Interest Building Up In SO Golf Tourney

Interest is building up this week end for the Southern Oregon Golf tournament which opens on Thursday, September 3, at Rogue Valley Country club and continues through Monday, September 7, Labor day.

Qualifying play for local high handicappers, aiming for berths in lower flights, is already underway. About 15 men and women had made their rounds through yesterday and the number was expected to rise to 40 by this evening.

Club Pro A. Williams reported a total of 48 men's paid entries yesterday and said 12 or 13 women's entries were in.

From Many Towns Golfers from throughout western Oregon and from some parts of California and Washington are expected. Towns which will be represented in Oregon are Grants Pass, Ashland, Roseburg, Coos Bay, Klamath Falls, Bend, Oswego, Eugene, Portland, Corvallis and Salem. Linksmen are expected from Yreka, Eureka, Redding and McCloud, Calif., and from Vancouver, Wash.

Eddie Simmons, six times champion and shooting for his seventh, is among the leading local contenders in the scrap to wrest the crown from the head of Bob Atkinson, Portland. Others are ex-Medford high school aces, Bill McAllister Jr., now a Harvardite, Phil Getchell, Stanford student and Justin Smith Jr., University of Oregon student. Dom Provost, Ashland, is another Rogue Valley Country club hope as is Harry Millette, Yreka, and Leland Clark, Medford, an ex-southern Oregon champ.

A top entry is Dick Hanen, Coos Bay, a four time victor in the Labor day classic. Jim Sheldon, Salem, is always a contender.

Young Ladies Vie A couple of young ladies will be in the thick of battle to dethrone the perennial women's champion, Mrs. W. W. (Helen) Davies, Medford. The girls are Sue DeVoe, Medford, Oregon

Golf association junior tourney titlist and Carole Jo Kabler, Sutherlin, sensation and darling of the regular OGA struggle in Portland this spring.

Qualifying play for local high handicappers will continue through Tuesday for women and through Wednesday for men. Rogue Valley women gunning for a championship flight spot will qualify on Wednesday morning. They will be women with handicaps of 12 or less. Rogue Valley men trying for championship contention and all out-of-town men and women will qualify on Thursday.

Match play begins on Friday with all action for both men and women on the Medford links.

Upstart Hurler From C League Defeats Oakland

San Francisco — (U.P.) — The Pacific Coast league is supposed to be headed toward major league status, or something, so along comes a guy named Tony Ponce from the class C California league and wins a six-hitter in his debut with the San Francisco Seals.

Ponce was liberally splashed with red ink while toiling for the Seals, last-place Ventura farm club in the state league this year. He lost 20 games to set a loop record, although he also chalked up 15 wins for a team that is about 35 games off the pace.

Any latent talent the switch-hitting right-hander from Whittier had in his sturdy arm came to the fore Friday night as he handcuffed the Oaks with those six blows. And while Ponce performed at his best, the Seals lashed three Oakland hurlers for 15 hits and a 15-2 victory.

Medford high school football candidates had their first scrimmage Saturday morning and it was a hard one.

Head Coach Fred Spiegelberg assessed the results as fair. He reported a lot of hustle but indicated that his charges lacked finesse, although this lack is to be expected so early in the preparations for the season.

The scrimmage lasted for an hour and Coach Spiegelberg and his staff gave each youth approximately 20 minutes of offensive action. Not much variety was tried, only a half-dozen or so plays being used.

One Workout Yesterday morning's session was the only one of the day. Twice per day practices will resume on Monday. The morning workout is set for 10 o'clock and Spiegelberg said he is contemplating shift of the afternoon practice to 4 o'clock. Practices have been at 5 p.m. If the weather cooperates by remaining cool, the earlier afternoon hour will be scheduled, the mentor indicated.

The Saturday hassle gave evidence the Medford will be rather well fixed at the left half slot. Alton Stone, who won his letter as a sophomore last year, is one of the main hopes in the Black Tornado backfield this fall. However, the 165-pounder may get some keen competition from a couple of inexperienced seniors before the season is over. The two are George Huber, 140, and Lloyd Hart, 170. All three ran hard in the scrimmage.

Look Impressive The first line youths in the battle for the positions looked impressive yesterday. This gang was Norm Chapman, 187 senior, and Mike DeVore, 184 junior, centers; Bob Steele, 195, and Willard Lilly, 153, senior guards, and Don McLaughlin, 175, and Bob Rasmussen, 183, senior tackles, all are lettermen.

Joe Antony, 182 senior letterman, did well at his end slot and at the other flank a real struggle seemed likely between Gary Strong, 147 senior letterman, and Dale Gott, six-foot two-inch, 175 senior with junior varsity experience.

After the first week of practices, it appears that the Black Tornado is pretty well fixed for a starting line-up but Coaches Spiegelberg, Bob Newland and Paul Evensen, with their present helpers, Frank Roelandt, Jim Warren, Mel Boldenow and Bill Shepherd have some work ahead grooming reserves to give the club depth. Roelandt and Warren will shift to jayvee concentration after school starts and Boldenow and Shepherd will take over junior high chores.

52 On Roster The Black Tornado roster now lists 52 men. Of these 17 are seniors and 18, each, juniors and sophomores.

At the ends Antony is the only two striper while Strong has received one letter. Others out for end jobs, in addition to these two and Gott, are Dick Foulon, 149, and Virgil Jones, 165, juniors without experience; Cliff Pederson, 147, and Jerry Gatlin, 156, sophs and Gary Hart, a senior.

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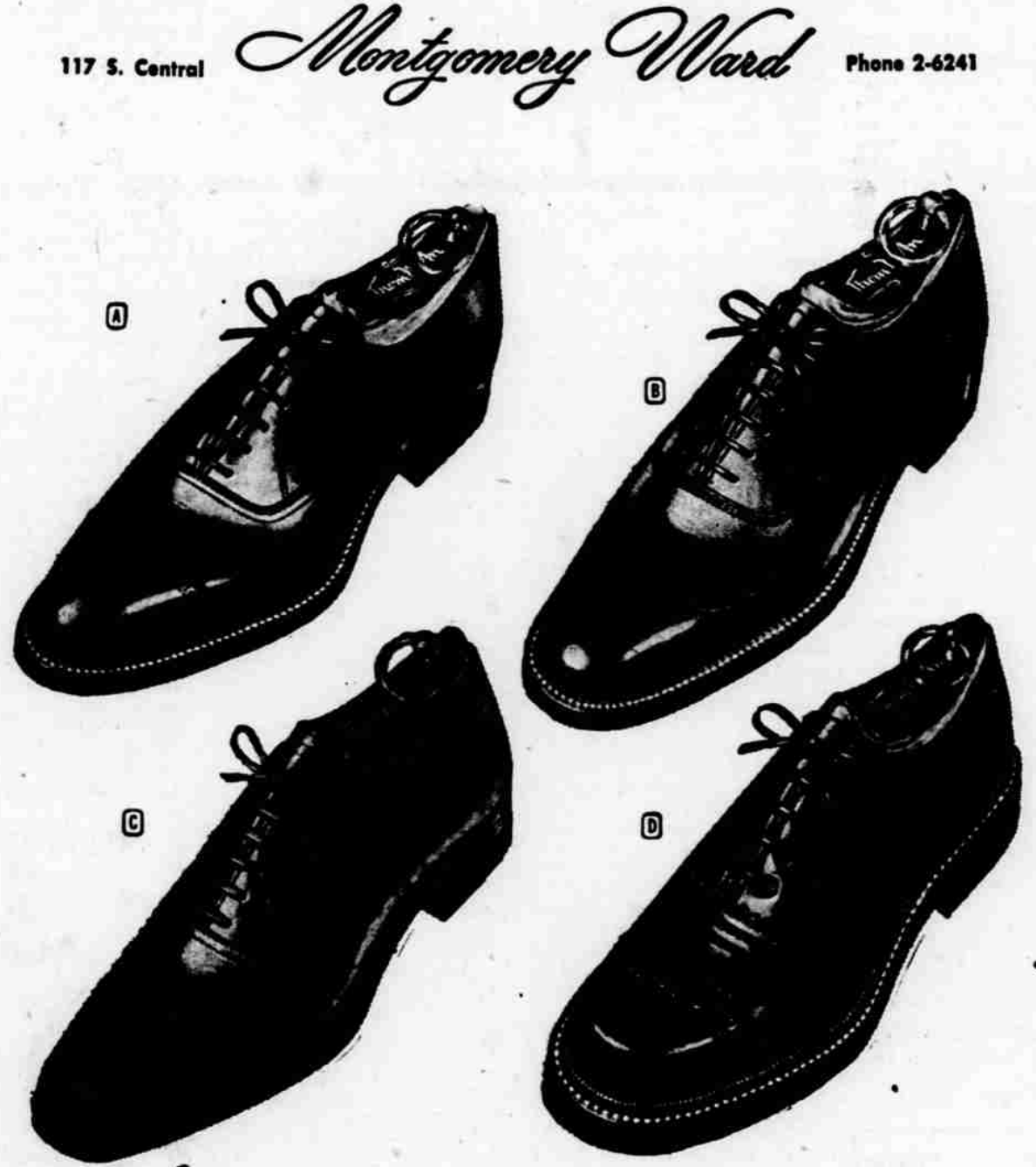
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
