Mrs. Helen Fairfield served as commentator for the show, and Abby Green furnished music. Allen Hunt designed the program covers.—O.S.

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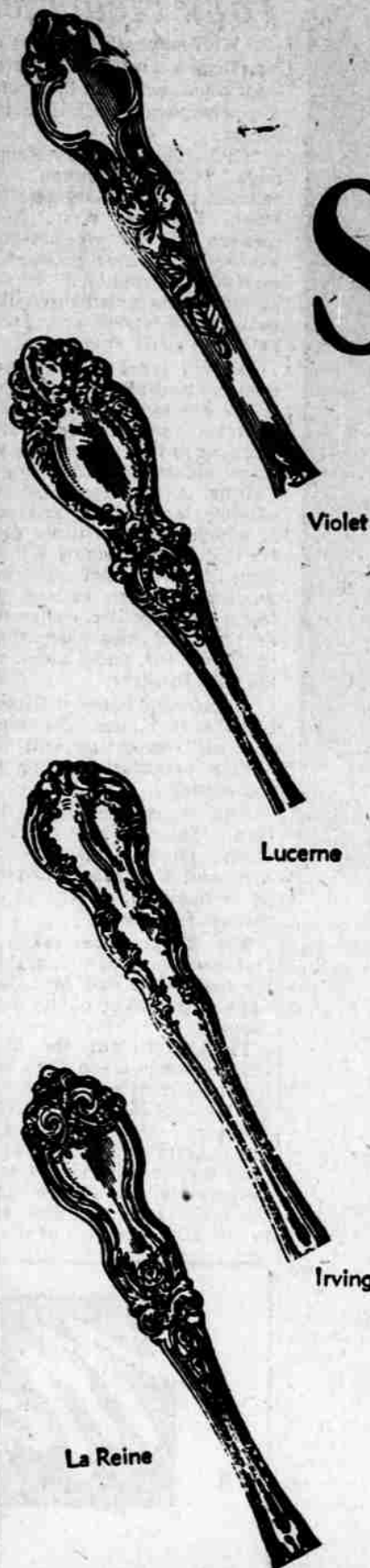
