



Doreen Bohnert Tops Local 4-H Club Winners at State Fair; Elmores Win Ribbons

Miss Doreen Bohnert, Central Point, headed local 4-H club members participating at the Oregon State fair last week with seven first or second wins in the Hereford beef division.

The awards were 4-H herd projects: first, cow, heifer and heifer calf; first, cow and calf; first, cow; second, two-year-old heifer; second, yearling heifer; first, calf and the Hereford breed championship. Jackson county placed second in the county herd award.

Another beef division winner was Miss Mildred Gail of Gold Hill who gained a fourth and seventh place in the steer division of the shorthorn classification.

Local members also copped places in swine exhibits, feeding and showmanship. In the black and spotted Poland China division, market hogs, Truman and Russell Elmore, Applegate, won a blue ribbon and Charles Elmore, Applegate, won a red ribbon.

In pig feeding, Russell and Charles Elmore won red ribbons. Each pen of three market hogs was first judged alive, then one pig slaughtered and judged on carcass grade.

In showmanship, intermediate division, Charles Elmore won sixth place. In the junior division, Russell Elmore won fourth and Truman Elmore, fifth.

Forestry project winners from Jackson county included the following: forestry I, blue ribbon, Stephen Smith, Medford; red ribbons, David Young, Central Point, Margaret Taylor, Central Point and Donald Smith, Medford. Forestry II, red ribbons, Carl Skyrman, Central Point, and Frances Krouse, Murphy. Forestry III, red ribbon, Carl Dobrot, Central Point.

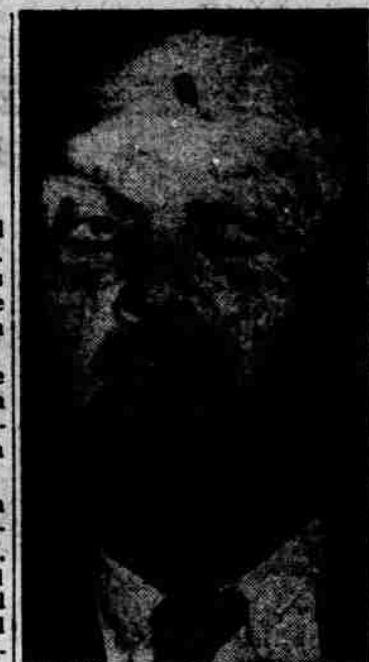

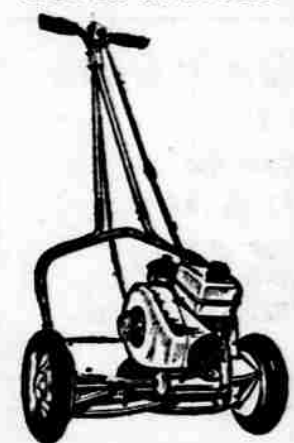
Fisherman Combines Yo-Yo Practicing
