Ridge (Tenn.) National Laboratory.

Ergen, attending the annual meeting of the American Physical Society here, said cost of installing nuclear reactors—machines which generate atomic power—would be too high. Even if this were not so, dangerous radiation would require shields and there is no known way of building such shields, he added.

He brought one from New York City to Sally and Melinda Melahn, four and five years old, 50 East Springfield avenue, Champaign. The address on the letter:

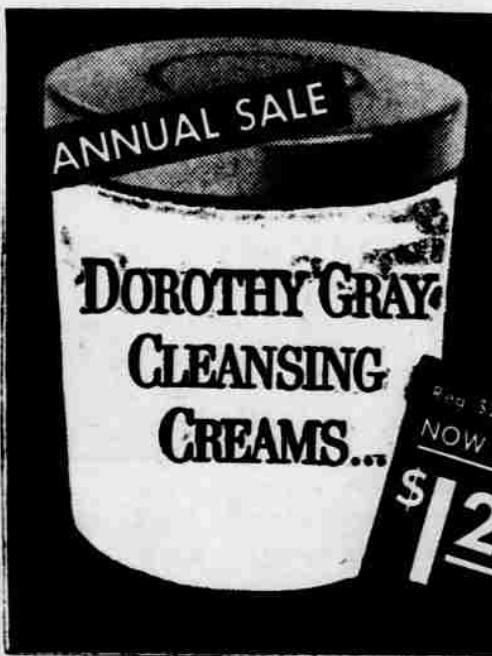

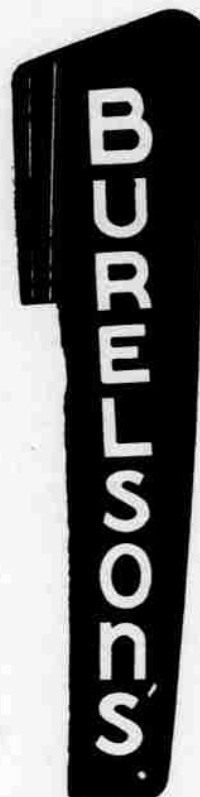
