

Sept. 6 Election Set By Adenauer as Fight On Red Domination

Bonn, Germany — (U.P.) — Chancellor Konrad Adenauer has chosen to fight the parliamentary election campaign on the flat statement by opposition Socialists that West Germans cannot choose yet between East and West.

Adenauer was reported angered by the Socialist challenge dropped in a press conference Friday by four members of the party executive.

"Must Decide" In a speech at Kiel, Adenauer declared, "West Germany must decide in the Sept. 6 elections whether the Soviet Union shall

dominate Europe or not. He said the Socialists want a neutral Germany. "There is no longer any such thing as neutrality," Adenauer said.

The Socialist leaders said all plans for integrating West Germany into a united Europe must be dropped until the Big Four decides Germany's fate.

They said the United States, Britain, France and Russia must ultimately decide which "system" a unified Germany would fit into—East, West or "neutral."

Pro-Nazi forces looked to one of Adolf Hitler's top Luftwaffe fighter aces to lead a drive for votes in the election and bring about a serious political comeback for them.

Former Col. Hans Ulrich Rudel, 37-year-old ace who lost a leg in the war, returned to Germany Friday from a four-year exile in Argentina and was thrust into the forefront of the campaign of the ultra-rightist Reich party (DRP).

Attorneys Prepare Battle on Commies In U.S. Schools

Denver — (U.P.) — Delegates attending the third annual conference of the National Association of County and Prosecuting attorneys prepared to return home Saturday and wage a fight to weed Communists out of schools.

The group Friday elected Denver District Attorney Bert Keating as president, succeeding Miles F. McDonald, district attorney of Brooklyn.

New Officers Other new officers named were Harold Kennedy of Los Angeles, executive vice president; Severen T. Darden of New Orleans, first vice president in the Criminal Division; Park Campbell of Miami, Fla., first vice president in the Civil Division; Anselm Sodaro of Baltimore, secretary, and Granville Scanlan of Oklahoma City, treasurer.

The group adopted a resolution patterned after a bill introduced in California this year calling for closing the teaching profession to anyone who has been a Communist or who refuses to testify before legal Communist hunting bodies.

Battle Against Subversion An accompanying committee report said: "It is the duty of county law officers to do everything possible to fight the world Communism movement, the Communist Party of the United States, and subversion against government wherever it may be found."

The delegates were urged to introduce legislation similar to the California measures in their home states.

Volunteers Rebuild Tornado-Hit Suburb

Flint, Mich. — (U.P.) — More than 800 professional building tradesmen and 2,800 volunteers turned out Saturday for the "world's biggest building bee," as this city of 275,000 started rebuilding a tornado devastated suburb.

The workers swarmed through the Beecher metropolitan district for the start of the two-day home building marathon.

The goal was 111 new houses for those left homeless when a tornado swept through the Beecher district last June 8, killing 116 persons.

Mayor Donald Reigle called for 5,000 volunteers, saying "we need anyone who can swing a hammer or carry a brick."

General Motors Plans To Borrow \$150,000,000 Washington — (U.P.) — General Motors Acceptance Corp. plans to borrow \$150,000,000 soon and may have to borrow more later to keep up with the current heavy demand for consumer credit, according to a statement filed Saturday with the Securities and Exchange commission.

GMAC, which extends loans for purchases of General Motors products, borrowed another \$77,000,000 earlier this month.

Oregon Man Among Returned Prisoners

Merrill — (U.P.) — A Merrill, Ore., man is among American prisoners of war released Friday night by the Reds in Korea. He is Pvt. Lowell E. Snapp, whose mother told the United Press she is so happy that if the

ceiling wasn't overhead, she'd go right on through.

Mrs. Snapp said she hasn't received a letter from her son since June 11, 1952—three days before he was captured. She said, however, she has received

two letters from his buddies who were repatriated.

The 23-year-old Snapp was drafted in May, 1951 and served in the Medical corps.
