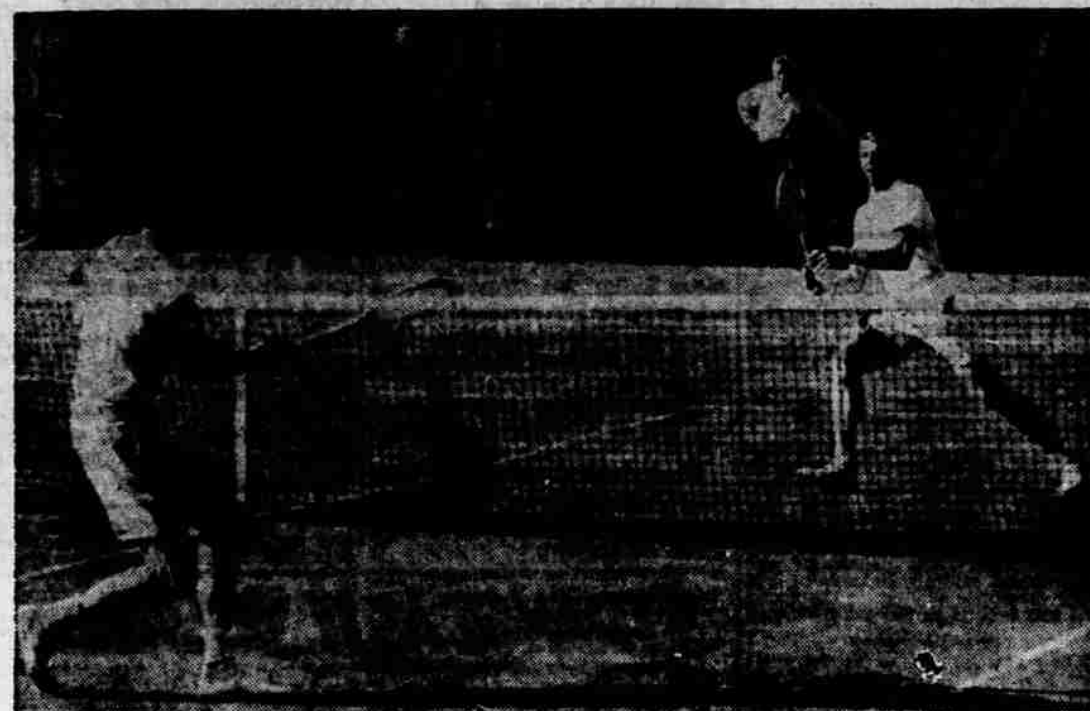

Ex-Polish Army Commander Sees Possible Troop Rally

Paris (U.P.)—The Philadelphia appeal by two refugee Polish pilots for formation of a free Polish fighting force focused attention on a "forgotten" army of nearly 225,000, demobilized and scattered with peace. Nearly 120,000 of the former soldiers who, from the invasion of Poland to the fall of Berlin, wrote many of World War Two's most gallant chapters are still in Britain. Others have scattered but men like wartime free Polish Chief, Lieutenant General Wladyslaw Anders, who commanded the crack second Polish Corps in wartime Italy, believe they would rally rapidly to fill the ranks of a new free Polish Corps.

Spirits Raised—Polish lieutenants Franciszek Jarecki and Sdzislaw Jarzinski, in fact, raised exile Polish spirits to one of their highest points since victory in Europe brought demobilization of their units, and reduced some of their most experienced officers to dishwashing jobs.

Many of the Polish veterans have been pressing since the war for remobilization and the dramatic appeal from America's "cradle of liberty," by the two daring pilots who donated two late model MIG 15 jet fighters.
