

# 'New Look' in U. S. Diplomacy Receiving First Test in Korea

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Tokyo—(U.P.)—A "new look" in United States diplomacy has been launched in Asia and it is getting its first test in Korea where American officials are putting their foot down in a dispute with a friendly nation.

Reliable sources said the new attitude is that the United States does not mind being "Uncle Sam" or "Uncle Sugar" so long as it doesn't go on being called "Uncle Sucker."

As a first step, the United States has decided it will not be pushed around by the Koreans. Gen. John E. Hull, American Far East commander, met with stubborn Republic of Korea President Syngman Rhee in Seoul on Thursday. The top-level conference was designed to settle "once and for all" the trouble that has developed between the United States and the ROK government.

**Exchange Rate Issue**  
The immediate issue is whether the United States is going to get a "realistic" exchange rate for its dollars in Korea or will be forced to buy Korean currency at a discriminatory rate.

But the bigger issue is whether the Americans and Koreans can work together and whether the Koreans will meet certain American requirements for granting about \$700,000,000 in aid to the war torn nation.

Many diplomats believe this Monday will mark the filing deadline for city officials at both Talent and Gold Hill. Elections will be held Nov. 2.

There are nine positions up for election at Talent, the mayor, recorder, treasurer and six council posts. Gold Hill will have five city positions to be voted on. They are for the offices of mayor, recorder-treasurer and three councilmen.

Wednesday will be the deadline at Central Point where contests are shaping up for six positions: mayor, three councilmen, recorder and treasurer.

Nominating petitions must be submitted to the city recorder to place a name on the Nov. 2 ballot.

**U. S. Will Join Effort To End Cold War**  
Paris—(U.P.)—Authoritative sources disclosed that the United States has informed its Allies Washington will join in a major diplomatic effort to end the cold war with Russia when it is certain the new European defense system, including Germany, will be ratified.

These sources said U. S. Secretary of State John Foster Dulles has made this position known to French Premier Pierre Mendes-France and British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden.

Both the French Premier and Eden are known to desire new top level talks with the Kremlin.

**POWER LINE DAMAGED**  
Portland—(U.P.)—A 66,000-volt power line was damaged, possibly by lightning, Friday night and lights went out in several thousand Portland homes. Service was interrupted at 7:07 p.m. and was restored to all at 7:28 p.m. The line ran from the Lincoln steam power plant to the Albina substation. Nine substations were affected.

One Western diplomat told the United Press he believed, on the basis of what he had seen, that America has reached these conclusions:

1. The United States cannot be the world's leader and still win a popularity contest. Even America's best friends are likely to develop jealousies.

2. The United States has finally come to realize it cannot buy love and respect.

3. Americans have discovered they really need "cooperation" from their allies rather than "love and kisses."

4. The United States is tired of seeing its allies threaten to "go Communist" whenever more

American aid is not forthcoming.

5. In the future, the American system will probably be to announce a goal and "invite" others to go along. Aid and support probably will be given to those who desire to cooperate but there will be no begging or pleading. Those who don't go along will be left to do the best they can on their own.

**Public Relations Job for Farmers Object of 'Week'**

A good job of public relations for agriculture is the objective of Farm Bureau week starting today, according to Chet Zedicker, president of the Jackson County Farm Bureau.

Events of the week will include a kickoff luncheon at the Jackson hotel at noon tomorrow and a broadcast at 7:15 a.m. on radio station KMED, Zedicker said.

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## Game Commission Opposes Project on Illinois River

Portland—(U.P.)—The Oregon State Game Commission expressed no opposition to the Eugene Water and Electric Board's proposed power development on the McKenzie river during its meeting Friday, but the same group did voice vigorous disapproval to the Coos-Curry Electric Co-operative's application for a hydroelectric project on the Illinois river.

The commission moved to file notice with the Federal Power Commission that it would oppose the Beaver Marsh project on the McKenzie only if certain summer flow and fluctuation safeguards were not guaranteed.

Under the Eugene Water and Electric Board's plans for devel-

opment of the Beaver Marsh site, dams would be placed at Fish lake, Clear lake outlet and on the McKenzie above Smith river. Fish lake and Clear lake would serve as power reservoirs and from Clear lake a tunnel would divert water to a turbine at Beaver Marsh where the third dam would serve to re-regulate the river flow so it would be an even flow below that point.

Both the McKenzie River Chamber of Commerce and the Save the McKenzie association oppose the project because of feared damage to recreational and scenic values.

The commission opposed the development of a hydroelectric project on the Illinois at Table

mountain near Agness because of fears of serious damage to upstream migrations of steelhead and Chinook salmon.

The commission's fishery staff said the runs of migratory fish entering the Illinois would be falsely attracted to the outflow from the power house located several miles below the dam and

utilizing the biggest share of the river flow. There would be no way of getting the fish past this point, according to staff experts.

Washington—(U.P.)—The Agriculture Department will not start buying eggs to support prices despite Republican requests for such a program, according to an informed source.

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
