Stage Play For Children Coming Here

A new children's theater production based on a very old Irish legend and titled "The Giant of Knockmanny" will be brought to the children of Medford and vicinity on Thursday, November 4, at 3:30 p.m. by Medford Branch, American Association of University Women.

Produced by Children's Theater of the West and directed by Burdette Fitzgerald of San Francisco, the script for the production has been written especially for this tour by Mercedes Gardner and Jean Shannan Smith, who wrote and produced the very successful children's radio program "The Adventures of Scooter."

The play, in two acts, and approximately one hour and fifteen minutes in length, is a very close adaptation of the Irish tale which itself is legend... half truth and half fantasy, and concerns two of Ireland's greatest heroes, who stand as giants in the colorful past of Ireland's history. These two heroes, portrayed as giants both in the legend and the play are Finn McCool and Cuchullain. Both were great warriors, both knights famed for their chivalry as well as their valor.

In the play Finn McCool is a peaceable giant who rules Ireland through kindness. Cuchullain is a fierce, aggressive giant who has been in Scotland and waits impatiently for Finn to put the final touches on a "pad road" which will make it possible for him to walk back into Ireland.

Upon his arrival there he intends to overcome Finn, "fasten him like a pancake" and rule over all Ireland as the greatest giant of them all. Finn's wife, Connah, has other ideas. Gifted with great wit, and very concerned about the possibility of Finn having to face up to Cuchullain, who is much larger than Finn, she tries to persuade Finn not to finish the road.

Finn, of course, being contentious and good, is very anxious to finish the "pad road" and is not afraid of Cuchullain at all, as he does not believe Cuchullain means him harm.

When he finally finds out just what Cuchullain plans to do to him, he consults his wife, who very cleverly plans the means whereby Finn can beat the terrible Cuchullain.

Designer Cecil Chapman points out that the word "casual" is not a synonym for tailored so much as for softness.

"Clothes this winter, from sports to evening wear, have grace and a long flowing line," said the designer. "Some persons call this casual, as the opposite of stiffly shaped. But no woman should assume that the soft colors, rich fabrics and pretty drapery are to be sacrificed for the haphazard look of the flapper era."

Kitchen Waste Cans Need Daily Dousing

Lincoln, Neb.—U.P.—Step-on waste cans are convenient, but need care to prevent odors or rusting, according to Miss Clara Leopold.

Miss Leopold, University of Nebraska extension home management specialist, said the waste can should be washed daily in soapy water. Wash the outside occasionally too, including the lid. Very often food scraps push up against the inside of the lid, causing unpleasant odors and rusting.

RESTORE ALTAR

The altar of the Virgin in St. Michael's Church, Schwabach Hall, Germany, has just been restored and set up again, according to the German tourist information office. Dating from 1517, the gothic altar is embellished with more than 130 sculptured figures. This is the third important work of sacred art to be restored in Schwabach Hall within the last eighteen months.

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POTATO WITH CHEESE

New York—U.P.—The hungry, well-scrubbed baked potato becomes a company dish when accented with an American blue cheese sauce. To make enough sauce for four potatoes, simply combine 1 cup of sour cream, ½ cup crumbled blue cheese (about 3 ounces),

and 2 tablespoons of chopped chives. If you like to experiment with different flavor combinations, try the sauce on asparagus or broccoli.

FADED GARMENTS

Schenectady, N.Y.—U.P.—If blue garments in your wardrobe turn a weak purple after hanging in the closet for a few months, better just re-dye the garments another color. Scientists at General Electric explain the usual reason for the color change—the garments were
