

Eleven New Faculty Members Named At Southern Oregon

Ashland—Eleven new faculty members have been added to the staff of Southern Oregon college in Ashland. President Elmo N. Stevenson said Saturday.

The appointees are Ruth L. Daum, assistant professor in home economics; Clarence E. Diebel, assistant professor of science; Dr. Alvin L. Fellers, assistant professor of English; Dennis G. Hannan, assistant professor in languages; and DeWayne B. Johnson, editor of publications and assistant professor of English. Instructors and supervisors of teachers at the Lincoln elementary laboratory school are Alma I. Bingham, Everett W. Daugherty, David F. Hill, Arthur T. Phillips, Audrey Zaworski, and Elsie Tucker, assistant professor of education and supervising teacher.

In making announcement of the new appointments, Dr. Stevenson said four regular members of the college staff were going on sabbatical leave this following year. Associate Professor of Art, Marion Ady, is studying native art in the Bahamas; Dean of Men and Associate Professor of Social Science, Marshall E. Woodell, and Assistant Professor of Science Lloyd D. Pennington are both studying at Oregon State college for doctors' degrees, and Assistant Professor of Music Glenn T. Matthews is to work for his doctorate at the University of Oregon.

Catherine Lee Hulman, lecturer in vocal music, resigned to move to Reno, Nev., and Mrs. Margaret Skerry, director of food services and assistant dean of women, also left the college staff for personal reasons.

Returning to the college staff after a year's leave is Dr. Elliott B. MacCracken who has just completed his doctorate in education at Stanford university. Dr. MacCracken returns as associate professor of mathematics and science.

Other changes: In other personnel changes, Dr. Stevenson said David M. A. Barker, assistant professor of education, had resigned to take a position as a secondary school principal in Sweet Home, Ore., where his wife will also work as an elementary school supervisor. Also resigning for reasons of personal advancement from the staff of Lincoln school were John H. Black, Marion Korn, John Waldo and Richard F. Traylor.

William T. Dawkins, who recently joined Iverson Printing in Ashland as general manager was an instructor in English at the college since 1950 before his resignation.

Robert L. Edwards, also a former instructor in English and public relations director at the college, accepted a new position in the personnel department of the Corning Glass company in Corning, N. Y. His wife, Charleen, also taught at the college before the Edwards moved.

Ellsworth Scheduled To Speak Sept. 18

County Court Will Receive Petitions

The Kenwood water district will present a petition before the Jackson county court Sept. 18. The district has already been approved, but the petition is in the nature of a more definite statement of boundaries.

Residents of the area seek Medford city water for their area, which is outside city limits. The district has been defined as starting 500 feet south of McAndrews rd. on Biddle rd. then to Cullen and Curry, where the line will run east on Morrow about 2,000 feet, thence south to include Lakewood subdivision except the part on McAndrews rd.

The project, which is expected to serve about 350 persons in 90 or more outlets, is expected to see completion by spring. Eugene Shelton is chairman of board for the district.

Bad Checks Passed In City Recently

Two fictitious \$10 checks signed with the same name were passed recently in Medford, according to city police records.

On Sept. 4, a man purchased about \$850 in merchandise at McLain's Drug center at 8 north Central ave., and received \$1.50 in cash, the record stated. The passer bought a vaporizer and some medicine, saying he had a sick baby girl.

The other check was passed at Anderson's Super Thrift market at 711 South Central ave. last weekend. No information could be remembered by clerks as to what was purchased.

The drug store employees described the check passer as about 35 years, 6 feet tall, thin build and "very bad teeth." He entered the store during the storm and was "drenched from the rain," they reported.

Trail Man Arraigned On Charge of Rape

Archie Alexander Detillan, 65, trail, was arraigned in district court here Friday morning on a charge alleging rape of a 7-year-old girl Aug. 31.

District Judge Rawles Moore ordered Detillan bound over to the grand jury and a bond of \$2,500 was set. He was committed to county jail after he waived counsel.

Detillan is on parole from Oregon State prison where he was committed on a charge of larceny of a motor vehicle.

Fireblight Spray Needs More Tests, County Agent Says

Control of a pear and apple tree bacterial disease, known as fireblight, with antibiotic drugs needs further testing before it is ready for orchardists, C. B. Cordy, Jackson county horticulturist, states.

The use of the new drug looks promising but is expensive and should be developed further, Cordy said in connection with an announcement at a session of the American Institute of Biological Sciences at the University of Wisconsin.

Dr. Robert N. Goodman of the University of Missouri described successful experiments with a combination of streptomycin and Terramycin on apple trees. Some of the trees had been inoculated with the disease and others were infected naturally. Dosages ranging from 100 to 500 parts of antibiotic per million of water were effective on 112 trees employed in the work. Sprays were applied during bloom and for three weeks after bloom.

Should Remove Branches A few pieces of blight can be found in many orchards, Cordy said, and orchardists should remove the branches of blight immediately after harvest when there is more chance of the disease spreading. The more vigorous the tree the faster the disease spreads. After picking the chance of disease increases.

Trees which were infected naturally in the orchard required less of the antibiotics to control the disease than did those inoculated with the disease in greenhouse studies, Dr. Goodman reports.

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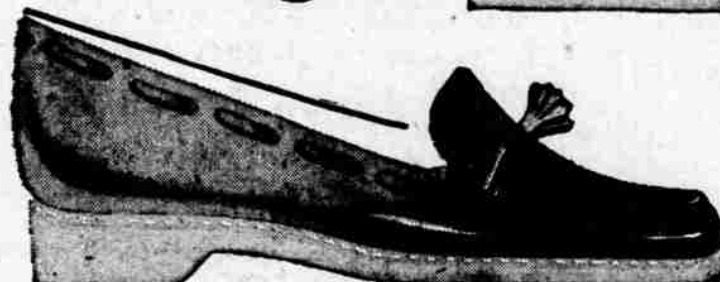
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
