

HOMER BEATS DODGERS, 4-2

New York — (U.P.) — Mickey Mantle drove a home run into the left field grandstand with two out and one on in the eighth inning today to give the Yankees a 4-2 victory over the Dodgers and 2-4 lead in the 1953 World Series.

It was a bitter defeat for the Dodgers who appeared on their way to triumph until their ace southpaw Preacher Roe served up two of his specialties, home run balls.

With the Dodgers in front 2-1, Billy Martin, hero of yesterday's opening 9-5 Yankee victory, lined one of Roe's pitches into the lower left field grandstand to tie the score in the seventh inning. The blow just was over the outstretched gloved hand of left fielder Jackie Robinson.

Mantle Slashes One Into Stands

Then with two out in the eighth, and Hank Bauer who had singled on first base, Mantle got hold of a 2-0 pitch and drilled it into the same sector, although this one was well up in the seats.

It was only the fifth Yankee hit of the game but it was the big one.

That made it two victories in a row for the Yankees in their quest for an unprecedented fifth straight world championship and the cause of the doddering Dodgers became almost hopeless. No club in World Series history ever has gone on to win the classic after losing the first two games.

Vote on Soil District Addition Expected

Eagle Point — A vote on the 850,000 acre addition to the Sams Valley-Beagle Soil Conservation district appeared to be a certainty today following a hearing at Eagle Point grange hall last night attended by 67 interested persons.

The hearing, conducted by Robert C. Baum, executive secretary of the state soil conservation committee, revealed a unanimous approval for the proposed district among those present, some of whom had come 40 miles through rain for the meeting.

Vote in About Month

The referendum vote of land owners in the district under consideration will be held either in late November or early December, Baum said. Four voting places were approved at the

meeting and will be at Eagle Point Grange hall, Butte Falls Community hall, Lake Creek Grange hall, and Upper Rogue Grange hall. It is probable the polls will be open from 4 to 8 p.m.

Grant Hubbell, Trail, will be polling superintendent and one judge with two clerks and an alternate will be named to each polling place.

Questions on Program

Questions on what work will be done and of the program under the soil conservation district were asked during the evening. Lester James, chairman of the board of supervisors of the Sams Valley-Beagle district, and Lester Davenport, Soil Conservation Service representative, answered questions of land owners.

It was pointed out that the purpose for the district is to get assistance on a local level for soil conservation and land use. A complete soil survey will be made as a part of the work. The district will have no cost and is expected to help owners of the district.

Work accomplished by the Sams Valley-Beagle district was pointed out and included cover cropping, stubble mulch, range improvement, farm and ranch ponds, woodland management, seed grasses and legumes, farm drainage, irrigation systems.

Statements from a number present indicated the need of a conservation program. Ira Wolf of Lake Creek pointed to the need of an irrigation system reorganization in his district, as

did Bruce Grieve of Upper Rogue.

C. C. Hoover urged that experiments be made with the weather on spring and fall rain in connection with conservation. Many questions of the evening dealt with what the work will consist of.

Two More Members

Possibility of a change in name of the district will be investigated by Baum in its legal aspects. The present Sams Valley-Beagle district approved enlargement by resolution in May. The enlargement will give the board two more members, to be chosen from the additional acreage.

The vote approval of the reorganization will require a two-thirds majority of all ballots cast.

Evening Sessions Slated in Hearings On Copco Rate Hike

Move Made in Effort To Wind Up by Friday

An evening session was set today by Examiner David Don in the Public Utilities Commission's hearing on the proposed 20 per cent rate increase by California-Oregon Power company. The move was an effort to wind the hearing up by Friday night, "if at all possible," Don said. However, he indicated that the hearing would continue through Saturday, if necessary, but not next week as he had to appear elsewhere at that time.

Few More Questions

State PUC Attorney John R. McCullough stated that he only had a few more questions to ask the last two Copco witnesses in cross-examination and that his direct presentation would not last over one hour. Opposition Attorney Walter Evans, Portland, stated that he was doubtful the session could end by Friday evening, and that he couldn't tell how much of a direct case he would present, although he planned not over one or two witnesses in opposition to the rate increase.

In this morning's cross-examination of Copco witnesses, three persons were heard. They included Edwin Fleischmann, San Francisco, a consulting engineer, who was continued from yesterday; W. A. Fankhauser, Berkeley, former head of the Department of Finance and Accounts of the California Public Utilities commission, and John C. Boyle, Medford, vice-president and general manager of the company.

Answer Changed

All had given direct testimony at an earlier hearing in August. Fleischmann had given an explanation of the method used to allocate the properties and expenses of the company between the two states of California and Oregon. At today's session he changed an earlier direct testimony answer and enlarged on other questions, giving specific cases for electrical utilities where average water condition adjustments were made and cited certain gas company cases where adjustments were made for average temperatures.

Fankhauser, the second witness called, had previously given the financial history of the company and compared the company's earnings with other industries. He stated that the company now earns \$1.66 annually for each common share, and contended it should earn \$2.13 per share in order to raise funds with which to finance its construction program.

Not "Firm Contract"

Boyle was questioned at length by McCullough concerning the company's recent "written memorandum" with Bonneville power administration. Boyle stated that the reason for the agreement is to make "some arrangement whereby our territory would be left intact and not invaded by government transmission lines." He stated that the agreement was not a "firm power contract" and didn't believe any firm power would be available from Bonneville for the next six to eight years. He added the Pacific Gas and Electric company was the only source now available.

When questioned whether Copco could purchase Bonneville power and resell to PGE, Boyle stated it "was not good operating practice," but could be done "if we split our system."

All sessions are being held in the old council chambers of the city hall on the top floor. (See Story on Page 11)

T-H Invoked in Dock Strike

One of Farouk's Former Premiers Sentenced To Die

Cairo — (U.P.) — Egypt's military tribunal today sentenced one of ousted King Farouk's former premiers and another accused plotter to death by hanging for treason.

The court ordered Saadist party leader Ibrahim Abdel Hadi to be stripped of all his belongings, including about \$80,000 in cash, which will be given to the people. Shortly after the trial, president Wing Cmdr. Abdel Latif Boghadi, passed sentence on Abdel Hadi, another defendant, Ahmed Mohammed-Awad, was brought before the court and ordered hanged for supplying "foreign quarters" with information which helped "undermine the supreme interests of the country."

Say Plot Uncovered

The trials followed an announcement by President Mohammed Naguib's government that it had uncovered a "foreign inspired" plot to overthrow his regime.

The announcement, made by Minister of National Guidance Saleh Salem, prompted observers to speculate that the "foreign" nation was Great Britain, but the Egyptian government specified in a note to the British Foreign Office that London was not involved.

King Overthrown

Awad's indictment accused him of supplying these foreign quarters with information on National activities during 1951 and 1952 after Farouk's regime was overthrown in a coup d'etat.

Abdel Hadi was one of 14 persons arrested in midnight raids by army police. The once powerful former Premier Mustafa Nashas was put under house arrest and it was presumed he would be tried and given the death sentence. Abdel Hadi was accused of treason, corruption and abuse of power.

Newbry Formally In Governor Race

Salem — (U.P.) — Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry formally announced his candidacy for the Republican gubernatorial nomination in Oregon in 1954 during a talk here last night to the Willamette University Young Republican club.

"It is true that I do intend to file my candidacy for governor at some later date and will vigorously seek the Republican nomination in May, and victory in the general election in November of 1954," he said.

The secretary of state first indicated he would seek the governorship last spring in an address at Sacramento.

In his speech last night, Newbry called for increased old age assistance and a reduction in the number of state boards and commissions.

August Strikes Cost 2,800,000 Man Hours

Washington — (U.P.) — Strikes in August cost the nation 2,800,000 man days of idleness, the Bureau of Labor Statistics reported today.

The bureau said there were 675 work stoppages during the month involving 400,000 workers. This was just under the total for July.

Anti-Red Prisoners Riot

Panmunjom, Korea — (U.P.) — Neutral Indian guards killed one anti-Communist North Korean and wounded five who joined in a violent riot today against a visit to their camp hospital of Red Czech and Polish medical officers.

Four or five of the Indian guards were injured by stones hurled by the angry North Koreans.

Indian spokesmen said 500 of the North Koreans who have said they prefer death to return to Communism, attempted to storm the hospital compound when the Red medical officers appeared.

First Bloodshed

It was the second anti-Communist demonstration by prisoners turned over to the Indians to await "explanations" by Red propagandists who hope to convince them to return home. But today's riot was the first in which bloodshed has occurred.

Brig. Gen. B. M. Kaul said his Indian troops fired 12 rounds from single shot rifles when the Koreans failed to heed warnings against attempting to enter the hospital area.

Kaul said some North Korean prisoners had climbed over a barbed wire fence when the Indian guards opened fire.

Anti-Communist prisoners who have sworn to kill Communist "brainwashing" officers demonstrated simultaneously in other compounds.

Kaul said the 22,500 anti-Communist North Korean and Chinese prisoners have been demonstrating more and more frequently in the last few days. He said the prisoners were continually warned that the demonstrations must not get out of hand.

Communist authorities had made demands to speed the start of the "explanations," now a week overdue, because the time factor has become vital to the Reds.

Delays would work to the advantage of the United Nations inasmuch as the Indians are guarding only 359 captives of the Communists, including 23 Americans, who have refused to go home.

Four Get Sentences In Circuit Court

Four men must serve prison sentences ranging from three to four and one-half years as a result of circuit court actions here today and yesterday.

Philippe Ceryle Gastonguay, Eagle Point, must serve his original sentence of three years for burglary not in a dwelling following revocation of parole.

Marvin Lester Burch, 17, Mander, N.D., was given three years on a charge of forgery.

Everett Raynall Stevens, 63, will serve four years on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of minors.

Robert Verdun Tate, 37, Walla Walla, Wash., was given four and one-half years in prison for burglary not in a dwelling. He was captured in the Haupt Truck and Equipment Company building.

Leslie Robert McKnight, 18, 806 North Riverside ave., pleaded guilty to burglary not in a dwelling. His case was continued for sentencing pending report on his FBI record.

Ray Lester Tipperly, 28, was arraigned on an indictment and asked further time before pleading. He is charged with burglary not in a dwelling.

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Ralph Furrer Elected By Country GOP Club

Ralph Furrer was elected president of Jackson County chapter, Oregon Republican club, at a meeting of the chapter members this week. Mrs. G. Q. D'Albini, Mrs. Willis Scott, John Cotton of Ashland, and Richard House, are the four vice-presidents.

William Lingas was elected secretary, and Col. Oliver Overmyer, treasurer. The executive board of six are B. L. Nutting, A. A. Lausmann, William Warner, Howard Gault, Sam Taylor, and Michael Loftus of Jacksonville.

Other business at the meeting concerned plans for an annual convention of Oregon Republican clubs to be held in Medford October 23 and 24. State officers will be elected at that time.

Invitations have been extended to national and state officials to hold a well-known Republican figure.

President Acts To Put End To Union Walkout

Leaders Promise To Get Men Back

New York — (U.P.) — President Eisenhower called forth the Taft-Hartley act today to put an end to a crippling East coast longshoremen's strike and union leaders promised to get the men back to work.

The strike of 65,000 dockworkers began at midnight and shut down East coast ports from Maine to Virginia.

Patrick (Packy) Connolly, executive vice-president of the crime-riddled International Longshoremen's association, informed of the President's action, said:

"We'll have the men go back to work as soon as we are notified by the proper authorities that the President has acted."

Board Appointed

Connolly has directed the strike strategy on the New York waterfront in the absence of ILA President Joseph P. Ryan, who is in a hospital for observation.

President Eisenhower, invoking the Taft-Hartley act, established an emergency board to investigate the dispute and directed it to report to him by midnight Monday.

The White House said the board will hold its first meeting here Saturday morning.

The President's action was expected to relieve tension on this city's sprawling waterfront, where more than 1000 policemen were ready to deal with any violence between the strikers and longshoremen who have bolted the ILA to join the new union organized by the AFL when it expelled Ryan's outfit, Carry Own Baggage.

At least two luxury liners, the Liberté and the Constitution docked here without the aid of tugboats and passengers, aided by supervisory employees of the steamship lines, carried baggage off the ships.

No violence was reported but ILA members and organizers of the rival AFL union hurled taunts at each other at some piers where picket lines were established.

Ashland Juveniles Held by KF Police

Two Ashland boys, reported by their parents as runaways, have been picked up by police in Klamath Falls and will be returned to Jackson county in connection with the theft of a car from Klamath Junction. When picked up they were in possession of a car believed stolen by them in Yreka, Calif.

Sheriff Gault of Jackson county said he had been informed that a car belonging to Paul Westmoreland had been stolen and found in Yreka. When the two, one 13 and one 15, were picked up in Klamath Falls they were in possession of a car taken at Yreka, he was informed.

The boys were being returned today and officers have been told the boys have acknowledged theft of several guns from Ashland and will show where the guns were hidden. Two rifles and pistols were reported stolen from the Fred Henry cabin in Dead Indian.

Mystery, Tension Increase In Greenlease Kidnaping

Kansas City, Mo. — (U.P.) — Mystery and tension grew today in the kidnap case of six-year-old Bobby Greenlease.

There was no evidence his abductress has attempted to contact the wealthy, grief-shattered parents.

Police Obey Wishes

Police, working quietly and "exactly as the family wishes" repeated throughout the night that there was "nothing to report."

Their first concern, they said, was to prevent danger to the boy's life.

Robert C. Greenlease, a millionaire Cadillac dealer, insisted that money was no object in "getting my boy back." His son was spirited away from the fashionable French Institute of

Notre Dame de Sion on Monday by a red haired woman posing as his aunt.

Speculation about reasons for the boy's abduction increased hourly. Some officials thought the absence of a demand for ransom indicated the woman who first knelt in the chapel of the boy's exclusive school and then hurried away with him may have been possessed of a complex demanding possession of the youth.

Family in Seclusion

The Greenlease mansion in the West Kansas City suburb of Mission Hills, Kan., was closed yesterday even to close friends. Greenlease, 71, and his 45-year-old wife, Virginia, were near collapse from grief and anxiety and were permitted to see up one.
