## 'Dough-Head,' Idea Starts Man on Way

Cleveland, O.—(U.P.)—Here's one man who benefited from the depression, having a "dough-head" as a chief engineer, and a 100-year-old idea.

D. H. Prutton now happily recalls that odd combination which started him on the way nearly 20 years ago "when the bankers took over the factory I was working in and put up a 'dough-head' as chief engineer."

Prutton quit and went into business for himself and now operates the D. H. Prutton Machinery Co. here which turns out machines for threading screws and bolts at least 10 times faster than any other type. A newer model "planetary thread roller" can thread hollow metal pieces 20 times faster than conventional equipment.

The father and his two sons, Edward, 20, and Howard, 25, drew on a century-old idea of Edward Croft of Waterbury, Conn., who "thought of building a rotary machine like ours, but was ahead of his time," Prutton explained.

Not only did the Pruttons manage to build the "impossible machine," but they operate their neat factory with 20 employees in an unorthodox fashion.

Beside a profit-sharing scheme Prutton operates on a democratic basis. Whenever a problem arises, boss and workers meet. "We do what the majority decides is right," he said.

## Guidance Lack May Hamper Teen-Agers

New York—(U.P.)—When teen-agers buckle down to finding jobs this fall, many may find themselves hampered in their search by a lack of practical, down-to-earth guidance.

A pattern for preventing this kind of disillusionment has been developed in the Youngstown, Ohio, area. There is the Mahoning and Shenango Valleys, reports Steelways, official magazine of American Iron and Steel Institute, an organization sponsored by local industries provides what might be called "career previews" for teen-agers while they are still in high school.

Besides giving young people a graphic picture of the numerous jobs available to them in the local area, this growing service group—known as the Industrial Information Institute—also shows them how they can help industry make real contributions to the community.

Thousands of high school students are drawn to the Institute's annual exposition in Youngstown to study special job analysis charts. Required aptitudes like stamina, coordination, perceptual speed and leadership are shown so students can practical-

ly, pre-rate themselves. Steel companies, utilities, banks, railroads and the other interests backing the Institute see it as a workable job pattern that others might follow.
