WEST'S 6,000,000th TELEPHONE GOES TO WORK

Interstate Telegraph Company installs milestone instrument in Barstow, California

A veteran of Korea and his wife are making calls this week over the West's 6,000,000th telephone. It was installed September 2nd, by the Interstate Telegraph Company (an affiliate of the California Electric Power Company) which provides telephone service in Barstow and the surrounding territory. The Williams' telephone brings the total serving the West to almost double what it was at the end of World War II—a remarkable growth record made possible by the combined efforts of more than 200 telephone companies.



1. Booming Barstow has grown 25% just since 1950... and population estimates forecast its present 9,100 may triple in the next five years. As in other parts of the West, this growth meant a record-breaking demand for telephone service and a record-setting rate of telephone installations.

Secret War II Building Given To Wrecking Crews

Ames, Ia. — (U.P.) — A drab, patch-work building of wooden-framed rooms in which one of the deepest secrets of World War II was kept has been turned over to wrecking crews.

Annex No. 1, better known as Little Ankeny, was the factory that produced much of the pure uranium metal so vital to creating the atom bomb.

For a time, Little Ankeny was the leading producer.

It sat on the campus of Iowa State College where it had served variously as a women's gymnasium, popcorn laboratory, warehouse and garage.

Actually, the building was designed "temporary" when erected at the end of World War I and it was condemned when World War II came along.

But it was the most historic and important building at the institution when the end of the war came — although only a handful of scientists knew this.

The real story of Little Ankeny began in 1942 when Dr. F. H. Spedding of the Iowa State College staff was asked to solve certain chemical problems in connection with the large-scale release of atomic energy.

"The most pressing problem facing us," said Dr. Spedding, "was the preparation of pure uranium metal in large amounts."

New methods developed at

Iowa State radically reduced the cost of casting large ingots of the pure metal. Two new processes of making uranium metal were so promising that the college was awarded grants to carry through the pilot stage and produce tons of metal to start the atomic energy machine being built in Chicago.

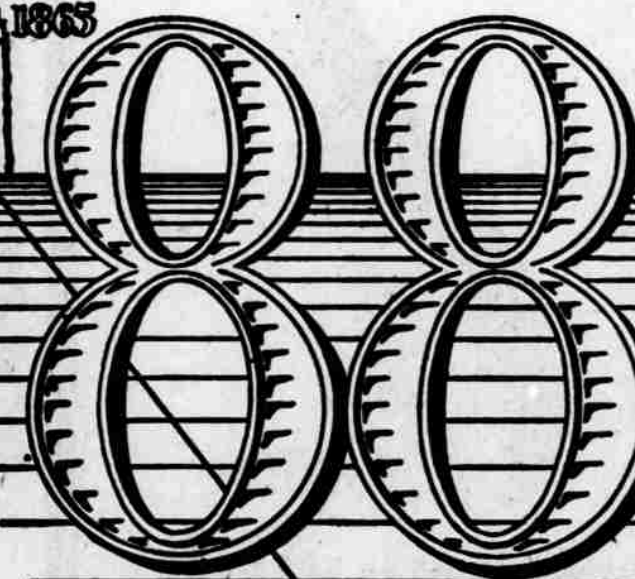
By 1944, when other plants came into operation, Little Ankeny had produced more than 2,000,000 pounds of uranium.

The processes developed by Dr. Spedding and his group saved hundreds of millions of dollars, bringing the processing cost of the metal down to about 30 cents a pound.

Little Ankeny was a three-room building at the start of its atomic operation, but by the end of the war additional rooms had been tacked on here and there and nearby sheds were incorporated into the building by roofing the intervening space. Eventually it covered three times its original area.

Residents of Ames were curious and knew the strange manufacturing plant was closely connected with the war effort, so they dubbed it Little Ankeny after the Ankeny Ordnance plant 25 miles south of Ames.

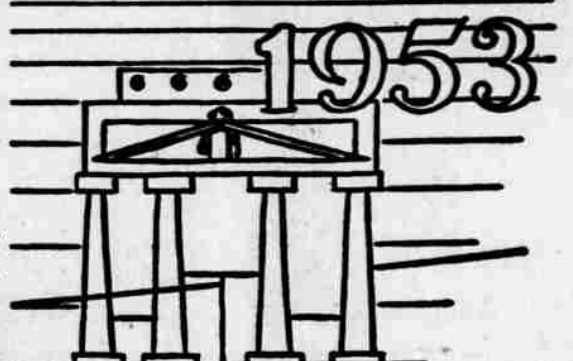
The buildings of the Institute of Atomic Research on the Iowa State campus have now taken over the work of Little Ankeny.
