Crater Lake Area Boy Scout Leaders Hold Two Meetings

Two important meetings in connection with Boy Scout matters were held here Tuesday night, according to Cliff Hanson, Crater Lake Area council scout executive.

He reported that the council commission met at the home of Council Commissioner J. A. McDougall, Perrydale ave., with 20 men from Yreka, Calif., Ashland, Grants Pass, Medford, Jerome, Paisie, Phoenix, Central Point and Rogue River.

The council advancement committee convened at the Scout office with Council Advancement Chairman Martin Webb in charge. Those attending were from Weed and Yreka, Calif., Ashland, Grants Pass and Medford.

At the commission meeting McDougall was assisted by John Patton, training chairman, and Hanson. The responsibility of the commission to assist unit leaders so that boys receive the most from scouting experience was discussed.

Webb at the advancement committee meeting was aided by R. D. Church, Big Pines district chairman, and Fred McMullin, assistant council scout executive. Plans were made to help Scout leaders aid boys in achieving more advancement through continuity of program in troop, post and Cub Scout home.

It was reported that a new local council advancement pamphlet has been developed to assist leaders with policies and ideas, including courts of honor and boards of review suggestions. It was brought out that the advancing boy stays in scouting and enjoys it and he in turn makes scouting more interesting to other boys.

Oregon Weather To Include Rain

The weather bureau forecast more rain for Oregon today and stopped issuing its fire weather forecasts.

More than an inch of rain fell in parts of Oregon during the 24-hour period ending at 4:30 a.m. today. Newport had nearly two inches, with a mark of 1.91. Astoria had 1.89, Portland 1.23 and Salem 1.07.

The bureau said occasional showers were expected through tomorrow, with the possibility of a new storm appearing tomorrow night. Gusts winds up to 30 miles an hour were expected along the coast, but not as strong as yesterday with the lightship off Tillamook head reporting a gust of 72 miles per hour.

Temperatures varied considerably. Bend's 32 was the state's coldest today, while Pendleton had a high of 84 yesterday.

Cross-Examination Still Underway at Copco Rate Hearing

The California Oregon Power company rate hearing on a proposed 20 per cent increase on residential and commercial-industrial schedules continued yesterday afternoon with a cross-examination of two Copco witnesses.

Questioning was done by both the state attorney, John R. McCullough, on the Public Utilities commission's staff, and Walter Evans, representing the Rogue River Valley Traffic Association, Southern Oregon Conservation and Tree Farm association, Roseburg Chamber of Commerce and a group of Jackson county persons owning small businesses. The latter four groups are adverse parties to the increase.

The first witness who was cross-examined regarding his direct testimony of last August was A. H. Kuhn, Chicago, a valuation and depreciation engineer. Kuhn had made an explanation of the straight line method of accruing depreciation adopted by the company as of Jan. 1, 1953. A number of questions were directed at him in explanation of the methods employed in his work.

The second witness called was Edwin Fleischman, San Francisco, a consulting engineer and expert in cost and rate studies. He had explained the method used to allocate the properties and expenses of the company between the two states, California and Oregon, in which Copco operates.

Centers on Exhibit
Most of the questioning centered around the exhibit prepared by Fleischman which were plotted "to indicate the close correlation between system load and temperature . . ."

He noted the "definite relationship" between Copco's load and the weather, stating electrical heating and other types of heavy use cause "sharp increases" in demand on the system.

The session ended at 4 p.m. with Fleischman scheduled for more questioning at today's sessions.

Hull on Scene To Relieve Clark

Tokyo.—(U.P.)—Gen. John E. Hull arrived today to take command of United States and United Nations military forces in the Far East from retiring Gen. Mark W. Clark.

Clark, who relinquishes his commands next week after 17 months of bloody war, snarled true talks and uneasy armistice, was obviously pleased to welcome his successor.

"Boy," said Clark, "Am I glad to see you!"

Hull, accompanied by Mrs. Hull, told reporters at International Airport that his "greatest ambition" was to contribute to peace in the Far East.

"The great task in the Far East," he said, "is to uphold the principles for which the free world stands."

Hull, former deputy chief of staff, will fly to Korea Friday with Clark for brief meetings with the 8th Army and 5th Air Force commanders.

William G. Sander Jr., 45, operator of the Yreka Flower shop and former resident of Medford and Ashland, died yesterday at Yreka, Calif.

Mr. Sander was born at Ashland and spent most of his early life in that community. He lived in Medford from 1930 to 1932 then moved to Yreka.

Survivors are his wife, Ellen; a daughter, Carla Jean; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. G. Sander, Ashland; five sisters, Mrs. Clark Thomas, Mrs. L. G. Morthland and Mrs. David Lowry, Medford; Mrs. William Blackmer, Roseburg, and Mrs. Jack Williams, Ashland, and a brother, Victor, Bend.

Farm Prices To Remain Fairly Stable This Year

Washington.—(U.P.)—Agriculture Department officials predicted today that farm prices will remain "fairly stable" for the rest of the year.

Although the peak harvest is now approaching, they said they do not expect "much change" during the next three months in prices received by farmers for crops and livestock. They conceded, however, that such change as there is probably will be in the direction of lower prices.

A report yesterday on the mid-September level of farm prices showed a drop of four-fifths of 1 per cent from a month earlier.

Decline Not Surprising
A spokesman pointed out that the decline was less than the 2 per cent drop in farm prices from mid-August to mid-September last year. Farm prices fell

another 2 per cent last year from September to October. Experts therefore would not be surprised at a seasonal decline of 1 per cent or so by mid-October.

The chief reason why no sharp drop is expected in the remaining months of 1953 is that earlier estimates on crop sizes already have had their effect on market prices.
