

Political Circles Buzzing With Rumors of Warren's Appointment

Sacramento — (U.P.) — Washington and Sacramento political circles buzzed today with rumors that Gov. Earl Warren of California will be appointed to the U.S. Supreme court to succeed Chief Justice Fred M. Vinson.

Ever since the election of President Eisenhower last November, Warren's name has been linked in California with a Supreme court appointment.

Refuses to Comment
Warren's announcement last week that he will not be a candidate for a fourth term as governor lent credence to the rumors, and the death of Justice Vinson today opened up a berth in the high court.

Warren has steadfastly refused to talk about an appointment to the high court. Upon learning of the death of Vinson, he issued a brief statement expressing regret and praising Vinson as a "great American."

Questions Refused
But on the excuse that he was too busy working on a batch of judicial appointments, Warren cancelled his regular Tuesday morning press conference and refused to answer queries sent to his office.

Only last week, a "highly-placed administration source" in Washington said he was "confident" President Eisenhower will appoint the 63-year-old Republican to the next vacancy on the Supreme court.

Vienna, Ga. — (U.P.) — Sen. Walter F. George, (D-Ga.), said today he believes that, should President Eisenhower nominate Republican Gov. Earl Warren of California to the Supreme court vacancy created by the death of Chief Justice Fred M. Vinson, "he would be promptly confirmed by the Senate."

George said he was "pro-

foundly grieved" at the news of Vinson's death.

George said he had been impressed with Warren's ability as a lawyer and felt that President Eisenhower "might consider him" for the court vacancy. He said that if the President makes the appointment he believes it will be to Vinson's place as Chief Justice.

"I don't think there would be any objection to Warren in the Senate," George said, "and I think he would be confirmed promptly. I believe Warren to be a man of great ability."

The death today of Chief Justice Fred M. Vinson leaves the following associate justices on the bench of the Supreme court of the United States:

Hugo L. Black of Alabama, appointed Aug. 12, 1937; Stan-

ley Reed of Kentucky, appointed Jan. 15, 1938; Felix Frankfurter of Massachusetts, appointed March 20, 1939; Robert H. Jackson of New York appointed June 12, 1941; Harold H. Burton of Ohio, appointed Sept. 18, 1945; Thomas C. Clark of Texas, appointed July 28, 1949; and Sherman Minton of Indiana, appointed Sept. 15, 1949.

All of the justices with the exception of the last three, Burton, Clark and Minton, were appointed by the late Franklin D. Roosevelt. The others were appointed by former President Truman.

All but Burton are Democrats. Frankfurter at 71 is the oldest of the associate justices now on the Supreme court bench. The ages of the others are: Black, 57; Reed, 60; Douglas 55; Jackson 61; Burton, 65; Clark, 54, and Minton, 63.

French Nobleman Who Owns Land in Oregon Named in Judgment

Portland — (U.P.) — U. S. District Judge Gus J. Solomon had under advisement today a motion seeking summary judgment to compel a French nobleman, owner of a large ranch in Deschutes and Klamath counties, to pay a \$31,500 attorney fee claimed by a Washington, D. C., lawyer.

Balance of \$31,500 Claimed
Defendant in the motion in federal court here is Marquis Regis T. de Maleissye, 34, a native and still citizen of France who is now a permanent resident of the United States. His holdings in Deschutes and Klamath

counties are known as "Wagon-trail ranch."

Plaintiff John Wattawa claims in the suit the balance of \$31,500 on a \$36,500 attorney fee.

Wattawa, in a suit filed in U. S. district court Feb. 15, 1952, stated that he and de Maleissye entered into contract in July, 1947, under which the defendant agreed to pay \$5,000 down and the balance by the end of 1948. However, the lawyer claims only \$5,000 has been paid to date.

The complaint says de Maleissye inherited a net of \$712,000 from the estate of a New York woman and that Wattawa's services were sought to enable the Frenchman to obtain his inheritance without being subject to certain regulations of both the French and U. S. governments.

Claims Successful
Wattawa claims he successfully performed his services and the defendant was admitted to this country on a permanent basis in March, 1947, and later received his distributive share on May 13, 1947.

In answer to the complaint, de Maleissye said his attorney "took fraudulent advantage of an attorney-client relationship for the purpose of obtaining an exorbitant fee far above the reasonable value of services rendered."

De Maleissye also contends in his answer that he was induced to sign the fee contract by fear that the attorney would use his influence against de Maleissye's interests "if the defendant ever incurred the plaintiff's displeasure." He further alleged the attorney attempted to mislead and frighten him into believing he would lose part of his inheritance if the services of the plaintiff were not successful in gaining him permanent residence in the United States.

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Spain Expected To Join Global Battle Against Communism

Washington — (U.P.) — Spain was a neutral in two world wars but is expected to renounce her isolation by month's end to become a willing partner of the United States in the global battle against Communism.

James C. Dunn, U. S. ambassador to Spain, has been here to arrange final details of a military agreement between the two governments. The Pentagon brass holds that signature of the agreement will enormously strengthen a backs to the wall defense line against Communism which extends from Great Britain south and eastward into North Africa.

Protected From Invasion

Spain lies behind the rugged Pyrenees, a natural fortification against all but air attack but, likewise, a shield behind which air and naval bases can be safe from a panzer thrust such as overran the plains of Europe in World War II.

The agreement with Spain is for United States air and naval bases. It will provide:

1. Modernization of Spanish air bases for use of U. S. strategic bombers. These will supplement U. S. bases in French Morocco.

2. The use of protected Spanish harbors by the U. S. Sixth Fleet now in the Mediterranean. In these the Sixth Fleet could be reinvigorated and fueled for many months of sudden war.

Money for Spain

3. For Spain, \$215,400,000 for military and economic aid. This defense support will help modernization of road, rail and telecommunications, all vital in war.

4. A further shot in the arm for the Spanish economy from an estimated \$150,000,000 to be spent there by the U. S. Air Force and additional purchases in Spain of supplies for U. S. and Allied forces.

5. Arms and possibly new machinery for Spanish arms factories. Slated for Spain are American made heavy artillery, fighter airplanes, radar, communications and similar equipment with the ammunition and supplies necessary to maintain the operation.

The agreement, when signed, will not be a formal alliance. But it will provide for instant consultation in the event of aggression. There is no question here but that in such circumstances, Spain would become an all-out ally of the United States.

Employment Sets Record on Coast

San Francisco — (U.P.) — A record 5,052,000 industrial and commercial workers were employed on the Pacific Coast in mid-July, it was announced today.

Max Kossoris of the Department of Labor, said there were 41,000 more workers on payrolls in July than in June, primarily because of the peak activity in seasonal food processing plants on the coast.

Largest Gains in Oregon

Kossoris said the largest gains were made in Oregon, where a survey showed employment increased 2.5 per cent over June. The lumber industry showed no appreciable gain.

Washington's increase of 1.2 per cent was due mostly to food processing with aircraft production running second.

In California, employment increased less than 1 per cent, Kossoris said. Food processing increases were partly offset by a reduction in contract construction and government.

Total employment for the three states in July showed California with 3,814,000; 759,000 in Washington, and 479,000 in Oregon.

For 43 years from 1898 to 1941, New Hampshire and Massachusetts were under the same governors although each province maintained its identity.

Final Respects Paid To Gen. Wainwright

Arlington, Va. — (U.P.) — A nation that has always admired good losers paid final tribute today to Gen. Jonathan M. Wainwright, hero of the most humiliating American military defeat of World War II.

The gaunt cavalryman who earned the Congressional Medal of Honor for his dauntless defense of Bataan and Corregidor was to be buried with full military honors in Arlington National cemetery.

Also, nearby, on the grass-carpeted burial ground of heroes overlooking the Potomac river, was the tomb of Wainwright's father, Maj. Robert P. Wainwright.

Wainwright, known affectionately throughout the Army as

"Skinny," died at San Antonio, Tex., last week from a blood clot of the brain. He was 70.

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
