 San Francisco — (U.P.) — Hollywood's slightly faded Stars had their second straight Pacific Coast League pennant nailed to the mast today and the spotlight swung to a three-way battle for third place between Los Angeles, Portland and San Francisco.

Sacramento actually clinched the flag for the Stars by toppling Seattle in the first game of a Labor day double-header yesterday, 7-3, to erase the Sud's last hope of staying alive. The Rainiers then yielded easily in the finale, 12-0.

In the meantime, the Stars had suffered a 5-0 shutout at the hands of the last place Oakland Aces in their first contest. But Hollywood took the nightcap 3-1.

Seals Took Both
 The Seals opened an all-out drive for third place by sweeping a twin bill from the Angeles, 5-4 and 7-2. The surprise coup hauled the fifth place Seals to within two games of the Cherubs.

Fourth place Portland, on a game behind the Angeles, missed a chance to move into a tie with them by splitting a nocturnal twin bill with San Diego. The Padres won the seven-inning opener 15-4 and Portland salvaged the finale, 4-1.

Kroll Wins Celebrities Golf Title

Washington — (U.P.) — Lightning refused to strike twice for lantern jawed Lew Worsham, so little Ted Kroll walked away today with first prize of \$2400 in the National Celebrities Golf Tournament.

Worsham, the former U. S. Open champion from Oakmont, Pa., is the man who made the most famous golf shot of the current season, a 140-yard chip shot that he holed out on the very last hole to win the Tam O'Shanter Tournament last month by one stroke.

But yesterday Worsham came down to the final green needing to sink a 12-foot putt to tie Kroll of New Hartford, N. Y., for first place with a 281 score for 72 holes.

Worsham studied the putt and gently stroked. The ball rolled to the cup, rolled slowly around the rim, and off. It stopped inches away and Worsham had to settle for second prize of \$1800.

Cary Middlecoff of Memphis, Marty Furgol of Lemont, Ill., and Shelley Mayfield of Chicopee, Mass., finished in a three way tie for third place at 284, each earning \$1200.

In the celebrities division, the silver plate prize went to William C. Ford, grandson of the late Henry Ford, for shooting an 85 in Sunday's driving rain. In the division for Washington officials, first prize went to former U. S. Senator Harry Cain (R-Wash.), who also shot a rain soaked 85.

 New York — (U.P.) — Roy Campanella is fast settling most arguments about who should be the National League's most valuable player.

He simply is running away from his competitors with one of the finest all-around jobs ever turned in by a major league catcher. The roly poly Brooklyn receiver now has hit more homers than any other catcher in the history of the business, 39, and has driven in more runs, 136. He has a healthy .320 batting average and generally is acknowledged to be the top receiver in the majors.

 San Antonio, Tex. — (U.P.) — Joe Arenas plunged over from one yard out in the last 10 seconds of play last night to give the San Francisco Forty Niners a thrilling 31 to 28 victory over the Philadelphia Eagles in an exhibition National Football League game.

The touchdown climaxed a wild, see-saw affair. The lead changed hands three times during the contest.

The Eagles were out in front 14 to 7 at halftime and Philadelphia led 21 to 17 at the close of the third period.

In other National League competition, the Cardinals twice defeated Cincinnati, 4-3 and 1-0, and the Pirates humbled the Giants 9-7 and 5-3.

Al Widmar Hurls 20th Victory; Lint Posts 19

San Francisco — (U.P.) — Al Widmar of Seattle became the Pacific Coast league's second 20-game winner last week and it appeared today that only two other pitchers had a chance at the magic circle.

Widmar upped his record to 20 wins and 13 losses with a victory over San Diego and joined Allen Gettel of Oakland, a 23-game winner who has been over the 20 mark for more than a month.

Royce Lint of Portland and George O'Donnell of Hollywood each had posted 19 wins through Sunday according to figures released today by league statistician William Weiss and appeared likely to break the 20 game mark before the season ends Sunday.

There were no 18 game winners in the loop at the beginning of the final week and Memo Luna of San Diego, a 17-game winner, was the only other pitcher within three victories of the charmed circle.

Chicago Cards Upset Rams, 23-10, in Portland Fracas

Portland — (U.P.) — The Chicago Cardinals outplayed the Los Angeles Rams to gain a 23-10 upset victory last night in an exhibition professional football game before 26,210 fans.

The victory was considered a "revenge" for Cardinal Coach Joe Stydahar, who was replaced as Los Angeles coach during last year's season.

The Cardinals held the Rams in check throughout the game except for two explosive scoring thrusts.

Chicago scored first on a 72-yard march in seven plays, climaxed when powerful Ralph Pasquariello scored from the three yard line.

A few minutes later, Wallace Triplett raced back a punt 53 yards to the Ram 38. Joe Nagel shot a seven-yard pass to Charley Trippi, who scored the Cards' second touchdown.

With a 14-point lead, the Cardinals were never headed after that. The Rams scored in the first when Paul Younger took a hand off from Norman Van Brocklin and went 26 yards through the middle.

Joe Geri added to the Chicago scoring with a field goal in the third quarter. Ben Agajanian of the Rams also had a field goal, which came after a 60-yard run by halfback Vitamin Smith.

The Cardinals went 44 yards in eight plays for the last touchdown in the final period, with Pasquariello plunged over from the one.

Pap Waldorf Starts 27th Grid Year

 San Francisco — (U.P.) — When gray haired, 51-year-old Lynn "Pappy" Waldorf lumbers out onto the field Sept. 19 with his California Golden Bears against the Baylor Bears, it will mark the start of his 27th season in the coaching ranks.

It also makes him the third oldest active collegiate coach in point of service. Lou Little of Columbia is No. 1, unless Amos Alonzo Stagg decides to come out of retirement.

Seventh Year at Cal
 As coaches go, Waldorf is not exactly what would be called a "gad-about." He was at Northwestern for 12 years; and this is his seventh campaign as the head man at California.

A fine orator and master of the double-talk, Waldorf has gained much of his fame as a "football organizer." He is noted for the quality of the assistants he hires, his current top aides being Wes Fry and Herm Meister, both acknowledged masters in their professions.

As the season starts, Waldorf has one of the great all-time records in the major coaching ranks. During his lifetime his teams have won 156 games, lost 71 and tied 19.

"Has Built A Giant"
 But his great success has been scored at California, where he has taken the Bears to the Rose Bowl three times in six years; and where he has an over all record of 53 wins nine defeats and one tie.

He came to California, he said, because it offered "great opportunity" and it represented a "slumbering giant."

This year his Golden Bears aren't expected to finish better than third in the Pacific Coast Conference race. But when Pappy finishes his 1953 organizational chore it wouldn't be considered too great an upset if the Bears again were back in the Rose Bowl — the only place where Waldorf and his Strawberry Canyon boys haven't had much success.

WINS MID-COLUMBIA
 The Dalles — (U.P.) — Bob Donnelly of Portland's Columbia-Edgewater club won the 14th annual men's Mid-Columbia Amateur golf title yesterday with a 71, good for an even-par 144 for 36 holes. Ruth Jensen, Seattle, won the women's crown with a 165.
