

Nixon Under Fire from Demos; Republicans Attack Harriman

Washington—(U.P.)—Vice-President Richard M. Nixon came under heavy Democratic fire Saturday when New York Republicans let go another blast at Democratic gubernatorial candidate Averell Harriman.

As the last full week of campaigning before the Nov. 2 election approached, both sides pounded each other with some of the sharpest blows of the campaign in speeches Friday night.

Adlai E. Stevenson, Democratic presidential candidate in 1952, led the attack on Nixon. In a speech at Milwaukee, Wis., he said it appeared that under Nixon's leadership the "great crusade" was "going to end up this critical campaign on the elevated notes of subversion, perversion and denunciation of

President Truman." Democratic National Chairman Stephen A. Mitchell said Nixon was one of the "perverted" and "distorted" administration's security program and had used it "as a political weapon." The liberal Americans for Democratic Action organization accused the vice-president of "trying to make a phony political issue" of its anti-Communist record.

Welcomes Red Opposition
Nixon, meanwhile, declared in Montana that the Communist Party has called for the defeat of all GOP candidates in next month's election. He said he had learned that the Reds had decided to "fight out the issues within the Democratic party."

Freak Accident Cause of Death

Tong Kong—(U.P.)—Civil Air Transport official said Saturday that a freak accident caused the pilot to lose control of a C-47 plane and crash it into the Gulf of Siam on Oct. 21.

A. T. Cox, CAT president, said the accidental flashing of a warning light blinded pilot Harry Kaffenberger, of New Weston, O., and the plane plummeted into the sea with the loss of six of the seven persons aboard.

Cox returned here after completing an on-the-spot investigation. He said Kaffenberger, the lone survivor, told him what happened.

"The pilot had just finished his last run over the dropping area and was at low altitude when a warning light was accidentally turned on by the dispatcher in the rear of the plane, momentarily blinding the pilot," Cox said.

"Before the pilot could recover his vision the plane hit the sea."

The twin-engine plane was on charter to Sea Supply, an American company under contract to the Thailand Police Department. It was being used for practice paratroop drops at the time and was en route back to Bangkok when it crashed.

Youngster Killed In Fall From Car

Cos Bay—(U.P.)—Three-year-old Michael Lee Stolz of Wolf Creek was killed at 9:15 a. m. Saturday when he fell from a moving automobile.

The youngster's father told police he and his son were driving along the Beach Loop road near Bandon when he noticed the boy had opened the car door. Fearing a sudden stop would jar the boy out of the car, the father, Robert H. Stolz, said he applied the brakes gradually. But the boy already had fallen from the car, and apparently was killed instantly.

The Stolz family was visiting in Bandon.

Colleges Refuse To Allow Debate on Red Entry in UN

Lincoln, Neb.—(U.P.)—College officials lined up Saturday on both the affirmative and negative sides in a debate whether it is all right for students to debate recognition of Communist China.

Refusal of four Nebraska State teachers colleges to allow debate on the recognition question Friday touched off a lively discussion among educators.

The question: "Resolved, that the United States should extend diplomatic recognition to the Communist government of China" has been set as a topic for member collegiate debate

Sack To Appeal Death Sentence

Portland—(U.P.)—Convicted murderer George F. Sack grasped a new lease on life Saturday following notice by his attorney that the Circuit Court conviction would be appealed to the State Supreme Court.

Attorney John P. Hannon filed notice of appeal Friday and was given 10 days in which to file a bill of exceptions listing the basis for the appeal.

Hannon said he would move for an extension of time.

Sack was convicted of the asphyxiation murder of his third wife, Goldie Goodrich Sack, a former Montana school teacher. Her body was found last February in a clump of bushes in east Portland.

A circuit court jury convicted Sack of murdering her by placing her unconscious body in the trunk of his car. He was sentenced to die in the state's lethal gas chamber but the latest move by his attorney blocked execution of the death sentence.

Two Women Saved From Possible Drowning

Albany, Ore.—(U.P.)—Two women were saved from possible drowning Friday when the automobile in which they were riding plunged into a Pacific Power & Light Company canal two miles south of Albany.

Mrs. Helen R. Pool and her daughter, Mrs. Patricia Montank, both of Sheed, were rescued by residents of the area who used a ladder to form a bridge from the shore to the submerged car. The two women managed to climb out of the car unassisted. State police said the car was carried downstream about 100 feet before it came to rest on the canal bottom.

Harriman immediately called the charge "distortion and smear" and said he would "continue to discuss the issues."

Dewey said another "chapter" in the life of Harriman would be revealed tonight in a speech by Sen. Irving M. Ives, Harriman's Republican foe.

At Albuquerque, N. M., Democratic Senate Leader Lyndon B. Johnson said he and House Democratic Leader Sam Rayburn have already worked out a tentative legislative program if the Democrats win control of the new Congress.

He said the program, complete to naming of Democratic committee chairmen, would "pledge complete cooperation with President Eisenhower in a single-purpose foreign policy; an adequate defense program . . . and a thorough ventilation of the 'Nixon-Dixon-Yates' deal . . ."

The victims were identified as Roger A. Erwin, 22, Emmett, Ida.; Theron Secoy, 19, Ontario, and Jo Ann Hale, 17, Payette.

The sheriff's office said the cars collided head-on just south of the Payette city limits. The girl was a passenger in the car driven by Secoy. Erwin was alone, the sheriff's office said.

Grange Speaker Raps Partnership Power

San Jose, Calif.—(U.P.)—Ray W. Gill, Portland, member of the executive board of the Oregon State Grange, Friday told California Grangers at their 82nd annual convention here partnership plans favor private power companies.

Gill said the partnership proposals of Secretary of the Interior Douglas McKay give preference private power companies and give them control over public power projects already completed.

Neuberger, Hitchcock Agree Safeguards on Education Aid Needed

State Sen. Richard L. Neuberger, Democratic candidate for the U. S. Senate, agrees with Philip A. Hitchcock, a state Republican leader, that a federal aid to education bill should not be supported if it endangers local control of the schools.

This agreement was expressed in Portland Friday night when both men appeared at the annual fall conference of the Oregon Education Association department of classroom teachers.

The speakers agreed that safeguards to prevent federal control of the schools could be written into any federal measure.

Raps Cordon Record
However, Neuberger and Hitchcock disagreed on the voting record of Sen. Guy Cordon, who opposes Neuberger in the Nov. 2 election.

Neuberger said Cordon voted against the Hill amendment to reserve offshore oil revenues for the schools, despite endorsement by every major education group in the country, including the OEA.

Hitchcock contended "a man is sent to the Legislature to vote his own conscience."

While Neuberger and Hitchcock were airing their views before the teachers group, Sen. Cordon was calling for an end to "useless campaign bickering" at a Republican candidates meeting night in Portland's St. Johns district.

"False Charges"
Cordon said "false statements, false charges against me, wild impossible promises are a din in our ears."

He likened the congressional faces to a football game "where we have just finished the first half and you have a winning team now in Congress. Let's give to the President of the United States his four-year chance to make good. Give him a Congress of his own political persuasion."

Earlier at a luncheon in Canby, Cordon said the electric power policy of his opponent would be "a guarantee of bankruptcy" for Oregon.

General Hewitt Heads Anti-Aircraft Defense

San Francisco—(U.P.)—Sixth Army headquarters has announced that Maj. Gen. Hobart Hewitt, one of the nation's leading anti-aircraft defense experts, has assumed command of all Nike guided missile and other ack-ack defenses in the seven western states.

Gen. Hewitt succeeds Maj. Gen. Francis M. Day as commander of the western army anti-aircraft commission, with headquarters at Fort Baker, Marin County.

The anti-aircraft command is under over-all operational control of Maj. Gen. Walter E. Todd, head of the Western Air Defense Force, and is part of the newly formed Continental Air Defense Command, a joint Army-Navy-Air Force team.

Ike Predicts World Peace To Be Permanent

Washington—(U.P.)—President Eisenhower Friday told a national committee for a stronger United Nations he believes the world will come very close to permanent peace during our time.

Meeting with 55 members of the U. S. Committee for the United Nations, Mr. Eisenhower said the members have contributed toward peace in their efforts on behalf of the United Nations. The meeting was held in the White House Cabinet Room.

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Teenage Couple Object of Search

Washington—(U.P.)—Police and sheriffs in 45 states kept an eye out Saturday for a 15-year-old boy and his 14-year-old sweetheart, missing for nearly a month and believed to be married.

Detectives said Patricia Graham 14, and Matthew Rettew, 15, were last seen on the morning of Sept. 27 near a Washington streetcar stop. Soon after their disappearance the boy wrote his mother they had been married and were going to "try to make it on our own."

"If we can't we'll contact you," the note said. "I know you think we're too young, but I love Patty very much." The envelope was post marked Washington.

The youngsters are believed to have had only about \$10 apiece when they left home. Police think they may have changed their names in order to get jobs. Relatives said the pair did well in their school work but neither has ever been employed.

Scholarships Planned For Young Journalists

Eugene—(U.P.)—Outstanding high school journalism students will have a chance to win four-year partial scholarships to the University of Oregon, Dean Gordon A. Sabin of the school of journalism said Friday night.

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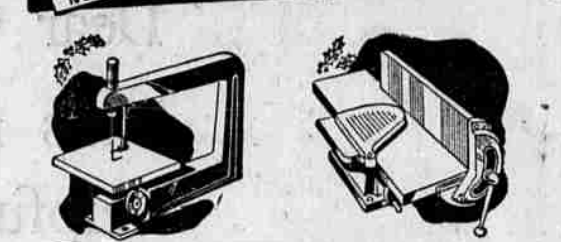
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
