

Black Hurls Dodgers To Triumph; Giants Out of Race; Yanks Lose

Seixas, Rosewall Post Easy Wins in U.S. Amateur Play

Forest Hills, N. Y. — (U.P.) — 1950 triumph was the last victory by an American, joined the advance as he upheld his fourth ranking with a 6-1, 6-1, 10-8 win over Mario Llamas of Mexico.

Progressing with him went sixth-seeded Straight Clark of Pasadena, Calif., and eighth-ranked Rom Brown Jr., of San Francisco, runner-up in 1946. Clark came back to best Steve Potts of Nashville, Tenn., 4-6, 6-1, 6-1, 6-3, while Brown beat Don Faye of Tacoma, Wash., 6-4, 6-4, 6-4.

Wimbledon champion Vic Seixas of Philadelphia, America's chief hope to regain the title, and Ken Rosewall, the big threat from down under, both posted easy first round triumphs as the 10-day tournament got underway in 107-degree heat.

But the big match of the day, for American tennis fathers desperately seeking future prospects to win back the coveted Davis cup from youth-loaded Australia, was the performance of the slugging six-footer from Atlanta, Ga.

Easier Time
Most of the other seeded players had a much easier time of it as Seixas, runner up for the title in 1951, walloped a fellow Philadelphian Mort Stern, 6-2, 6-2, 6-1, and Rosewall flattened Bernard Barten of San Angelo, Tex., with unexpected ease, 6-0, 6-4, 6-2.

Third-seeded Gardner Mulloy of Coral Gables, Fla., was pushed to a 6-4, 7-5, 6-4, opening round win by Hugh Sweeney of Los Angeles; Denmark's Kurt Nielsen, fourth-seeded foreigner, conquered George Ball of New York, 7-5, 6-2, 6-2, while Aussie Rex Hartwig downed Robin Willner of Los Angeles, 11-9, 6-3, 6-4.

New York — (U.P.) — Joe Black, Brooklyn's biggest disappointment, turned in his best effort of the season yesterday for a 10-3 victory over Cincinnati that mathematically eliminated the Giants from the National League pennant race.

Black, a year-long victim of the "sophomore jinx," took over for Rookie Johnny Podres in the fourth, allowed only two hits and gave up one run in the ninth for his sixth conquest of the year. The Dodger triumph, coupled with the Giants' 4-1 victory over Milwaukee, stretched Brooklyn's lead to 10 1/2 games.

Carl Furillo drove in three runs with his 21st homer, a double and a single to pace the Dodgers' 14-hit attack. Gus Bell of the Redlegs smashed his 28th homer off Podres in the third inning and then walloped his 29th for the only run scored off Black in the ninth.

Ruben Gomez registered his 12th victory by pitching the Giants to their triumph over the Braves but even so, the fifth-place New Yorkers lost all mathematical chance of overtaking the Dodgers.

Southpaw Paul Minner of the Cubs hurled a six-hit shutout to defeat the Phillies, 2-0, as Robin Roberts was tagged with his 11th loss against 21 victories.

Rip Repulski's 14th homer snapped a 3-all tie in the seventh inning and gave the Cards a 5-4 decision over the Pirates. Murry Dickson, who yielded the homer to Repulski, was charged with his 18th setback while Wilmer (Vinegar Bend) Mizell gained his 12th victory although needing relief in the ninth.

The Yankees' American League lead was shaved to 8 1/2 games when they bowed the Indians, 6-0, as the second-place White Sox defeated the Red Sox, 5-1.

Bob Lemon, Cleveland's sinkerball specialist, held the Yankees to three meager hits while racking up his 18th victory and third shutout of the year. In sweeping their three-game series with the league-leaders, the Indians got to Rookie Steve Kraly for three runs in the fourth and another in the fifth. Al Rosen in the fourth got his 35th homer.

Rookie Connie Johnson was credited with Chicago's triumph over the Red Sox although he needed help from veteran Virgil Trucks in the ninth. Southpaw Mel Parnell, seeking his 18th victory, was charged with his eighth loss instead.

In the only other game scheduled, Jackie Jensen hit a three-run homer and Bob Porterfield pitched seven-hit ball to pace Washington to a 7-2 victory over Detroit.

Phoenix Grid Future Up To Players

Phoenix — Whether Phoenix high school plays a football schedule this fall is strictly up to the boys, according to Coach Jack Woodward. He said it depends on whether enough boys turn out for the sport.

Ed Simmons Captures Championship at RVCC

Eddie Simmons yesterday won the club golf crown of Rogue Valley Country club.

Simmons, year after year a leading linksman on the local course, was 1-up over George Harrington, who last week capped the Oregon Golf association medal play mantle.

Harrington trailed Simmons a good share of the time in the 36-hole skirmish which opened Friday afternoon. Eddie was 2-up when the 31st hole of action was reached yesterday. Harrington grabbed the 33rd with a par to cut Simmons' lead to 1-up. The two halved the rest of the holes with pars.

Long Chip Clinches
Clincher for Simmons was a 40-foot chip shot that stopped inches from the hole. His adversary conceded the putt and the match.

The finalists went into the final 18 yesterday early in the afternoon after Simmons had gained a 1-up lead in the Friday round. Harrington birdied No. 19 to even the match and they halved the remaining holes on the front nine of the course, getting pars except on 22, which both bogied. Harrington three-putted on that green.

Simmons was one under par on the 28th to go 1-up and he took the next hole, too. Harrington cut down the gap with a birdie on the 30th but Eddie got the next to go 2-up once more.

Putting Hurts
Putting trouble was costly for Harrington who went 3-down the first nine holes on Friday.

Three-Way Tie In Golf Play

Wethersfield, Conn. — (U.P.) — A three-way tie in the home stretch yesterday sparked the possibility of a play-off match in the annual \$15,000 Insurance City Open Golf tournament.

Frank Stranahan, Toledo amateur, Jim Ferrier of San Francisco and Bobby Toski of Northampton, Mass., finished the third round with totals of 202. With one round left, the field was tightly bunched. If an 18-hole play-off is necessary, it would be held Monday.
