

Odds makers List Yankees 3-1 Series Choice After 2nd Win

Brooklyn—(U.P.)—The crippled Dodgers fled across the bridge today to make their last stand against an aroused Yankee team in the fifth consecutive world championship in four or five games.

The Dodgers were faced with the prospect of doing what no team in history has done: win a seven-game World Series after losing the first two contests. They were further hobbled by the possible loss of injured catcher Roy Campanella.

The odds makers quoted the Yankees as 11-10 favorites to make it three straight victories and 3-1 favorites to win the series. In some quarters, the

Eagles Win 32-0 Over Jacksonville

Eagle Point — Eagle Point rambling over the Jacksonville high school football team 32 to 0 here Thursday.

The Eagles scored on the first play following the kick-off and were never seriously threatened by the Redskins. Jacksonville's deepest penetration was the Eagle 33 yard line following an Eagle Point fumble.

Eagle Point took over on the Jacksonville 42-yard line after a Redskins kick was partially blocked. Four plays carried the Eagles to the 17 but Jack Greb bulled over from there. Gillaspie went over for the extra.

A bit later in the same quarter, Eagle Point drove to the Jacksonville 12. The ball was lost on a fumble. But, after a pass interception by Don Falkenhagen, the Eagles had the ball

again on the 12. Greb socked to the three and Charles Eccleston circled end for a TD. Greb's extra point kick failed and the Eagles led 19 to 0.

A pass interception by Eldon Mason gave the Eagles the ball on the Jacksonville 26. They moved with four pass plays, two completed to the three. Gillaspie went around end for a touchdown and Mason's conversion push was good. Eagle Point headed at halftime 26 to 0.

Coach Jerry Mosby juggled his Eagle line-up somewhat in the second half and, while the Eagles still maintained the upperhand, there was only one more score. Eagle Point got its last TD in the third quarter on a 45-yard drive. Gillaspie went the final four. The Eagles drove to the Redskins three in the fourth period and lost the ball on downs.
